AGAIN A WINNER.

Earle R. Macnutt for a Second Successive Year Captures Daughters of Empire Prize for Best Essay of High School Students.

The annual prize of \$5 in gold offered by the Daughters of the Empire for the best essay on a subject chosen by them, and open for competition among all the students of the Fredericton High school, has been won for a second successive time by Master Earle R. Macnutt, son of Mr. L. C. Macnutt.

The committee to examine the essays, thirty-seven in number, consisted of Judge Wilson, Dr. Jones, Chancellor of the University, and Prof. H. H. Hagerman of the Normal school staff, and their award was unanimous.

The subject of the essay was "General Gordon," and it was not to exceed 2500 words.

Last year Master Macnutt won the prize with his essay on "The Life and Times of Hon. L. A. Wilnot," against a large number of competitors.

The winner is one of this year's graduating class at the High school, and will enter the University next term for the Arts course.
