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DR. DAY MUST ANSWER.

Charged With Speaking Evil of President Roosevelt.

BRANDON, March 9.—Charges have been preferred by Rev. George Cook pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Brandon, against the Rev. J. R. Day, LL. D., Chancellor of Syracuse University, on the ground that Dr. Day defamed the character of President Roosevelt. The charges have been presented to Rev. P. M. Watters, D. D., presiding elder of the New York Conference of the Methodist Church, to which Chancellor Day is ecclesiastically attached. When interviewed to-night concerning the allegations Rev. Mr. Cook said it was true he had brought charges against Chancellor Day. He said that in a book entitled "A Raid on Prosperity" written by Chancellor Day, President Roosevelt was severely criticized and that in his opinion Dr. Day had violated the rules of the Methodist Church in thus assailing the President. It is stated that Dr. Day is charged with having spoken "evil of Magistrates" in violation of the rules of the Methodist Church, which warn against "uncharitable or unprofitable conversation," particularly speaking evil of magistrates or of ministers.

A BOGUS CLERGYMAN.

His Efforts to Become Ordained in England.

LONDON, March 9.—Amazing attempts to hoax the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Southwark, were alleged at the West London Police court last week to have been made by William Tyler, aged 22, a stationer, of Holland road, Kensington. It was also stated that Tyler went to a country church in clerical clothes, helped to conduct services, and preached a sermon.

Mr. Arthur Gill, who prosecuted, said Tyler had been for some time making the most extraordinary efforts to secure ordination for the purpose of becoming a missionary to the colonies.

"In July, 1906," he declared, "the Rev. A. J. Pitkin, curate-in-charge of the parish of Aldbourne, in Wiltshire, advertised for a locum tenens. A reply was received from a person signing himself as the Rev. E. W. T. Greenshield, and stating that he was on a holiday from Canada, where he was a missionary."

"After some correspondence, the applicant stated in clerical attire at Aldbourne on Sunday, August 5, and gave a very full description of himself. He took part in the services, preached a sermon in the evening, and left with a guinea fee and 10s for expenses. In June 1905, Tyler made an attempt to procure ordination at the hands of the Archbishop of Canterbury."

For the purpose of procuring his ordination he wrote a letter in the name of the Rev. W. G. White, acting commissary to the Bishop of Mooseonee and Q'Appelle, recommending Mr. Tyler as a suitable person for ordination.

It appeared that Tyler wished to be ordained for the colonies generally, and after some demur the Archbishop was willing to comply with that desire. Steps were taken to fulfill the necessary legal formalities, but the ordination was eventually postponed because they would not be complied with in time.

Tyler made similar attempts to deceive the Bishops of Southwark and London by means of forged letters in order to procure ordination, but was detected.

CANNOT FIND THE CHIEF WITNESS.

Hitch in McGraw Murder Trial Caused by Failure of Mrs. Slater and Others to Appear.

THREE RIVERS, Que., March 9.—The McGraw case was resumed here yesterday, Messrs. Greenshields, Laflamme, Desy and Blondin appeared for the defence, and Messrs. Tourigny and Wilson for the Crown.

Many important witnesses failed to answer to their names. Mrs. Slater cannot be found. Because of the absence of the most important witnesses, Mr. Wilson demanded an adjournment for fifteen days. Mr. Greenshields objected and the judge adjourned the court in order to give the counsel time to arrive at an understanding.

McGraw seems to take a lively interest in proceedings.

At yesterday afternoon's sitting of the court, Mr. Wilson for the Crown,

and Mr. Greenshields for the defence, continued the argument relative to the postponing of the trial of McGraw. On the assurance by the Crown side that trial would certainly come off this term, the case was adjourned to Monday, the 23rd.

Alma Massicotte, accused of infanticide, was then called to the prisoner's box and the charge read to her. She is a delicate looking young woman of about eighteen years of age. Shaking with sobs, she pleaded not guilty to the charge.

FAMOUS DERBY WINNER'S END

The Noted Persimmon Ended His Days Tragically.

Like several of his predecessors as winners of the Derby, Persimmon has ended his days tragically. It is not long since Donovan, who won the Blue Riband for the Duke of Portland in 1880 dashed into a tree while running loose in his paddock, and so seriously injured his head that he had to be destroyed. Silvio, the winner of 1879, died while crossing the Atlantic, a fate which also befell Blue Gown, the hero of two years earlier. Kisher ended his days in exile in Hungary, and George Finnerick spent his latter days signifying on a Canadian farm. Hermit, the sensational winner of 1871, the year also lived to a good old age, and his skeleton, we fancy, still survives in the Royal Veterinary College, Camden Town, and the "Flying Amato" lies buried in the beautiful grounds of The Durdans, Lord Rosebery's Epson seat.
