

ROYALTY FOR QUEBEC

Prince and Princess of Wales will Represent the King at Ter-Centenary Celebration

OTTAWA, March 4.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier announced in the House late last night that H. R. H. the Prince of Wales had signified his intention of being present at the Quebec tercentenary, provided the celebration can be held the last week in July.

The communication came in a letter to Sir Wilfrid Laurier from Earl Grey, and was received with enthusiastic applause from both sides of the chamber. The Prime Minister read the letter from the Governor-General in which His Excellency said that he had been notified by Lord Elgin that His Royal Highness, in acceptance of the invitation, had expressed his willingness to accompany the British squadron to Quebec, providing the tercentenary celebration could be held in the last week in July. His Royal Highness will arrive on July 22, departing on the morning of July 29.—His Royal Highness regretted his stay in the Dominion must be curtailed.

In a few graceful words, Sir Wilfrid expressed the pleasure it would give Canadians as a people again to receive the heir apparent in their midst.

ANNOUNCEMENT IN LONDON.

LONDON, March 4.—The Daily Mail announces that the Prince of Wales, who probably will be accompanied by the Princess, will represent the King at the tercentenary at Quebec. It is regarded as likely that His Royal Highness will visit the chief eastern cities, though he is not expected to stay long nor go very far West.

THREE PIECE NEGLIGEE.

HAND embroidery was never more used on negligees than now, even the heavier fabrics of wool and cloth having this form of decoration, and accessories in the way of linen collars, cuffs and belts with embroidered designs are very smart, and the use of contrasting color is quite noticeably increasing.

There never was a season when there existed wider diversity regarding the finish of the neck of negligees. On one hand one sees the high choker collar, and on the other the neck is cut away just to the collar bone, leaving room for the handsome jeweled trinkets so much in vogue.

Innumerable dainty jabots are worn fashioned of almost every sheer fabric, from handkerchief linen to real lace. In design they vary from the simple knot at the throat, with a single or double cascade of lace, to those that fall the entire front of the bodice to the waist line.

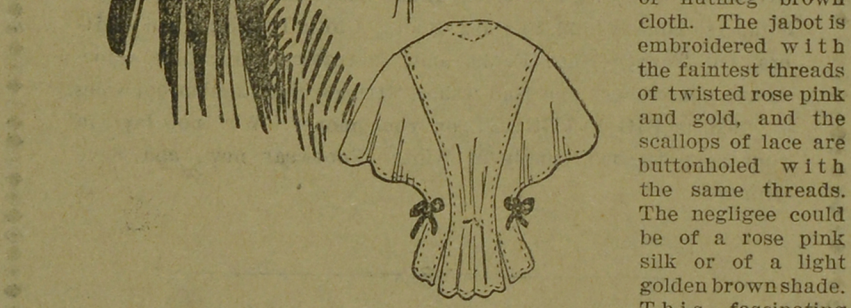
Jabots of old lace are pretty worn with negligees. Particularly effective is a bit of old point appearing at the neck and tied with a pretty shade of brown ribbon and worn with a skirt of nutmeg brown cloth. The jabot is embroidered with the faintest threads of twisted rose pink and gold, and the scallops of lace are buttonholed with the same threads.

The negligee could be of a rose pink silk or of a light golden brown shade. This fascinating

negligee is so effective and easily made that it should tempt every woman to make it. The sleeves and sides of the waist are cut in one and are joined to the piece that forms the center back and front. The edges can be finished in a variety of ways, depending upon the material employed in making it.

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HEARD ELECTION RETURNS

OTTAWA, March 4.—There was a scene of animation in the main corridor of the House of Commons shortly before six o'clock on Tuesday afternoon when the telegraph tickers commenced to tell the story of the election in New Brunswick. Only a quorum of members remained in the Commons Chamber, where the debate on the third reading of the French treaty was in progress the majority of the members rowding around the telegraph offices to learn the returns. Naturally the Conservatives were jubilant while there was a corresponding feeling of depression among the Liberals. Of the thirteen New Brunswick members only one (Mishaud, of Victoria) was here. The other 12 were in New Brunswick where they had worked and cast their votes for their respective parties.

Mitxel Morok was Only 19 Years of Age, but was Star Attraction of the Circus.

NEW YORK, March 5.—It was the fate of nineteen-year-old Mixel Morok, whose recklessly daring loop-the-loop act has been the feature of many performances, to meet death while engaged in the commonplace duty of pouring tea for a friend last night. As the circus star filled a cup of tea for her friend, the latter, Miss An-

toinette Defframe, toyed with an old-fashioned pistol, which exploded in her hands. A cartridge ball from the weapon lodged in Miss Morok's neck, and she survived but a few minutes. Miss Defframe was arrested on a technical charge of homicide.

Young as she was, Miss Morok had appeared with circuses for several seasons, and her performances were ways billed and proved to be one requiring a wild sort of bravery. She had planned to leave today for Chicago, where rehearsals for the coming season were about to begin.

MRS. M. V. GREEVER.

She is Known as the "Mother of Prohibition" in Kansas.

Mrs. Margaret Virginia Greever of Emporia is known as the "mother of Prohibition" in Kansas. Twenty-eight years ago George Washington Greever was elected a member of the legislature of Kansas from the county of Wyandotte. Just previous to his election he had been married to Miss Margaret Virginia Newland, who had been born in Tennessee and whose parents were pronounced Prohibitionists and who had thoroughly inculcated their daughter with their radical views on temperance.

Mrs. Greever sat by her husband's side daily in the legislature. When the first temperance measure came up her husband voted against it. With tears in her eyes the young bride pro-

tested against his attitude. Later in the session the bill submitting the question of prohibition to the vote of the people of the state came up, and again Mr. Greever voted against it. As the clerk announced that the vote was a tie a sob from his wife decided Mr. Greever. He arose and announced that he changed his vote, and thus the measure was adopted.

It was thus the momentous question was settled that made the state of Kansas the leader of all others in the cause of temperance as well as morality in the Union, if not in the entire Christian world.

Then in a moment Mrs. Greever found herself no longer the insignificant young woman who had day after day passed the long hours by the side of her husband, noticed but by few, and they principally friends and associates from her home county. The story spread like wildfire, and soon the modest young bride was surrounded by prominent men and brilliant women who showered her with congratulations until she was overpowered with confusion and knew not what to do, the notoriety and prominence thrust upon her being both confusing and obnoxious.

However, extremely important measures before the legislature attracted so much attention that the incident soon ceased to create comment and was not mentioned in the hearing of Mrs. Greever until in 1893, when, in a conversation with a leading temperance advocate from Ottawa whose name she has now forgotten, the story was gone over with. This lady gave the story to a newspaper man, and it was printed in an Ottawa paper.

Mr. Greever died in 1891 at Tonganoxie, Kan. After the death of Mr. Greever the widow came to Emporia to take advantage of the superior school facilities for her children, two sons and one daughter. She has resided here over six years, and not until now has the prominent part taken by her in making Kansas history been referred to.—Emporia Letter in St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

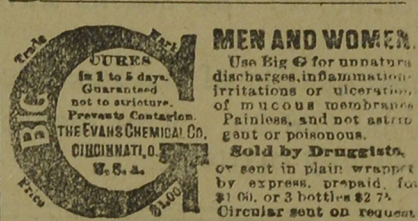
