A GOOD WEEK.

At the Douglas Boom last week 1511 joints of logs were rafted, which is considered a pretty good showing.

AT THE WINDSOR.

Mr. James A. Bruce is again behind the desk at Windsor Hall. The popular "Jimmy" is a general favorite with the traveling public and other patrons of the hotel and they are giving him the glad hand.

NARROW ESCAPE.

A horse belonging to Mr. W. R. Logan and attached to his delivery wagon, backed over the city hall dump this afternoon, landing in about six feet of water. The animal was rescued with considerable difficulty, and was cut quite severely.

STARTED WORK.

Mr. Harry Gibson, who has a contract to clear a right of way on the Transcontinental railroad from Plaster Rock to the L. C. R. tracks near Boiestown, started a crew of men at work on the job this morning at Maple Grove. He expects to have a force of two hundred men at work before a great while. Mr. Gibson has two years in which to finish the work.

SULTRY WEATHER.

The first real hot wave of the season struck the city yesterday, and is still hovering about in the neighborhood. The thermometer soared to 88 degrees in the shade, which is going some for so early in the season. Fortunately a good breeze prevailed during the greater part of the day, which made it fairly comfortable out of doors. A great many people spent the day in the country, while others sought recreation in the parks and squares.

CRICKET MATCH.

The first Cricket Match of the season was played on Officers' Square Saturday afternoon, between the Military and a Scratch eleven from the Fredericton Club, the latter winning, score 30 to 50. Ashburnham of the same team accepted three flies. A match between Civilians and Military will probably be played Wednesday afternoon.

He left for Plaster Rock on Saturday, with his party to begin work. Mr. S. B. Thomas of Marysville has been engaged as cook.

CHANGES TO BE MADE.

Boone pitched an excellent game and batted well as did "Tanker" Hughes. Next Saturday night the Marysville team are to meet the Victorias of Fredericton on Marysville grounds. They report Ben in a better position than ever this year to handle fishing parties. Some good catches of trout have also been made on the Lepreaux and Magaguadavic Rivers this season.
