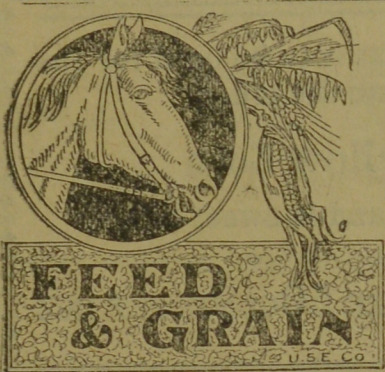

PREMIER GOUIN PROUD

Speaks of the Great Liberal Triumph in Quebec Provincial Elections.

Montreal Herald.—Hon. Lomer Gouin, Premier of the Liberal administration, had sometimes little hope of success. Yesterday he said: "The Liberal party will take this overwhelming vote of the electors indication of the popular will as a of Quebec, sat in his office at the complete endorsement to go ahead Court House Annex early this morning, tired and very hoarse still, but pleased and triumphant and making plans for the future work of his government. The only other member of the government who reached town during the morning was Hon. C. R. Devlin who came to town as soon as the enthusiasm of the citizens of Quebec would let him escape from the triumphal processions and illuminations.

"I am thoroughly satisfied and delighted with the results of yesterday's poll," said Mr. Gouin. "They show that the Liberal administration possesses the complete confidence and sympathy of the people of the province. At the last elections there was absolutely no organized opposition, and the Conservatives came to Quebec only seven strong. This year we have had to face a strong and well organized opposition all over the province, and as a result the most that Opposition can count upon is fifteen seats. No government could ask for a more complete endorsement."

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METHODIST CONFERENCE

Annual Meeting Opens Next Week at Moncton.

(Moncton Transcript)

There will not be a very large number of changes this year among the provincial Methodist clergymen as the result of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference which is to be held in Moncton next week. The change in the term of service made last year is now noticeable in that many ministers have been invited to remain in their churches for another year. There are only two who are giving up their pulpits to engage in other branches of the work. Dr. Howard Sprague, who goes to Mount Allison, and who will be succeeded by Dr. Flanders, and Rev. Thomas Marshall, of Grace church, Charlottetown, who will look after mission organization. Grace church has accepted an invitation to Rev. William Harrison, now stationed in P. E. I., and this has been accepted subject to the approval of conference.

These are the only two invitations in the who conference which have been extended to ministers and which will necessitate changes. There have been many requests from congregations to their own pastors asking them to remain for another year.

There are some churches in which the clergymen have not been invited to remain, the majority of these instances arising from the circumstance that under the regulations, the full term of service having expired, no extensions can be permitted, and these churches have not asked any new men to come to them but have left the matter in the hands of conference. The churches which will thus become vacant and which have not taken any steps to secure ministers, are Grand Lake, Petticoat, Point de Bute, Albert, Green Mt., Springfield, Wellsford, Stanley, Cornwall, Trigon, Little York and Murray Harbor.

MID-SUMMER MEET

Two Days Horse Racing Promised for August 5th and 6th.

The directors of the Fredericton Park Association at meeting Tuesday evening decided to hold a big race meeting in this city on Wednesday and Thursday, August 5th and 6th.

There will be four events in all for purses aggregating \$1,500, of which amount about \$300 has been pledged by citizens. A 218 class and a 222 stake race will be run off on the first day, and on the second day the events will be a 215 class and a 220 stake race. For the last named event the purse will be \$500, and for the others it will be \$100.

No pains will be spared to make the meet one of the most successful in the history of the city. Entry blanks will be sent out immediately, and a ready response is expected from the owners of fast ones in the Maritime provinces and Maine.

A CONTEST OF MUCH INTEREST.

Orator William McIntosh, of the Natural History Society, St. John, will superintend the School Children's Competition, at the Exhibition in that City, this fall, between September 12 and 19.

The prizes have been decided upon, and all particulars of this interesting part of the show are contained in a small leaflet, which may be had for the asking.

Five dollars as a first, and three dollars as a second prize, are offered to the schools in each county sending in the best collection of plants found growing in the fields or woods of the province which will include grasses and wild fruits in blossom, medicinal plants and weeds.

Then ten and five dollars are the two prizes open to the schools of the province for the two other best collections of minerals and insects. Teachers who aim to get their pupils interested in these contests, should send for the information leaflets as soon as possible. They can be obtained from R. H. Arnold, Manager of the Exhibition. Vacation days are near, and the work of preparation will be pleasant employment for idle moments.
