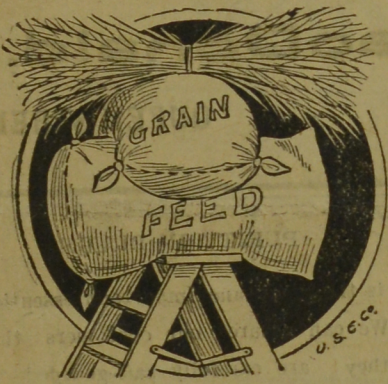

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BATTLEFIELDS' BILL GIVEN 3RD READING

Plan for National Park and Celebration Discussed by Commons

Ottawa, March 8.—In committee on the Quebec Battlefields Bill, Hon. Mr. Foster raised the question as to what was to be done with regard to the Ross rifle factory, which occupies a part of the ground. He also requested considerable information as to how the factory came to be located on that spot.

Sir Frederick Borden said his recollection was that the proximity of the Dominion Arsenal to the Ross rifle factory, and testing place for cartridges being adjacent to the establishment and had influence in the location of the factory. Sir Charles Ross had had offers to put his factory in other parts of the Dominion, but as good land was given by the government at the place stated, it was thought better, in consideration of this and for the other reasons named, to have it where it is now.

The factory occupied about nineteen acres. No additional land had been granted since the lease had been entered into, and there was no intention of granting more.

SHOULD KEEP FACTORY IN QUEBEC.

Mr. Laverge (Montmagny) thought the people of Quebec were entitled to assurance that if the Ross rifle factory was removed from the present site, it should be located somewhere else in the city.

Sir Frederick Borden said the government would prefer that the factory should remain in Quebec. His view was that the ground just outside of the city should be secured and the arsenal and factory located there.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier pointed out that the discussion was premature. The bill before the House was for the appointment of a commission to plan a scheme in connection with the reclamation of the battlefields and to determine what property had to be acquired. All the other matters could be discussed when the commission made its report. Nothing could be done by the commission until it had made its plans and submitted them to Parliament.

Mr. Laverge declared that no fighting took place on the Ross rifle factory ground. The battle of the Plains of Abraham was fought on the land now covered by residences.

Dr. Sproule suggested that the appropriation of \$300,000 asked for was intended to cover up a much greater sum which would be required to re-occupy Sir Charles Ross.

Mr. Robitaille said the extent of the work undertaken would depend on the amount of subscriptions. He did not think it would be necessary to remove the Ross factory.

NO PRECEDENT FOR BILL.

Mr. Henderson said the bill was a very extraordinary measure for which there was no precedent. Parliament had no mandate from the people to appropriate \$300,000 to be thrown away in powder, and to make a big blowout to please the citizens of Quebec. He failed to see why Vancouver, Victoria, Winnipeg, Toronto and other cities should be called upon to contribute to a celebration for the benefit of Quebec.

Mr. George Taylor thought they should give the Prince of Wales a fitting reception but stop there.

Mr. Schaffner wanted to know to what expenditure the commission could commit the country.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier—"Not a dollar. The commission can make a report, but is not authorized to spend a dollar that has not been approved by Parliament."

Mr. Laverge desired the commission to be composed exclusively of Canadians.

Mr. Blain declared himself opposed to the bill on the ground that it was hasty legislation.

Dr. Barr felt it his duty to vote against it because he considered it was likely to lead to heavy expenditure.

COL. HUGHES ENDORSED EARLY.

Mr. Maclean said he intended to vote for the measure because it was a proposition for commemorating the deeds of Chaplain, the great hero of Canada, secondly because he believed the people would like to reclaim the battlefields. Col. Sam Hughes expressed himself favorable to the measure and vote of \$300,000.

The committee rose, and reported progress, and a third reading was proposed. Mr. Lennox objected, fearing the preamble committed the country to acquiring and reclaiming battlefields which might be found to be an erroneous undertaking. He asked that the bill stand over until the next sitting.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier urged the third reading. The commissioners would not have a single moment to lose in order to do their part in perfecting the celebration of the tercentenary and the reception to the Prince. He again pointed out that the commission would report on the scheme for reclamation, and it would be the privilege of Parliament to decide whether it should be adopted or not. If it was found that it was going to involve tremendous cost he would not be in favor of it, laudable as the idea might be. Mr. Foster has no objection, his idea being that he did not commit Parliament except in the manner stated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

A CANADIAN COMMISSION.

Mr. Laverge wanted the measure amended so that even if the United Kingdom or any of the colonies contributed to the amount, they should have no representation on the commission. The project was purely a Canadian one and should be carried out by Canadians. The amendment was lost. After a technical objection by Dr. Sproule had been disposed of and Sir Wilfrid Laurier had again moved the third reading, a backbencher on the Opposition side demanded yeas and nays.

The vote was 90 to 11.

JEFFRIES BEAT FITZ TWICE

Big Boilermaker's Yellow Streak and how his Manager Fixed it before he went into Game with the Speckled one

"Not many persons know it, but Jim Jeffries licked Bob Fitzsimmons twice at Coney Island, and did a good job both times," declared W. A. Brady when attending a dinner of the Thirteen Club in Manhattan recently. "I know he did it, because I saw both scraps from beginning to end, and if Fitzsimmons does not verify what I said I'll buy the dinner, cherry and all trimmings, any time and any place you indicate," he continued.

"It is a great story, and shows the necessity for brains when in a tight place," he went on. "But it is too good a story to keep any longer. I'll have to let you in on the secret, for it has been a secret."

ALL FIGHTERS HAVE YELLOW.

"You may not know it, but all fighters, those even in the championship class, have a wide streak of ochre running from the roots of the hair to the end of the spine, and then it branches off like a divided shirt and continues down both legs to the heel, and defies ordinary treatment to efface from the system. I ought to know, for I have been up against such things for years, and part of the money I have made has come easy because I have always been lucky in treating the affected parts so as to eliminate the bad effect of such a taint. "They have it, big and little fighters alike. No one is too gigantic not to be overcome with the fear of a single punch that will end his money making career as a fighter. "Jeffries was the greatest fighter that ever lived. He was the strongest man that ever donned gloves in a ring, and he had the widest streak down his back that I have ever seen. He was terribly afraid of Fitzsimmons, and cried before it was time to enter the ring, and did everything possible to seek an excuse to dodge the fight. He was afraid he was going to be licked, and I knew that Martin Julian was having the same kind of a battle with Fitzsimmons in an adjoining room in the building where the fighters were awaiting the signal to enter the ring."

JEFFRIES IN BLUE FUNK.

"My man was lying on a cot in the pavilion. You never saw such a sight in your life. There he was just as weak as a child from fear, and

the greatest development of muscles in evidence that you ever saw. He was trained to the minute, and the finest specimen of physical perfection I ever looked upon, but almost a mental wreck. "In accordance with our agreement, and I must say that Jeffries would do exactly as he was told, he raised a row about hitting in clinches. This gave me a chance to go to Julian and try to get together on it. I ended the matter by saying to Martin: 'These men are the ones who are to fight tonight; let them settle it themselves. Jeffries is in his dressing room. Let Fitzsimmons go in and talk it over. Whatever they say goes.'"

FITZSIMMONS FALLS INTO RUSE

"Julian fell for the bait and agreed. Fitzsimmons came into the dressing room to meet Jeffries. Oh what a sight it was. There he was, the biggest fighter that ever lived, not a stitch of clothes on him, and the muscles of his stomach and breast staring out like the limbs of an ordinary man. Fitzsimmons looked sick at once. I saw it, and before the argument had gone far Jeffries leaped up from his resting board, punched Fitzsimmons on the jaw, and sent him sprawling to the floor, over the screen, down and out for count."

"Of course, Jeffries won the fight. He went into the ring and pounded the life out of Fitzsimmons because the speckled one had been scared to death first by the sight of such a physical giant, and second by the punch. To add to this there was the screen. I never told Jeffries about the job I put up. He thought it was the superstition about the screen that enabled him to lick Fitzsimmons so easily, but it is all the game."

MUTINY IN A JAIL.

Hundred and Fifty Prisoners Attempted to Escape.

TRENTON, N. J., March 9.—One hundred and fifty prisoners in the Mercer county jail became unruly and attempted a general delivery last night, which was prevented by a riot call, bringing the entire police force of the city to help the Deputy Sheriff subdue the mutiny.

The jail has been very much overcrowded for some time, and the quantity of food served has not been adequate, it is said. The prisoners were excited also because Judge Reish meted out severe sentences to a lot of prisoners this afternoon. When supper was served tonight the minor prisoners were at liberty in the corridors, and they at once began rioting. They broke everything they could in the jail, and tried to batter down doors. The ringleaders have now been locked in cells and both police and Deputy Sheriffs are on guard inside the jail.

INFUSION OF BLOOD.

Effort to Save Mason Lant's Life at St. Thomas.

ST. THOMAS, March 9.—Mason Lant, a Michigan Central brakeman and a former well known lacrosse and hockey player here and at Cornwall, his old home, lying at the point of death in the hospital as a result of having inhaled gas fumes from a coal heater in his home. Lant and his wife lay in the house inhaling gas from Wednesday night until last night, when neighbors became alarmed and forced the door. Mrs. Lant has partially recovered and will be all right in a day or two but Lant's chances of recovery are very slight. The couple have only been married since New Year's.

This afternoon in an effort to save Lant's life the doctors performed a transfusion. W. A. Dixon, a local baker and a hockey team mate of Lant allowed one of the arteries of his arm to be cut, while twenty ounces of blood were transferred through a similar cut in an artery on Lant's arm. This operation is expected to save Lant's life.
