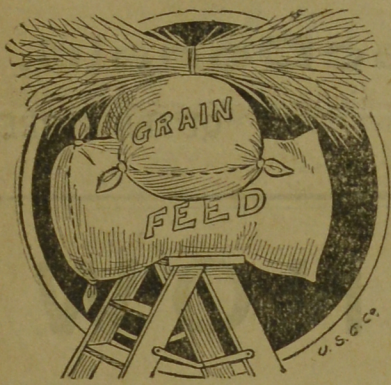

PESOIMISTIC PARSON

Rev. Dr. Campbell Prominent Presbyterian does not think Church Union Practicable

"Church union is quite impossible and impracticable," said Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, ex-moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, in addressing the Montreal Presbytery on the question of Church Union.

The matter was introduced by Rev. Dr. Barclay, who said it was quite time that the committees appointed by the General Assembly to consider the question of Church Union with representatives of the other churches reported to the presbyteries and church sessions the stage at which the negotiations had arrived. The time for them to act had certainly arrived, and some steps should be taken to ascertain the feeling of the whole body of the church whether or not they were in favor of Church Union.

If the feeling was against union it would be much easier and more graceful for the Presbyterian Church to retire from the negotiations now than it would be later on. He moved that the Presbytery ask the committee of the General Assembly to acquaint all presbyteries and church sessions with the present stage of the negotiations and the basis upon which union was proposed.

Principal Scrimger seconded the motion. He did not think it would have been fair for the committee to have sent out a report earlier. The desire of the committee was to have the question of Church Union put into such shape that the people would be able to form a proper judgment. The time had come when the committee could do this. The main basis of union had been settled, though there were one or two legal questions pertaining to the transfer of property that had not been decided.

Mr. Walter Paul said it was not the presbyteries or sessions who would have to settle the matter, but the general body of the people. This was a question upon which they could not afford to have even a small minority. It might be necessary to educate some of the people on the matter, and it would be well to place all information before the churches as soon as possible.

Rev. Dr. Campbell supported the motion. He said it had been a good movement, even if they did not go any further with it. It had increased the respect of the three negotiating churches for one another. It had enlarged the spirit of toleration and enabled them to know one another better.

LOVE ALIKE, NOT THINK ALIKE "While I believe in unity I do not believe in uniformity," said Dr. Campbell. "I do not believe Christ wanted people to think alike."

beautiful shirt has prevailed, whilst the negotiations were being enlarged on, but all has been accomplished that will ever be accomplished. It is a compromise but it is nothing by which the Presbyterian church can be known.

"The Presbyterian church has a system—a historic system—and in that respect our church is quite distinct from the other two. The Congregational Church has no system of doctrines or even a policy. It is in a liquid state, each separate congregation following its own devices."

"In the Wesleyan Church they have forms of procedure but no system of doctrines in the sense that we have."

INSURMOUNTABLE OBSTACLE.

Continuing, Dr. Campbell said there was an insurmountable obstacle in the way of the Presbyterian church joining the other two. When the Presbyterian churches in Canada united in 1875 and in consideration of which they existed as a Presbyterian Church in Canada, there were articles drawn up and the church existed today and is recognized in virtue of their adherence to those articles. The documents submitted to the committee were not in conformity with the articles of the Presbyterian Church and they could not transfer themselves as a Presbyterian Church to another denomination unless they transferred themselves in the terms of the articles he had referred to. They would be no longer the Presbyterian Church in Canada if they went into another body and adopted a system which was not identical with their own.

MUST REMAIN PRESBYTERIAN.

"The only way in which the Presbyterian Church can go into a union upon the system of doctrines that we have. If the others choose to come in to live with us we can go into union but we cannot go into union and abandon all that identifies us as a Presbyterian Church." Dr. Campbell said that the church union in theory was different from church union in practice. There was a minority in the church that would never consent to union and in a view of that it was a foolish blunder for them to even contemplate church union.

Should the majority join such a union as is proposed the same thing would happen in Canada that happened in Scotland, the endowments and properties would remain in the possession of the minority who would remain in the Presbyterian church.

The motion to ask for a full report of the negotiations was carried.

CHEAPER SCHOOL BOOKS

Important Announcement by the Ontario Government

Toronto, March 4.—In reply to a question by Mr. Auld, Hon. Dr. Pyne announced in the House that arrangements had been made for the following reductions in the retail price of text books for high, public and separate schools:

English literature texts—Formerly 50 cents, now 20 cents, a reduction of 60 per cent. Some without annotations, 15 and 10 cents.

French literature texts—Formerly 40 cents, to be 15 cents, a reduction of 62½ per cent.

German literature texts—Formerly 50 cents, to be 25 cents, a reduction of 50 per cent. Limited annotations, 15 cents.

On certain of these texts there is a discount of 25 per cent. off retail prices; on others 20 per cent. off.

Ontario readers—Part I, 10 cents, now 5 cents, a reduction of 50 per cent.

Part II, 15 cents, now 7 cents, a reduction of 53 per cent. Second, 25 cents, now 9 cents, a reduction of 55 per cent. Third, 30 cents, now 13 cents, a reduction of 56 per cent. Fourth, 40 cents, now 15 cents, a reduction of 62½ per cent.

Single copies of these purchased from publishers are subject to a discount of 25 per cent. off the reduced retail price. On quantities worth \$250 and upwards there is an additional 10 per cent. discount.

The texts for English, French and German in continuation classes are reduced similarly to those for high schools.

No charges or reductions have been made as to separate school text books which are issued under different agreements.

All school books, the minister says, will be reduced in price as soon as possible.

GIVE THEM A CHANCE.

Chief Justice Howell's Reference to Foreigners.

Winnipeg, March 5.—Chief Justice Howell, when addressing the Grand Jury at the opening of the Assize Court today, made a rather remarkable reference to crime among the foreign population. He said: "It will appear to you when the names are shown you that a number of the most serious charges are laid against foreigners. Therefore, you may come off without these foreigners, that they are a menace to our country. Gentlemen, I have been a long time in the law, perhaps before some of you were born. A large number of these people are from the Carpathian Mountains, a very considerable portion of them have Slavonic blood in their veins. Shall we say 'Am I my brother's keeper?' Well, they are here, gentlemen; shall we drive them out of the country or hang them or teach them? They have not had a fair chance, it seems to me, in the race of life. In the country they came from the sidewalks of the town were not made for them; the roads were good enough for them, amongst the horses and swine. If the landlord came along they got down on their knees and bowed their faces to the ground. They could not go from their native village to another without a passport without being arrested. They came to this country and here the sidewalks are for them. They can go as they please and liberty becomes license. By all means punish them justly and kindly."

TO RID COUNTRY OF ANARCHISTS.

All Criminals who can be Deported Under the Law will be Compelled to Leave.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 5.—The Secretary of Commerce and Labor issued a sweeping order yesterday to all commissioners of immigration and immigrant inspectors in charge directing that they confer with the police in their respective jurisdictions with a view to securing the co-operation of the police and detective forces in an effort to rid the country of alien anarchists and criminals falling within the law relating to deportation.

WILL BE ENFORCED.

NEW YORK, March 5.—The order of Secretary Straus for the deportation of such alien anarchists and criminals as the law can reach will be enforced promptly and vigorously by the local federal authorities, working in harmony with the municipal police. The commissioner of immigration, Mr. Watchorn, is keenly alive to the situation, and his subordinates are already schooled in what is expected of them. United States District Attorney Stimson said last night that the matter had not been brought to his attention officially as yet, but intimated that no time would be lost by the federal officers in complying with the instructions of the department.

It is known that conferences between several federal authorities will be held today, and it is understood that a representative of the immigration service will confer with Commissioner Bingham, and a plan of joint action be mapped out.

It is known that a systematic campaign against those suspected of anarchistic sympathies has been quietly waged in this city for months. A report that Archbishop Farley, head of the Catholic church in New York has been threatened by anarchists, reached Commissioner Bingham yesterday, but he would not confirm it later. The Archbishop's subordinates, however, have been in communication with the police in an effort to hunt down the authors.

In a formal statement, last night, Mr. Bingham declared:

"The only foundation for the story concerning a threat made against Archbishop Farley is an anonymous letter received at police headquarters six months ago, in which his name and the names of other prominent men were mentioned. This was a typical 'bug' letter, and no attention was paid to it. Every prominent man receives scores of such letters, and if any attention was paid to them the recipients would never have any peace of mind."

SEIZED DOUKHOBOR CORPSE.

Authorities at Fort William Suppressed Funeral Rites of the Doukhobors.

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., March 5.—John Cazlin, one of the Doukhobor pilgrims, died last night and the band this morning endeavored to carry out his funeral service in a manner that soon had them in conflict with the civic authorities, and which ended with the police taking possession of the corpse and turning it over to one of the local undertakers for burial.

Old age, starvation, and lack of medical treatment is what caused the death of the man who, according to reports, has been lying alone for some time past, while the rest of the band looked on in perfect indifference to his fate, their wild belief leading them to think that no earthly power could benefit him.

The funeral procession was a very striking one, the body being wrapped in a blanket and drawn on a hand sled by six of the band while about 30 followed behind chanting their quaint dirge.
