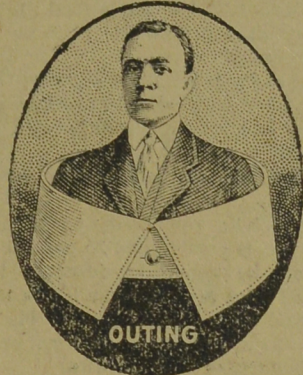
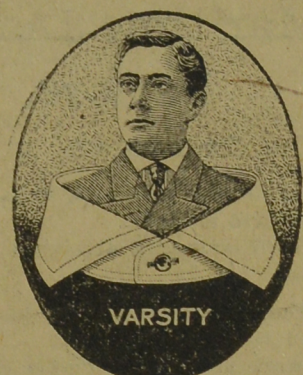

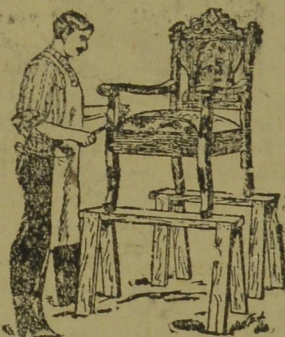

CABINET MEETINGS.

Important Measures will have to be Stood Over in Parliament on Account of Tory Obstruction.

OTTAWA, June 8.—The cabinet spent a busy day on Saturday, holding three sittings of the council, morning, afternoon and evening.

The list of supplementary estimates for this year was gone through again and carefully revised. They will probably be presented to the Commons early this week. Owing to the long continued blocking of supply this session it has been found that many of the public works originally contemplated for this year will have to be postponed and consequently curtailed from the original draft.

According to present indications by the time the supply bill is passed it will be too late in the session to do much beyond merely making a start on the public works provided for in the estimates for the year. And unless the opposition cease their obstructive tactics very soon, work will have to be stopped on most of the public buildings, etc., now under construction. Contractors on public works all over the country are now daily applying to the public works

department for payments due on work already under way, but no funds are available in the department.

The government measure to extend the boundaries of Manitoba will be brought down during the week. It is understood the bill will provide for an extension of the boundaries of "the postage stamp" province so as to make it practically symmetrical with the other prairie provinces. The present eastern boundary of the province will be extended northward to the Churchill river and then follow the middle of the river to Fort Churchill. The intention is to give both Manitoba and Ontario a Hudson Bay port at the mouth of the river. Just at present the government's intention is understood to provide only for the extension of the Manitoba boundaries, but as soon as the provinces of Ontario and Quebec are ready for the extension of their boundaries northward to take in the balance of Keewatin and the territory of Ungava the further extension of boundaries will be made.

MR. MCKAY'S JOB.

The appointment of Mr. William McKay to the position of government road superintendent for the lower part of the city has been confirmed. Like most other York county appointments it was made on the recommendation of the senior member, Mr. J. K. Pinder, and his back bench colleagues. Mr. Pinder is chairman of the public accounts committee of the legislature, and over and over again during the recent session he expressed the opinion that no official should be paid for extra services performed during office hours. Holding those views it will be up to Mr. Pinder to see to it that Mr. McKay does his road work for the government after six o'clock in the evening.

If it is wrong for a government official to draw extra pay for work done in time which is not his own, it is certainly wrong for a city official to do the same thing.

Gold King mine is largely owned by New Brunswick and Eastern Maine being managed from Waterville.

This will be a monster picnic, in fact several picnics rolled into one. It will last the whole day and extend into the evening when the grounds will be brilliantly lighted. A band and an orchestra have both been engaged. This is the picnic where everybody will meet everybody else and put in a big day. Posters will be out this week giving particulars.

BOUND TO SUICIDE

Thomas Edwards, an inmate of the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases, at Fairville, attempted to commit suicide Saturday afternoon by jumping into the river from West Head cliff a short distance below the reversible falls, and would have succeeded but for the timely rescue made by Byron Craft.

Edwards has been in the asylum for nearly six months, and during that time he has made three attempts to end his life.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D. 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$ 35 00
The same for each successive evening performance 30 00
The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery 30 00
The same as above without scenery 25 00
The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night 27 00
The same without scenery per night 23 00
For one week stand with scenery 135 00
For the same without scenery 120 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for

light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery 15 00
For the same without scenery 10 00
For each matinee, local talent only 7 50
For each political meeting 15 00
On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting 10 00
For two meetings same person, same day 15 00
For rehearsals for afternoon 3 00
For rehearsals for evening 5 00

For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night 20 00
The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night 18 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 10 00
