THE SWORN TESTIMONY OF TWO FREDERICTON JUDGES DEAD AGAINST LICENSE.

Has the Scott Act since its adoption been the means of increasing or decreasing the sale of liquor in our city? In August 1892 the Royal Commission on the Liquor Traffic held a session in this city, and received a good deal of valuable testimony from men who knew whereof they affirmed on the subject. Instead of taking the snap judgment of those who have only hearsay knowledge of the conditions which obtained here under license, let us hear the testimony that two of our own Judges gave under oath before the Commission.

HON. JAMES STEADMAN, County Court Judge who resided in this city permanently since 1866 and closely observed the operation of both Acts testified:

"I do not think that THERE HAS BEEN ANYTHING LIKE THE DRUNKENNESS IN FREDERICTON NOW OR SINCE THE SCOTT ACT HAS BEEN IN FORCE AS IN THE YEARS BEFORE UNDER LICENSE. I shall say that at least two thirds of all criminal cases that have come before me had their origin in liquor drinking."

JOHN L. MARSH, the Police Magistrate of Fredericton for 21 years, and who had held office under the License Law and under the Scott Act, deposed as follows:

"I might say I have been thoroughly acquainted with the drinking habits of Fredericton during forty years. I think THERE HAS BEEN A LARGE DIMINUTION OF DRINKING IN FREDERICTON. This may be attributed to two or three causes. It can be attributed to the moral effect of the churches, to the work of temperance organizations, AND TO A GREAT EXTENT TO THE FACT OF THE SALE OF LIQUOR BEING ILLEGAL. I SHALL SAY THAT FULLY 90 PER CENT OF THE CRIME THAT COMES BEFORE ME MAY BE ATTRIBUTED TO DRUNKENNESS."

"Under License there were between 40 and 50 saloons on an average. In 1877 there came a new law, a special License Act for the city of Fredericton."

COUNT PURCHASED ENTIRE TOWN.

Polish Nobleman Pays \$2,000,000 for Russian Town, Including Fortress.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 4.—The news of an interesting transfer of real estate is reported here from the government of Volhynia. The entire town of Dubno, which counts some 13,000 inhabitants, has been sold by the owner Countess Shuvalova to Count Odoif, an Austrian, for \$2,000,000.

The transfer includes the site of the Russian fortress at Dubno. This town is one of several in Russian Poland that has been held under the ownership of a single individual since the old feudal days. It was founded in the tenth century and was once owned by a king of Poland. The fortress has been the field of many engagements, and it enjoys the distinction of never having been captured during either the Cossack or the Tartar invasion.
