

ONTARIO MAN HUNT.

Young Scotsman Who Shot and Killed R. C. R. Sergeant Still at Large.

LONDON, April 22.—Private Moir, of Wosley Barracks, who shot and killed Col. Sgt. Lloyd here last Friday night because he was reprimanded for carelessness in the matter of dress, is still at large though ever since the committal of the crime he has been scouring the country to capture him. That Moir has eluded the vigilance of his pursuers for so long is remarkable as the country is rather thickly settled about here, and as everyone knows about the crime which is the absorbing topic of conversation. Besides the railways have been closely watched and also the main roads. Moir has of necessity been compelled to travel on foot and has accordingly made but slow progress as he has had to avoid the highways, which are being patrolled by mounted men, heavily armed. That Moir is to escape seems impossible but it is anticipated that he will make a desperate fight when he is cornered as he has two revolvers, and is known to be quite ready to kill at the slightest provocation.

MOIR'S RECORD.

Moir served in the Imperial Army for years and was through the South African war. On its conclusion he secured his discharge and came to Canada settling in Guelph, Ont. There he shot a Hebrew, Samuels, in an altercation and had to jump the town. To quietly efface himself he joined the force at Wosley barracks. There he was far from being popular for he was of a morose disposition and inclined to quarrel. He often boasted of past crimes, mentioning most frequently that he had put one man out of business in Guelph, and was prepared to repeat the deed if he was crossed.

FIRE WITHOUT PROVOCATION.

There was no provocation when Moir shot and killed Lloyd. The latter, as his superior officer, reproved him for not dressing properly. Moir, who was slightly under the influence of liquor pulled a revolver and shot Lloyd through the lungs.

Then he went to his room, secured another revolver, a rifle and ammunition and made his escape by threatening to kill anyone who obstructed him. He got safely away to the open. The latter have found traces of him at various farms and villages near here but since he discarded his uniform and secured a suit of civilian clothes, the trail has become less distinct.

The officers in pursuit of Moir have instructions to take him dead or alive. They are well armed with rifles and revolvers and are prepared to shoot as soon as they catch sight of him. Though their task is an eminently dangerous one they are performing it with ardor and anticipate its successful conclusion even at the cost of bloodshed.

Moir has not been seen since Monday and it may be that he has reached Stratford and effected a "getaway" by means of one of the many trains leaving that city. In any event a description of him has been circulated broadcast and he will have difficulty crossing the border if he ever gets that far. When last seen Moir was at Wyton, where he got food from Postmaster Simon Blake.

LAST SEEN MONDAY.

The news was received yesterday afternoon, when the police were returning from St. Mary's that Moir had called at the home of Mr. James Robinson, two miles south of St. Mary's, at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning. He approached the house from the road, and asked to be given some food. The young woman who answered the knock said that he was calm, and that he offered to pay for what was given him. He refused an invitation to come inside, and taking the food given him went north on the tracks in the direction of St. Mary's. The police were not far from this house at the time Moir called. A short time after they were within hailing distance of it, but no information was given them. Possessed of this clue they are confident that they could have run down the man in short order.

TRIBUTE TO AN M. P.

Mr. E. M. McDonald's Pictou Constituents Gave Hearty Demonstrations in His Honor—Presented with Gold Watch and Chain.

PICTOU, April 21.—Advocate Hall was filled last evening, when the young Liberals of Pictou, five hundred strong, gave a smoker in honor of Mr. E. M. McDonald, M. P., who is at home during Easter vacation. A musical and literary program was provided, and during the evening a Young Men's Liberal Club was formed.

A deafening cheer was E. M. McDonald's welcome from his friends, for he has "made good" and given Pictou county a square deal. Mr. McDonald gave an exhaustive resume of the work of the present session of parliament, and of the obstructionist tactics of the opposition. He referred especially to the misrepresentation of Mr. Ames in Halifax on Saturday, and replied to them and his hypocritical claim of playing fair most effectively. The various vocal and instrumental selections by the boys were pleasing and entertaining. The smoker closed with cheers for the King, Laurier and Fielding.

HALIFAX, April 23.—The citizens of Stellarton united in showing respect and esteem for the popular member for Pictou, E. M. McDonald, when over 200 of them, representing all parties and shades of

opinion, gathered at the Hotel Ora last night to tender him a banquet. Around the board were gathered many of the representative men of Pictou. The banquet was non-political.

Ex-Mayor Gray presided and read an address to Mr. McDonald from the Liberal citizens of the town of Stellarton, which outlined his political career and referred particularly to some of his endeavors for the town of Stellarton and for the railway men. Accompanying the address was a magnificent gold watch and chain.

Mr. McDonald referred in feeling terms to the good will which had prompted the gift. His object as representative of the county had been to do his best for every man in the county, Liberal or Conservative. In the person of Hon. Mr. Graham, he said, we had the best Minister of Railways in Canada's history. Eleven years ago engine houses, rest houses and other conveniences and comforts of today were unknown, although the party then in power claimed they had a monopoly of the genius of government. Those things were obtained under Liberal government. Eleven years ago it was political pull that was put ahead of seniority. That was gone.

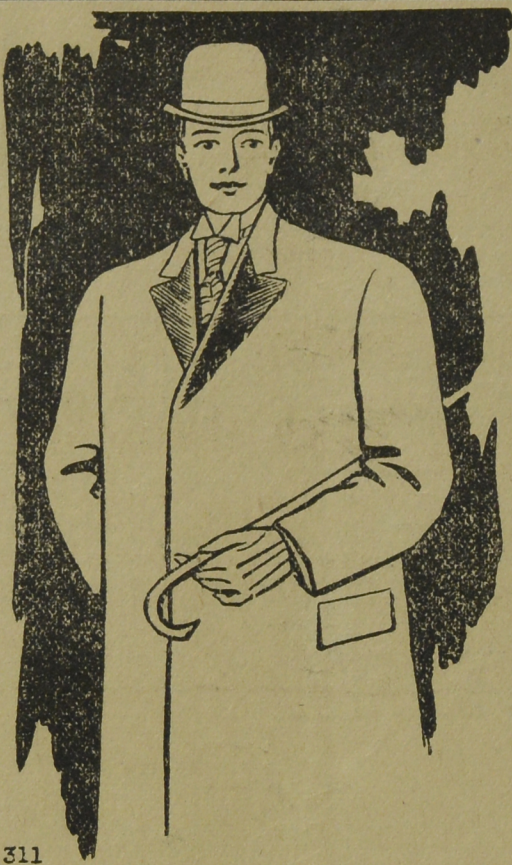

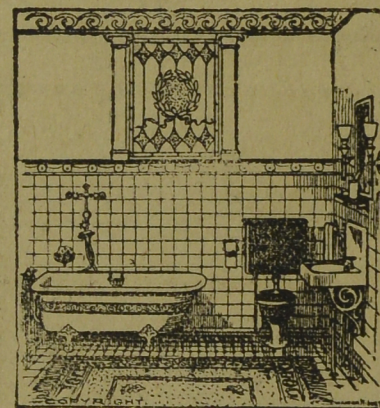
