

THE CIVIC ELECTIONS.

**Business Men's Ticket Elected With One Exception---
City gets a Representative and Capable Board.**

The civic elections on Monday resulted quite satisfactorily to those who have been giving some attention to securing a higher degree of intelligence and business ability at the civic board.

The business men's ticket with the exception of Mr. Shea, were elected and this included Mayor Chestnut and two of the old council Ald. Hooper and Ald. Everett.

The first two in each contested ward are elected.

Ald. Jewett was the only member of the old council offering for re-election and not on the business men's ticket who was successful. Those who were defeated were Ald. O'Connell, Ald. Dougherty, Ald. Kelly, Ald. Moore, Ald. Morris, Ald. Johnson and Ald. Scott did not offer for re-election. To summarize, three of the former council were re-elected four who offered for re-election were defeated and three did not run again.

The new men at the board are Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Kitchen, Ald. Farrell,

Ald. Walker, Ald. Crowe, Ald. Winslow and Ald. Clarke and of this number Walker, Clarke and Mitchell were members of former councils. The entirely new men are Kitchen, Winslow, Farrell and Crowe.

THE SPEECHES.

After the result of the elections had been announced by the city clerk, addresses were delivered by Aldermen-elect Clarke, Mitchell, Kitchen and Walker. The first three gentlemen briefly thanked the electors who had voted for them and promised to use their best judgment in dealing with the affairs of the city during the coming year.

Ald. Walker said that he would do the confidence reposed in him by asking him to take his seat by acclamation. He said Carleton Ward had in past years had been represented by a gentleman of ability and integrity. He referred to ex-Ald. Patrick Farrell and paid a warm tribute to that gentleman's work at the council board.

Ald. Walker said that he would do his best in the interests of the city, as he had done when at the board in past years.

A great many questions of importance may arise this year. He would like to see the mode of holding civic elections changed and the ballot be more secret and on a line with the recent local elections.

Referring to industries Mr. Walker spoke of the Chestnut Canoe factory, Hartt Boot and Shoe factory, John Palmer, The Scotts, Morrison and other establishments which were of a benefit to the city and stated that he was in favor of giving reasonable encouragement to outside capitalists to locate here. He would also support in so far as was reasonable the rebuilding of the Aberdeen Mill.

He referred to our pure water and good sewerage system and to the natural advantages of Fredericton.

In conclusion Ald. Walker promised his careful attention to all matters coming before the city.

STRONGLY OPPOSED.

Residents of Banff Protest Against Sanitarium for Consumptives in National Park.

BANFF, Alta., March 10.—(Special)—The proposal to establish a hospital for consumptives within the bounds of the National Park resulted in the calling of a public meeting to consider the matter, and after the discussion of the proposal by a very representative meeting, a strong condemnatory resolution was passed without a dissenting voice.

The resolution took the ground that the establishment of such an institution in the National Park would create an aversion to tourists and hurt the park for that which it is intended. It was also suggested that the proposed hospital be located in the foothills in the vicinity of Calgary, where the climate is just as suitable for the cure of consumption.

HOCKEY PLAYERS. RECEIPT

The members of the Capital Hockey team arrived home last evening from their trip to Halifax and were met at the train by a large number of hockey fans, as well as many hundred citizens. Two large sleighs were in waiting, one of which the boys boarded, and the other was occupied by the Fredericton Brass Band. The rigs, followed by a large number of citizens proceeded out York street and down Queen street to the Waverley Hotel, where after the boys had been heartily cheered, the crowd disbanded.

The Amherst Ramblers will arrive here tomorrow morning, and in the evening will play the Capitals at the Arctic rink for the Starr trophy. The Ramblers are the Nova Scotia champions and have an unbroken record of victories this season in the league. The game tomorrow night promises to be one of the fastest ever seen in this city. It is likely that Mr. Seymour McKenzie of Truro, N. S., will officiate as referee. The same teams will meet here on Friday evening, and if each has a win, the final game will be played on Monday evening.

DR. CAMPBELL DEAD.

Well Known Travelling Dentist Passes Away at Private Hospital.

Dr. Alexander Campbell, a well known travelling dentist died at the Richards private hospital this morning after some weeks illness from la grippe and complications. The late Dr. Campbell came to this county from Shediac about thirty years ago and has since made his headquarters at Keswick Ridge. He practised his profession in the up river parishes, where he had many friends, who will regret to learn of his death.

The deceased was about sixty-five years of age, and is survived by one daughter, who resides in Ontario. Dr. Campbell was a member of the Harvey Court of Foresters and the secretary of the court will arrive here this evening to arrange for the funeral.

Dr. Campbell resided at Shediac at the time of the famous McCarthy-Osborne murder and was a witness in connection with that celebrated trial.

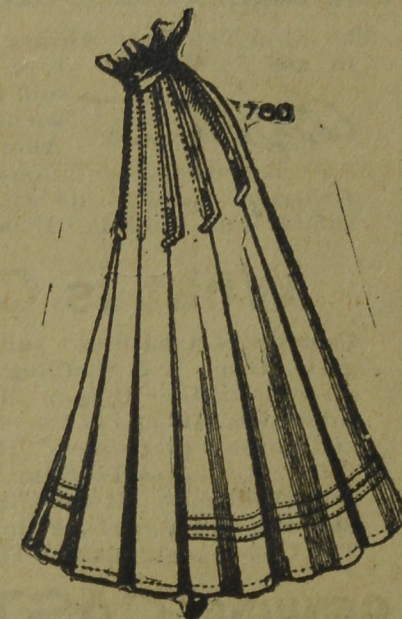
