UNIVERSITY OF N. B.

Chancellor Jones Anticipates a Most Successful Year.

That the University of New Brunswick will next month begin one of the most successful years in its existence is the opinion of its chancellor Dr. C. C. Jones.

With its faculty increased and of exceptional strength its student body strong numerically and its financial condition excellent. Dr. Jones is of the opinion that the provincial college will make rapid strides.

Speaking of the department of philosophy said that in Dr. Kierstead, who assumes the chair of philosophy this year, the U. N. B. had secured a man most eminently fitted for the position. In the past under the late Dr. Davidson and under Dr. M. S. MacDonald, who goes this year to McGill, the philosophical department had been of exceptional strength and, said Dr. Jones, there was every prospect of Dr. Kierstead maintaining the high standard, if not raising it.

Dealing with the department of forestry which is to be inaugurated at the U. N. B. this year, the chancellor said that Prof. R. M. Miller, who would take charge of the new course, came to New Brunswick most highly recommended not only by persons in the United States but also by those connected with the Dominion Department of Forestry at Ottawa. Besides theoretical training the students in forestry will receive practical instruction. At present is not known what form this will take, but it is probable that it will be several weeks work in the lumber woods during the winter.

As already announced Chancellor Jones has received an offer from the manager of the Miramichi Lumber Company, Charles E. Oak, to have the forestry students spend several weeks in the company's camps.

The establishment of the department of forestry at the provincial university has made necessary the removal of the students' reading room from the arts building. For its accommodation an addition has been built to the gymnasium.

The departure of Prof. Perrott to take a position in the Technical College at Liverpool left vacant the deanship of the engineering school, but the position has been filled by the appointment of Prof. Stone formerly of Lethbridge University. U. N. B. has now two full professors of engineering as Prof. Stephens has been made professor of mechanical engineering and drawing. The science department have been considerably strengthened during the past year, new machinery having been purchased for the electrical department and new apparatus for the laboratory.

The fees for the forestry course are to be the same as for engineering. Already five men have expressed the intention of taking the course.

When asked if there was any intention of adding to the arts faculty of the college, Dr. Jones said the establishment of a chair of history was contemplated and as the yearly revenue of the institution exceeded the expenditure, the chair might become a fact before a great while.

Prof. Stone will be in Fredericton on September 3rd to arrange concerning engineering camps.
