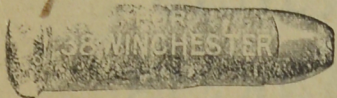

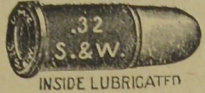

USED DYNAMITE STICK FOR BALL.

When Explosive Went Off—One Child Lost Three Fingers, Other Escaped With Minor Injuries.

QUEBEC, Dec. 4.—Not knowing what they were playing with, two seven-year-old sons of Mr. Rodolphe and Napoleon Couture, Ste. Claire, Dorchester county, tossed a stick of dynamite back and forth during a snowball battle. When it exploded the children were thrown many feet away and were all covered with blood when rescued by their mothers. The doctors found that one of the boys had received only minor wounds, while the other had lost three fingers and was severely burned about one leg.

It is supposed the dynamite came from the G. T. P. construction work at St. Malachie, a few miles from Ste. Claire, but it has not been explained how it came in the hands of the children.

OLD MOORE'S ALMANAC.

Seer Prophecies That Death Will Be Heavy on Nobility.

"Moore's Almanac," described as the "original edition — 212th year," is out betimes for 1909, and is as full of omens as ever. First, it gloats over the fulfilled predictions of the 211th issue, pointing out "how excellent they were." The prediction "that the Government was in danger of defeat" is held to have been justified amply by the loss of three seats at bye-elections. In regard to the assassination of the King of Portugal, the seer points out that he predicted that "Portugal will suffer from the position of Saturn and Mars," and that "a crisis of some magnitude" was threatened in that country. He also reminds his readers that "the Mile-end trial early in August is again referred to (page 25), where it was prophesied that 'matters to do with workhouses' will occupy public attention."

So much for the past; what of the coming year? In the winter quarter, we are told, "the affliction of the sun is bad for royalty and the ruling powers, and death will lay its icy hand on many of high position in the land. A noted cleric or scientist will pass away." In America and Germany trouble is foretold, and in Persia "Mars will be culminating, which points to dangers to the Shah."

The astrological signs in March portend "much distress and poverty in the land," and yet "the revenue will be in a good state," and a reduction of taxation will be made. At this period the death of a great statesman or general is foreshadowed, but when the sun enters Cancer on June 22 the conjunctions are expected to be ominous for trade and the revenue, and to point to disturbances, bank failures and panics on "change."

In September "the affliction of the sun is bad for royalty, and denotes a harassing times for the governing powers." Moreover, we are actually assured that "disputes are to be feared with the colonies." Mars will again be "culminating," and the Emperor of China is warned in this connection to "beware of assassination."

Yet another warning is offered to King Edward in view of the total solar eclipse, which is to occur on Dec. 23, and will "adversely affect both our own land and India, and will cause a heavy death rate among the nobility." The seer solemnly proclaims that "the King of England is warned to take care of his health, as this eclipse falls on the place of Saturn at his birth." Evidently there are evil times ahead of us if the "Vox stellarum" speaks with the ring of truth.

OLD TIMES RECALLED

Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

The river closed Sunday.

Water works pipe laying is suspended till spring.

The headquarters of the Deer Island military company have been transferred to this city, and the company is attached to the 71st Batt. Its officers are H. A. Cropley, Captain; Wm. Russell and J. D. Perkins, subalterns.

Fred Nicols, son of Mr. John Nicols, aged 14, narrowly escaped drowning in the river, opposite Morrison's Mills, yesterday afternoon, while skating. He went into an open place and after struggling for a few minutes was rescued with much difficulty in an exhausted condition by Thomas Ryan, William Grant and Geo. Fraser.

The death of Mrs. Judge Palmer is recorded elsewhere. The deceased lady was a daughter of Andrew Palmer, of Dorchester, and niece of the Hon. Mr. Justice Weldon. Her death was the result of an accident, from which she has suffered since April last, when she fell upon some ice, striking her head.

J. C. McDevitt officiating. Miss Maria Nealis, sister of the bride, and Mr. Thomas Lucy, were bridesmaid and groomsmen, and the bride and her maid were attired in handsome travelling suits of bronze green. After breakfast at the bride's residence, King street, the happy couple left in the morning train for St. John, en route to their home at Newcastle, followed by the good wishes of their friends.

Last Thursday morning about one o'clock, a fire alarm was sounded, when a shed on the exhibition grounds was discovered in flames. It was beyond saving and was burned to the ground. Suspicion of setting the fire resting on two young men they were apprehended on the spot, and conveyed to the lockup.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

A terrible accident occurred on the Intercolonial railway, near Beaver Brook Station, a few miles north of Newcastle, shortly after midnight, Friday, by which three men lost their lives. The particulars briefly are as follows:

The Quebec Express coming south was somewhat delayed by a defective engine, and when within half a mile of Beaver Brook, it became necessary to stop about twenty minutes to get up steam. The express had just started again and gained a speed of about five miles an hour when a special derailed up without any apparent slackening of speed. The train hands on the express shouted warning, and in another instant the special dashed into the rear of the Pullman car. It was a working train and the tender was ahead. There was a great crash, and the hiss of escaping steam, mingled with the cries of startled passengers and the shrieks of the victims of the collision. The tender was driven into the Pullman and smashed into atoms, and the engine wrecked. Buried in the ruins, with escaping steam blistering their flesh, were John Brown of Moncton, driver; Amos Crossman of Canaan, fireman; and James Fraser of Campbellton, brakeman, and their shrieks for help were horrifying. Trainmen and passengers set to work vigorously to extricate the poor fellows. Brown was got out quickly, but it was not until some time that the axemen succeeded in cutting the other two out. Drs. McLearn and Smith of Newcastle, soon arrived at the scene, but their efforts were unavailing to save the lives of the injured men. They were taken to Newcastle, and all three died within a few hours.

The passengers in the Pullman, nine in number, and the officers of the express, had a narrow escape. None of them were much injured. Among the passengers were Judge Wilkinson, Hon. A. A. Davidson, L. J. Tweedie, and John Young. It is the opinion of all that, if the train had not been moving when the collision occurred, all the passengers in the Pullman would have been killed or injured.
