SLAUGHTERING CATTLE.

Valuable Herd Suffering from Foot and Mouth Disease destroyed at Niagara Falls.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 5.—A trench 175 feet long and ten feet wide has been dug, and the cows are buried as soon as killed and covered in quick lime. This is the largest slaughter of diseased cattle since the quarantine was established. An order was issued yesterday afternoon prohibiting the entry of automobiles into Canada from the United States by way of the bridges.

ONLY FOUR PROTESTS.

Petitions Filed against two Liberals and two Conservatives in New Brunswick.

This is the last day for protesting the election of members returned at the general election on October 26th, to serve in the House of Commons of Canada, and several members of parliament and their solicitors have been busy this morning to arrange a saw-off.

Dr. J. W. Daniel, M. P. for St. John city, is a guest at the Barker house, and Col. H. H. McLean, M. P. for Sunbury-Queens, is stopping at the Queen. Dr. Allan O. Earle, C. S. F. Sanford and J. D. Pollard Lewis, barristers of St. John, and W. B. Jonah of Sussex, law partner of Mr. George W. Fowler, ex-M. P. for King's-Albert, are also here in connection with election petitions.

A conference was held by the parties this morning with a view to having all the petitions declared off, and it is understood that all were willing to enter into an arrangement of that kind with the exception of Mr. Jonah, who claims that he has orders not to saw off, under any consideration. The stubborn attitude of Mr. Jonah is said to have been very displeasing to Messrs. Daniel and Crockett, Tory M. P.'s, and they have been keeping the wits hot between Fredericton and Sussex. Mr. J. H. Crockett has also been taking a hand in the negotiations with a view of bringing about a saw-off to save his brother.

At noon it was stated that the Liberals had prepared petitions against Messrs. Daniel and Crockett, and the Tories were ready to protest the election of Hon. Dr. Pugsley in St. John, Mr. Carvell in Carleton, Dr. McAllister in King's-Albert and Col. McLean in Sunbury-Queens.

One of the legal gentlemen interested, when seen at noon, said that Mr. Jonah was the only kicker, and it was up to Messrs. Crockett and Daniel to whip him into line. "We will be content," he added, "to accept whatever decision is arrived at."

Under an order-in-council the office of the clerk of the pleas is supposed to close at one o'clock on Saturday afternoon, but as no petitions were

filed at one o'clock Mr. Allen announced that he would keep his office open until four today.

At three o'clock there was no material change in the protest situation. At that hour Messrs. C. F. Sanford and Peter J. Hughes, with petitions against Dr. Daniel and Mr. O. S. Crockett, and each with \$1,000 in his pocket, were holding the fort at the Clerk of the Pleas' office. Upon enquiry it was learned that the other parties were in an office up town knocking their heels together in a strenuous effort to whip Mr. Geo. W. Fowler into line over the telephone. Mr. Fowler has taken the bit in his mouth and announces that he is determined to protest the election of Dr. McAllister. Hon. J. D. Hazen and Mr. W. H. Thorne have been called upon to mediate, and went out to Sussex from St. John this morning. They succeeded in locating Mr. Fowler, but at last accounts he had refused to capitulate. Messrs. Daniel and Crockett are becoming desperate, and have given Mr. Fowler to understand that if he does not consent to a saw-off he is off their books for all time to come. At the time of writing the situation is decidedly interesting. Mr. Allen announced that he will remain in his office until four o'clock, and will take all the petitions that come his way.

FOUR PETITIONS FILED

Just at four o'clock four protests were filed as follows:

Against O. S. Crockett of York, William Graham of Douglas, petitioner.

Against Dr. Daniel, of St. John, J. D. Pollard Lewis, petitioner.

Against Dr. McAllister of King's-Albert, Geo. W. Fowler petitioner.

Against Hon. Dr. Pugsley, of St. John city and county, Milton Price, petitioner.

Col. McLean and Mr. Carvell escaped unexpectedly.

QUEBEC PROTESTS.

At least Thirty-five are likely to be filed. Efforts at saw-offs have apparently failed.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—(Special)—There are likely to be about thirty-five protests entered in this province today.

Only five are reported so far and all in the Quebec district, Bellechasse, Rimouski, Montmagny, Quebec Co., and Lotbiniere.

For the past two days the Hon. L. P. Brodeur has been in conference with F. D. Monk to try and come to some agreement.

Last night there was every hope of an agreement but Ames came into the discussion. This caused ill-feelings between Monk and Ames and the

former withdrew and the whole affair went back to the beginning again.

Owing to the unsettled state of affairs, it is likely that both parties will enter today protests right and left, and that when they are called, many of them will put in no appearance.

In Montreal it is not certain what will be done yet, but St. Anns, St. Antoine and St. Lawrence are likely to be protested at the last moment.

Parties have up to 5 p. m. to file their protests.

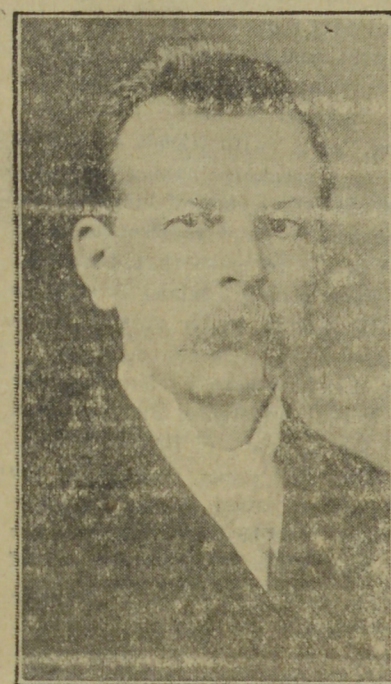

MAY BE TROUBLE.

DR. SMITH'S INDUCTION

New Pastor of St. Paul's Church formally installed in Office-Interesting Service and Addresses.

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith, the new pastor of St. Paul's church, was inducted last evening in the presence of a large congregation. Rev. Gordon Dickie, moderator of the St. John Presbytery, presided over the gathering; the charge to the pastor was delivered by Rev. David Lang of St. Andrew's church, St. John, and Rev. J. J. McCaskill of St. Mathews church, St. John addressed the people. The whole ceremony was carried out without a hitch and was much enjoyed by the congregation.

The meeting opened with the singing of Psalm 52 by the choir after which the moderator read a scriptural lesson, and offered prayer.

Rev. Mr. Dickie briefly addressed the gathering referring to the unanimous call extended to Rev. Dr. Smith by St. Paul's on October 22, and his acceptance of the same. He warmly congratulated the minister and hoped that his labors among the people of St. Paul's would be crowned with success. He then called Rev. Dr. Smith to the front and read to him the questions of induction which he answered in the affirmative, after which the moderator said: "In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and on behalf of the St. John Presbytery I induct you as pastor of St. Paul's church."

This concluded the induction ceremony and clergymen present including the moderator, and Rev. Messrs Lang, James Ross, McCaskill and Anderson of St. John, Mowatt of Nashua, and McLean of Chatham stepped forward and shook hands with Dr. Smith.

MR. LANG'S ADDRESS.

Rev. David Lang, who was introduced as the patriarch among the Presbyterian clergymen of St. John, was called upon to deliver the charge of the new minister and acquitted himself in a manner most satisfactory to all. He is a most eloquent speaker and his timely words made a most marked impression upon the congregation. He thought that the fact that Rev. Dr. Smith had received such a hearty call from the congregation of St. Paul's reflected credit upon his work in his last charge. He went on to say that in his new charge a great responsibility rested upon him as his work would bring him into contact with the students of the University and Normal School as well as with the law makers of the province, and he would have a chance to exert a great influence upon the lives of the people. Ministers of Jesus Christ should not forget the great privilege which belongs to them. They should so to it that their message to the people

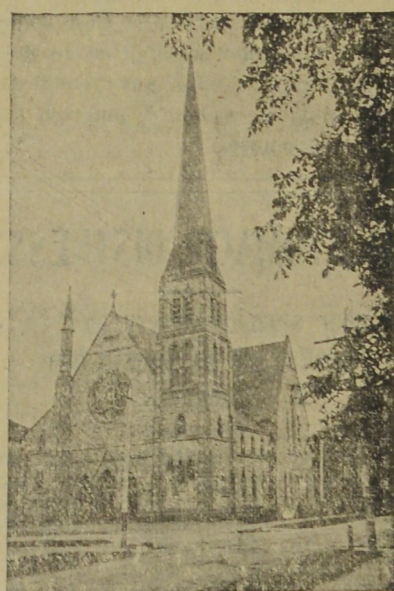
is broad and touches every feature of life. Forcefulness and earnestness are necessary to make the people realize that ministers are the real ambassadors of Jesus Christ. If a man is to do his work as he should do it he must recognize that he is a mere voice through which God works. He must not go through the world in a spirit of fear and cowardice, but must recognize that he is carrying out the will of God. There must be a destructive element in his preaching

as well as a constructive element, and he must not fail to denounce evils in the community. The minister must become the close friend of those among whom he labors. He will always find some members of the congregation unreasonable in their demands, some who will expect more from him than any one man can accomplish, but this should not deter him. A successful politician had told him a few days ago, how he had engaged a man to go through his constituency and take the names of every family, so that when he visited the home he would be in a position to talk about the character and whereabouts of everyone belonging to that household. He believed that it would be a good plan for a minister to adopt some such scheme as this in his work.

Rev. Mr. Lang in closing expressed himself as being strongly in favor of a minister taking an interest in the physical life. He believed that a minister should play a game of golf or curling once in a while, and there was no doubt he would find it beneficial. Above all things, however, the minister must stand for the spiritual life.

MR. MCCASKILL'S ADDRESS.

Rev. J. J. McCaskill delivered an able address to the congregation

which was followed with the closest attention. He had an excellent definition of Christianity, and spoke of the great need of strong men and women, who would stand and walk erect. There was need, he said, of men of character, men with the Kingdom of God in their hearts. He felt that the work of the pastor would be hampered unless his people joined with him in the right spirit. He congratulated Rev. Dr. Smith and expressed the hope that his ministrations would be crowned with success.

The meeting closed with the singing of Hymn No. 576 followed by the benediction pronounced by Rev. Gordon Dickie.

At the close of the service the new pastor was presented to the members of the congregation by Messrs. T. G. Loggie and S. H. MacFarlane.
