A TORONTO WEDDING

Capt. Young Son of Former R. C. R. Officer here Weds Chief Justice's Daughter

One of the most brilliant weddings of the season took place Wednesday afternoon at St. James Cathedral, Toronto, when Miss Aimee Falconbridge, youngest daughter of the Chief Justice of the King's bench, Ontario, and Mrs. Falconbridge, became the bride of Captain Douglas Young, Royal Canadian Dragoons, aide-de-camp to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, and son of Colonel and Mrs. Young, of Kingston.

The wedding was a military one, the Cathedral being decorated with flags, palms and ferns. The full choral service was rendered.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. Alexander Williams, chaplain of Toronto garrison, and Rev. Canon Welch, of St. James Cathedral.

The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a broad crepe de chine, gown trimmed with real lace, and carried a bouquet of lilies and roses. The bridegroom's gift to the bride was a gold and pearl bracelet.

The bridesmaids were Miss Ruby Ramsay, Montreal; Miss Muriel Barwick, Toronto; Miss Jessie Hale, London, and Miss Mary Campbell, Toronto. They wore pale green, marguerites, tied with pale green ribbon.

(The bridegroom is a son of Col. D. D. Young, who for some years, from 1884, was an R.C.R. officer in Fredericton.)

tervened endeavor to get around the Cobeguid Mountain and get a straight line to Halifax with less grade than we have at present. If it is necessary, in order to carry the traffic that will go East, we should get the grades as low as possible for the traffic, that from the West, or the portion of it that goes to Halifax, the grades will have to be reduced. We cannot afford to have grades of one per cent. The highest grade we can have is four-tenths of one per cent in order to carry heavy loads at a profit. To make that line profitable to the people who own the traffic, and to the Dominion of Canada the grades have to be reduced at least to four-tenths of one per cent. If that can be accomplished from Moncton to Halifax by going around the mountain it would be in the interests of the I. C. R. as well as providing better facilities for St. John.

A GREAT NATIONAL ASSET.

I have detained the House too long, I have endeavored to look at this question from a national standpoint rather than from the standpoint of any section. The I. C. R. is a great national asset, in the management and results of every man in Canadian and results of which every man in Canada is interested, as far as the returns from the road are concerned in the parts which the I. C. R. plays as a regulator in carrying the produce of the east to the west, and of the west to the east. If that be an object worthy of the attention of the House then I ask it, when matters come up, affecting the Intercolonial to consider it from a double standpoint.

First from the standpoint of carrying out the pledge which was given the Maritime Provinces at the time of the confederation, not as a commercial venture, and from the second standpoint, that it is a great part of the transportation service of this country and that what we do not get in rates, remains in the pockets of the people of the Dominion of Canada.

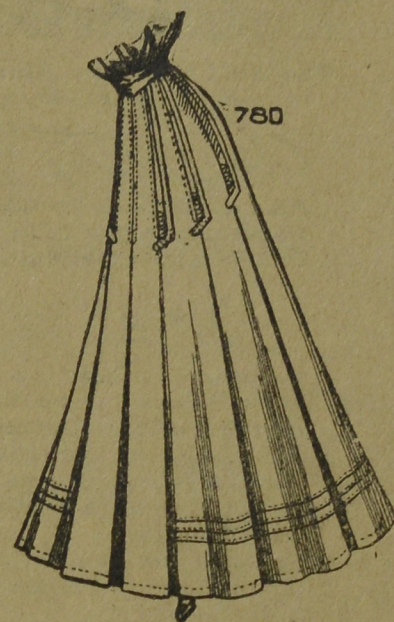

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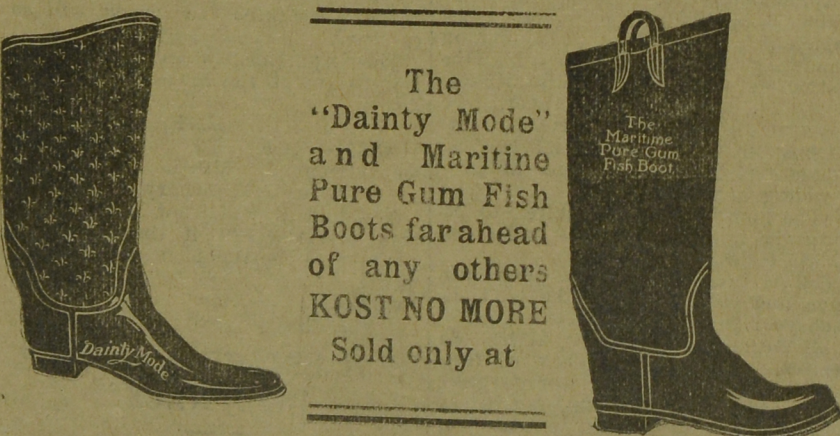
