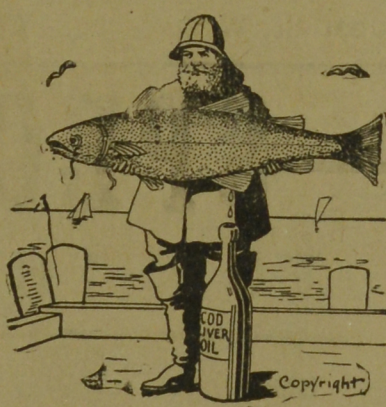

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties, by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father or mother, (if the father is deceased,) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother) on the homestead.

(4) The term "vicinity" is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

SEALED TENDERS for the supply of meat, bread, groceries, vegetables, forage, straw for bedding, coal, oil and for the washing of clothing and other barrack services, for the permanent force at Fredericton, for the fiscal year beginning April 1 1908, will be received up to noon of Saturday, March 7, 1908. The tenders should be marked on the upper left hand corner of the envelope "Tender for—" (stating the supply or service) and should be addressed to the secretary of the Militia Council, Ottawa.

Printed forms of tender containing full particulars may be obtained from the Director of Contracts, Ottawa, and at the office of the Officer Commanding the Royal School of Infantry, Fredericton.

Samples of the groceries, etc., which the tenderer proposes to furnish should be submitted with each tender.

Tenders must be made on the printed form furnished by the Department, without any alteration whatever, otherwise they will not be considered. Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a Canadian chartered Bank, payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Militia and Defence, for an amount equal to ten per cent. of the total value of the articles tendered for, which will be forfeited if the party making the tender decline to sign a contract when called upon to do so; or if he fail to complete the service contracted for if the tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned.

The Department does not bind itself to accept the lowest or any tender.
