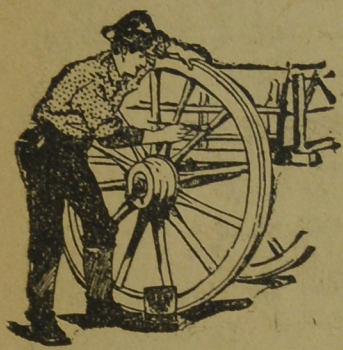

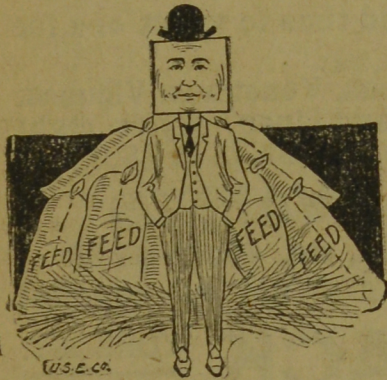

NURSE SUES FOR \$130,000

Miss Raddie M. Hunt's Legs Were CUT Off by a Long Island Railroad Express Train.

Miss Addie M. Hunt, a trained nurse, has begun a suit for \$130,000 damages against the Long Island Railroad Company before Justice McCall and a jury in the Supreme Court in Manhattan. On June 21, 1905, Miss Hunt lost her legs from points near the knees by being drawn under an express train at the station in Great Neck, and her left

thigh bone was forced into the pelvis incurably. Surgeons wondered how she survived the accident.

The plaintiff now lives in a home for nurses, 147 East 81st street, Manhattan. She was assisted into court by several comrades and a low camp chair, upholstered heavily, was provided for her. Miss Hunt sat in the chair with seeming difficulty. Few of the jurors appeared able to look long at her suffering.

Miss Hunt testified that on the day of the accident she had been nursing Miss Grace, who with Miss Alger runs the Red Brook Kennels and Llangollen Farm. Before the accident, she said, she often earned \$50 a week as nurse. In all the time since her discharge from the Hospital she had made only \$60 and that by the laborious occupation of weaving baskets.

She said she was thirty six years of age.

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HUMMEL OFF FOR LONDON.

Departs on the Lusitania and Will Return to New York Next Fall.

New York, March 22—"I am going abroad primarily for my health. Incidentally I have business of importance to attend to that will occupy my spare time for several months. I have taken a house in London, where I shall remain with my sisters and nephew until next fall, when I shall return to New York. I may be abroad until the first of the year, but not longer."

That declaration was made by Abraham H. Hummel to a reporter for the Herald yesterday morning just before the Lusitania backed out from the Cunard pier, at eight o'clock, for her start across the Atlantic.

Wishing not to be made the centre of a crowd of idle curiosity seekers, Mr. Hummel remained upon the bridge, while his nephew, A. H. Kaffenburgh, stood on guard outside a stateroom, giving the impression that the much sought man was within. With a heavy coat buttoned closely about his neck to keep off the chill breezes, Mr. Hummel smilingly watched the photographers and others scurrying about in search of him. He enjoyed the situation and could scarcely bring his mind back to his more serious affairs.

It was while he was standing on the bridge of the Lusitania that he gave to a reporter for the Herald the first interview that he has granted since he began serving his sentence on Blackwell's Island, ten months ago.

Incidentally Mr. Hummel was not in hiding after leaving the island, as was generally reported. Believing the best way to avoid embarrassing observation would be to go where the crowd was the thickest, he went immediately after his release to the Hoffman House, where he remained with his family until yesterday morning.

Mr. Hummel was in his rooms in the Hoffman House Thursday afternoon while the afternoon papers announced that he had hurried out of the city. Thursday evening, with his sisters, Mrs. Kaffenburgh and Miss Hummel and more than a score of personal friends, he ate his dinner in the largest of the Hoffman House dining rooms. His rooms in the hotel were on the second floor and faced Twenty-fifth street.

"I am not carrying any animosities with me," said Mr. Hummel, on the steamship. "Life is too short for one to dwell long upon misfortunes and wrongs. I rejoice at the evidence of the good will of my friends. When a man has gone through what I have in the last year he appreciates friends and friendships. But I am determined to keep my eyes on the future."

"I am willing to admit that District Attorney Jerome believed he was doing his duty when he prosecuted me and brought about my conviction. I could not have been convicted without the use of perjured testimony. The testimony of one of

the most important of the prosecution's witnesses was perjury, and one of the Assistant District Attorneys knew it during my trial. I do not believe the District Attorney knew it, but I am confident that he knows it now."

"Had I been willing to tell some secrets that had been entrusted to me I could not have been convicted, even with perjured witnesses. I resolved, however, to show that I did not belong to those who turn upon their friends. Had I talked I would have brought much trouble upon those who had trusted me. I do not mean that they had rendered themselves amenable to the law, but they would have suffered. So I took my punishment and I believe that I am now entitled to live my own life in my own way."

"Please say for me that while I was imprisoned I was not the recipient of any favors beyond those granted to all prisoners, particularly those who are ill. It is true that I had not been in the hospital I would have died before my term was half completed. I received fair treatment, and that is all. Twice while I was in prison I was at the point of death, and once I said what we all thought was a final good-bye to my sisters."

"In one way I was favored. About three weeks before my release I was permitted to let my mustache grow, so that when I left prison I looked much as I did when I entered it."

"It was assumed that I would go to my home, and everybody rushed up there, only to find the house shut up. So it was said that I had hastened from the city. Instead I went to the Hoffman House, and until this morning I have gone about just as though nothing had happened."

"By doing the obvious thing I escaped those who expected me to do something out of the ordinary. I was down in Nassau street Friday afternoon and after concluding the business that took me there I walked up through Park row to the subway station. Really it has all been much of a lark for me, and, after the worries of the last year, I must say that I have enjoyed it. Now they are all down below berating my unfortunate nephew just because he will not let them into a stateroom in which there is no one."

"I am going to spend most of the spring in London. I will then go across to the Continent for a short trip, but will be in London all summer unless my present plans are changed. I have taken a house and arranged for servants and everything of that sort. I shall live quietly, as my health is not good. Excitement overcomes me, and I have been warned against over-exertion. By the way I had a faint spell Thursday morning just as I left the hospital. That is why Dr. Metz accompanied me from the island."
