THE STANLEY MEETING.

(Continued from First Page)
for Mr. Crockett to juggle with figures and attempt to deceive the farmers of New Brunswick.

In concluding his address, Mr. Brown said that under the terms of the agreement he had the right to close the meeting, but he would waive that right in favor of Mr. Crockett, who had been complaining that his time was too short. He would give him the whole twenty minutes, and would not reply to him at this stage even if he went so far as to try and convince the audience that two and two made five. He thanked the audience for the very attentive hearing they had given him, and he hoped on election day that they would go to the polls and cast their ballots for one of themselves, who was familiar with their needs. If elected he would serve them to the best of his ability, and if unsuccessful he would ever remain their friend and fellow worker. (Cheers.)

After the cheering which followed Mr. Brown's magnificent address, Mr. Crockett arose and at once got busy trying to combat the damaging arguments advanced against Toryism. He denied that he had ever seen a copy of the Orange pamphlet until Mr. Brown had shown it to him. He spent some minutes trying to convince the audience that Mr. Harry McLeod had never stated to Mr. Brown that he had endorsed for brother James to the extent of \$1,000. Of course the audience was much interested in this weighty matter of state and cheered the speaker. Mr. Crockett went on like a mill race for twenty minutes, when he was reminded by the chairman that his time was up.

Mr. Crockett replied by declaring that he was in the hands of the audience and was going to continue.

He admitted that he had turned his coat, but attempted to justify it by declaring that Mr. Phinney had done the same thing. He denied having voted for the increased indemnity but would have done so had he been in his place in the House at the time. He also denied that he had ever stated that the Eastern section of the G. T. would never be built.

Mr. Brown here arose in his place and protested against Mr. Crockett prolonging his speech beyond the allotted time. He pointed out that it was a Liberal meeting, he had waived his right to reply in favor of Mr. Crockett, and he should be satisfied with that.

Mr. Crockett went on to say that Mr. Brown had talked one and a half hours, but was compelled to correct this statement by a man in the audience. The hub-bub continued for several minutes, and when the audience, many of whom had been standing for three hours, began to surge towards the door, Major Howe took a hand in the discussion. He told Mr. Crockett that he was injuring himself and had better sit down, and Mr. Crockett accepted his advice.

The greatest political meeting ever held in Stanley was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem, led by Candidate Brown.

There was a few Fredericton and Marysville people in attendance at the meeting, including Mr. Alex. Gibson, ex-M. P., who occupied a seat on the platform, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Hatt, and Dr. and Mrs. W. C. Crockett.

It is most creditable to the people of Stanley that the very best of order was maintained throughout the meeting, and both candidates received an attentive hearing. The Liberals of Stanley are more than delighted with the creditable showing made by Mr. Brown.

FOUND DROWNED.

Body of Indian Woman in a Creek at Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 12.—(Special)—The body of an Indian woman who has been identified as Mary Campbell, was found in Muggah's Creek this morning about 11.30.

The remains were seen floating near the shore opposite the blooming mill of the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. by an engineer who hauled the body ashore.

It is thought that the woman probably fell over the bridge while intoxicated. She was about 33 years of age.

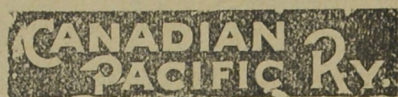
