THE FARMER CANDIDATE

Never before since York has had the privilege of electing a representative to the Dominion Parliament—and that is a period stretching over forty-one years—have the farmers of this constituency had the opportunity of voting for one of their own number for that honorable and responsible position.

Mr. Fisher, elected in 1867, was a lawyer. Mr. Pichard, his successor, was a lumberman. Mr. Temple, a retired lumberman, Mr. Foster, a professional politician, Mr. Gibson, a lumberman, and Mr. Crockett, a lawyer.

Is it not about time the Farmers of York had their innings, and will they ever have a better opportunity than in the present election?

Mr. Brown, the Liberal candidate, is a farmer, born and reared on a farm, with a liberal education, a University graduate, a fine public speaker, a man fitted in every way to represent this constituency in the House of Commons.

Why should the farmers of York turn down Nelson Brown, a farmer, for O. S. Crockett, a lawyer, whom they never see except when he is seeking election.

Mr. Brown is a man of the people. He knows them from one end of the constituency to the other, understands their interests and requirements, was born and brought up among them, lives and associates with them, and is a credit to the class to which he belongs.

Mr. Brown, if sent to parliament, would be regarded there as a thoroughly representative farmer, not only a practical farmer, but an educated farmer, able to discuss public questions with ability and force.

Wouldn't York be the gainer by having such a man as Nelson Brown in parliament, apart altogether from political considerations?

Think it over farmers of York, and when you go to the polls on Oct. 26, give the farmer candidate a vote.

Let the farmers of York be represented in parliament at least once in a lifetime.

They have never before had the opportunity. It is their's in this contest.

THE STANLEY MEETING

Mr. O. S. Crockett has been going around in this campaign with a chip on his shoulder, and he and his friends thought nobody dared knock it off.

They said everybody was dodging the great man—afraid to meet him on the public platform. That's the Crockett way—filled with bumpiousness and self conceit.

Well, Mr. Brown has not had a great deal of experience in political debates, but he not only knocked off that chip but punched a great gaping hole in Mr. Crockett's boasted pre-eminence as a campaigner.

The two gentlemen met at Stanley in joint debate Saturday evening before an audience composed of both parties, and Mr. Brown easily carried off all the honors, delighting his friends and confounding his enemies by the eloquence and force of his address, and the mastery way in which he handled public questions.

Mr. Crockett dealt mostly in scandals—he was at home in his business of muckraking, while Mr. Brown discussed the issues of the campaign on broad lines.

Mr. Crockett, when taxed with being a political deserter, lost his temper, and tried to play the bully, but Mr. Brown had him nicely in hand all through, and won great admiration for the effective way in which he vanquished his opponent without stooping to Crockett methods.

Mr. Brown is a much better appearing man on the platform than Mr. Crockett, he has a better voice, his personality is much more pleasing and forceful, and he drives home his points much more effectively than his opponent.

He was given a splendid hearing, and the Liberals of Stanley and the surrounding country who gathered to hear their champion in such large numbers were more than delighted with the man himself, and the manner and matter of his address.

They had not heard such a powerful arraignment of the Tories and all their wicked works since the palmy days of the late lamented Hon. A. G. Blair, and it was no wonder they threw their hats in the air when they saw and heard Mr. Brown trim the bumpious Mr. Crockett to a finish.

The Political Jumper has laid that chip away, and he has learned after a bitter experience that the boaster and the braggart in the end has generally to bite the dust.

Victoria-Madawaska—that's one already for Laurier.

A TORY BACKDOWN

There is no Tory candidate in Victoria-Madawaska.

In the classic words of our distinguished friend and fellow citizen, the Solicitor General, Col. Baker, M. P. P., has been seized with that dread disease "cold feet," and has retired from the contest.

His friends say that he surrendered because they wanted him to remain in the local legislature, but Col. Baker knows better than that.

He has been over the constituency, and discovered that the electors have no use for a Tory candidate, especially a political turncoat.

The Colonel, who has long been a military man, and commands a regiment, has shown very unsoldierly qualities by surrendering in the face of the enemy. Like Mr. Hazen he seeks a substitute.

It is an awful crowdown for the Tory party at this stage of the campaign, and will be felt by the muckrakers all over the province.

It is an acknowledgment that Mr. Michaud will be elected, perhaps by acclamation, but in any case no candidate that the Tories can put up at this late date will be able to save his deposit.

The Solicitor General should make haste to send his friend Col. Baker, M. P. P., a foot warmer.

The Crocketts and their kind have discovered to their sorrow that Mr. Brown is no "dodger," afraid to meet the great O.S. in joint debate. They are sorry they ever suggested such a thing.

Mr. O. S. Crockett was escorted to Stanley by Mr. Harry Blair of the Auditor General's office—one of Mr. Hazen's new officials, all of whom the premier declared must keep out of politics or lose their positions.

Mr. O. S. Crockett says he did not know anything about that Orange circular. Well, we would like to believe him, but you see circumstances, etc.—Mr. Crockett has not denounced its use, but is willing to profit by it, and isn't it a broad issue on which to seek a seat in parliament?

Nobody cares particularly if the Solicitor General did or did not endorse promissory notes to the extent of \$1,000 for his newspaper friend. The point is that Mr. McLeod said he did so, and Mr. Brown's word will be accepted as readily in this constituency as the Solicitor General's.

Mr. Harry McLeod, whose political prestige in this constituency has waned to an alarming extent during the past few months, is in the field predicting a majority of 29 for Borden, and in the count he gives nine seats to the Tories in New Brunswick, and the same number in Nova Scotia. He also names 1200 as Mr. Crockett's majority in York. Foolish Harry; boastful Harry.

Notwithstanding what one of the clerks in the education office tells the graft organ respecting the qualifications of certain inspectors for office, the Herald is able to reiterate on the authority of the chief superintendent that the gentleman under discussion, are acting under a special license, and the Herald learns also that the board of education regulation giving authority for their appointment under special license has since been repealed. The Herald is not seeking the official heads of the inspectors in question. It believes and knows that that they are excellent men in their positions, but Mr. Nelson Brown was quite as efficient an inspector as either of them, and he was dismissed because of political spite, a technical objection to his qualification being used to justify a great wrong.

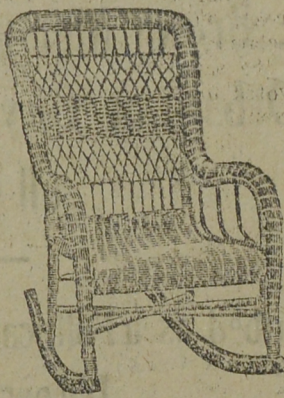
