A CRUSHING TORY DEFEAT

Premier Scott Spoke on Results of Saskatchewan Election—Borden and Rogers did Their Best—No Federal Aid for the Liberals

REGINA, Aug. 17.—(Special)—Hon. Walter Scott, Premier of Saskatchewan, in addressing a mass meeting of citizens here in celebration of victory, said in part:

"As was pointed out at Saturday night's meeting it will scarcely be possible after the exposures and confessions of this campaign for Mr. Haultain any longer to wear a non-partisan cloak. But for the desperate use made of the forces sent hurriedly to his aid in response to the appeal sent to Mr. Borden the first night of the dissolution aid. It was an unequal contest in Mr. Haultain would have carried on five or six seats."

They made it really a federal party contest and their organization centre was not Regina but Winnipeg. "On our side the Liberals at Ottawa left us entirely to our own resources. They did not raise a finger to assist us, in fact I did not ask them to do so."

"When I was at Ottawa in July I gave them no hint of my intention as to the elections. I required no aid and they offered none. It was too late in the campaign before I became aware of the forces Mr. Borden and Mr. Rogers of Manitoba were throwing into Saskatchewan against us to allow time for our Federal friends to do anything to offset them."

"The story of Sir Wilfrid Laurier instructing me when I visited Ottawa in July, to come home and bring on the elections at once, is too old to need any answer."

NEWS OF CHATHAM

Visit From Mr. Pottinger—Laundry Man Skipped Out—Narrow Escape

CHATHAM, Aug. 18.—(Special)—D. Pottinger, general manager of the I. C. R., was in town yesterday looking into railway matters.

The Dominion Pulp Co. is asking for additional shipping facilities at the Canada dock, and this will be considered.

Mr. Pottinger said several surveys are now being made in connection with a new line into Chatham, and the wishes of the people here will be consulted in regard to a railway station site.

J. E. Bourque from Moncton, who used to do business for the metropolitan Life Insurance Co., and later took over the Star Steam Laundry, left town suddenly yesterday, for parts unknown, leaving many to mourn his departure. The laundry is being continued by Alfred Houghton and S. A. Gould.

John Archer of St. George, and two companions, were upset near Middle Island, while rowing on the river. Thomas McFarlane, in charge of the quarantine station on the island saw their predicament and launched a boat to their rescue, which was easily effected.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRES

Timber Lands of Vancouver Island Swept by Flames

WINNIPEG, Aug. 18.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. have received word that forest fires are raging on the south part of Vancouver Island, and that many millions of feet of valuable timber have been destroyed. The cream of the timber wealth of the island is being swept away.

In Robertson River district there is a fire frontage of five miles. At Bear Lake eight buildings with supplies for survey parties were destroyed, also a number of isolated dwellings and the Towichan Lumber Company's buildings.

A pathetic feature of the conflagration is the loss of game. Thousands of grouse and other birds were burned. The loss to timber is said to be \$2,000,000 already, and the fire shows no signs of abatement.

C. P. R. STRIKE

Company Claim to Have Engaged a Number of Men

AN EXCELLENT HARVEST.

Grain Dealers in Their Tour of the West Find Conditions Very Satisfactory.

REGINA, Sask., Aug. 18.—(Special)—The Grain Dealers' special train which left Winnipeg on Saturday morning, remained here over night, as the dealers are only travelling by daylight.

From Winnipeg they went along the Gloria branch to Souris, from there to Estevan, where they remained over night, proceeding thence to Moose Jaw over the Soo line and from there to Indian Head and then to Regina.

The dealers are unanimous in their expressions of satisfaction at the forward condition and possible yield, many stating that the indicated yield is much greater than they had expected.

From Winnipeg to Moose Jaw, the yield promises nineteen bushels. Cutting may be said to be general. The amount cut varies from ten to fifteen per cent.

From Moose Jaw to Indian Head, it should average twenty-five bushels north.

Southwest of Moose Jaw fully 50 percent is cut and all ripe. That also applies to the east as far as Regina.

East of Regina and Indian Head, the crop is very heavy and consequent later. Here some cutting has been done, but it will be towards the end of the week before it can be called general.

At Indian Head a visit was made to the experimental farm over which they were shown by the Supt. Geo. McKay. Here the bulk of the grain has been cut, and most excellent samples of all varieties of grain were found.

The party were all delighted with what they saw, and united in complimenting Mr. McKay on the splendid condition of the farm and the forwardness and excellence of everything found on the farm.

BIG GAME HUNTING

Large Number of Visiting Sportsmen Will Arrive Next Month

The indications are that the season for big game, which opens on September 15th, will be one of the most successful in the history of the province. It was thought at first that the presidential election in the United States would prevent many sportsmen from taking their annual fall trip, but it is doubtful if it will make very much difference. Recently the guides of this section have been receiving many applications from Americans, a good percentage of whom have never before hunted in New Brunswick. The time of the best guides for September is already pretty well taken up and some have made engagements that will keep them busy during the entire season.

Mr. Adam Moore, the well known guide of Scotch Lake, set out for the Folioque woods this morning to put his traps in shape for the hunting season. He expects a fishing party in the course of a few days, and has several hunting parties coming early next month. Mr. Moore will also handle a large number of sportsmen this fall at his camps on the Magallowe and at Scotch Lake.

Mr. Henry Braathwaite, the veteran Miramichi guide, has four hunting parties numbering about twelve sportsmen, booked for the month of September. Col. Barry of Scotland, who is quoted with several years ago, is among the number. Mr. Braathwaite will also take out Ben Martin, a well known Philadelphia sportsman, who has made a name for himself as a writer of hunting stories.

Mr. Charles Tremblay, who has for the past few years been hunting in the Miramichi, will also take out a party of sportsmen for the month of September. Charles has handled a number of fishing parties during the last two months, and this time is about all taken up for the hunting season.

All reports go to show that moose and deer are very plentiful in different sections of the province, but caribou seem to be getting away from their old haunts. As the guides have very little trapping in recent years on account of the low price of the fur, bears are also reported to be plentiful in many sections of the province.

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TAKEN FOR CHAUFFEUR

Son of Hon. Dr. Pugsley Tipped by Sir Wilfrid Laurier

A good story is brought to St. John from Ottawa by J. A. Pugsley son of the Minister of Public Works. In one of the Ottawa avenues Mr. J. A. Pugsley was driving in his automobile. Overtaking a broken down car, he saw that the persons in trouble were Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lady Laurier, with a party of friends. In view of their plight, Mr. Pugsley placed his car at their disposal, and offered to take them to Sir Wilfrid's residence. The offer was accepted. As Sir Wilfrid was leaving the car he calmly handed a quarter to Mr. Pugsley as a tip. Not knowing what was in the wind, Mr. Pugsley accepted, and it was not until the Premier had given him instructions to have his car ready for a trip which he was to take with Earl Roberts that Mr. Pugsley realized that Sir Wilfrid had taken him for a chauffeur from a cycle company. He even promised that he would see that the Premier's automobile was put into running shape again. At this point the merit of a friend who was with Mr. Pugsley, became uncontrollable, and in response to Sir Wilfrid's look of inquiry, Mr. Pugsley informed him that he was not a chauffeur, but the son of the Minister of Public Works.

The Premier and his party were heartily amused at the mistake, and Sir Wilfrid said to Mr. Pugsley that he should preserve the quarter dollar as a memento.

SCOTCH FARMERS

Touring Party Will Reach Fredericton Tomorrow Afternoon

The party of Scottish Agriculturists who have been touring eastern Canada under the guidance and at the expense of the Dominion Department of Immigration, will arrive in St. John this evening.

The party have been going through Nova Scotia and will come across from Digby on the Prince Rupert. They will be met by W. W. Hubbard, representing the local government.

When they reach St. John it is expected that they will be taken for a drive around the city and the immediate vicinity.

On Wednesday morning they will leave by steamer for Fredericton. They leave Fredericton on Thursday morning for Woodstock and from there they go to Knowlton, Quebec.

The party is in charge of Blake Robertson of the Department of the Interior, and G. H. Clark, of the Department of Agriculture.
