POLITICAL PHONICS.

The electors of Sunbury-Queens are shortly to have the privilege of hearing some of the best platform speakers in Canada in a succession of political picnics planned to promote the candidature of Col. McLean for parliament. Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Mr. E. M. McDonald, M. P. for Pictou, Mr. A. K. McLean M. P. for Lunenburg, N. S., Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., and other well known public men are announced among those who are to take part in the meetings, which no doubt will be very largely attended.

Col. McLean has entered upon his campaign with great vigor and has excellent prospects of wresting the United counties from their present Tory allegiance.

Mr. Wilnot the present representative is recognized as a good fellow—a gentleman of high character and amiable disposition but he cuts a small figure in parliament and has accomplished practically nothing for his constituency which is tired of being represented at Ottawa by a man, who subordinates everything to a slavish support of his party, and whose voice is seldom heard in the debates of the House or in the committees of parliament.

Col. McLean on the other hand is a gentleman of much intelligence, a highly successful lawyer and business man, who is familiar with the ways of Sunbury-Queens, and has sufficient influence with his party to secure for the constituency its rights in the matter of improved public services, and the electors of the United counties are giving him an enthusiastic reception.

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES.

Three of the Liberal candidates in the recent Saskatchewan elections, in whom New Brunswickers naturally had an interest were successful in winning seats in the new legislature.

Hon. Mr. Turgeon the Attorney General, ran in two constituencies, and while he was defeated by a small majority in one he carried Duck Lake by a good lead. Mr. Turgeon is a young man, son of Mr. O. Turgeon, Liberal M. P. for Gloucester, and is having a successful professional and political career in the west.

Another New Brunswicker who is again returned to the Saskatchewan legislature is Hon. Thomas MacNutt who was a member of the old North West Territorial legislature, and also of the first Saskatchewan House of which he was speaker. Mr. MacNutt who represents the constituency of Saltcoats, is a native of Campbellton and is of Nova Scotia parentage. He is 58 years old, a farmer and real estate agent, and has been a resident of the west for some years.

Dr. J. W. McNeill who carried the constituency of Hanley for the Liberals, while not a native of New Brunswick, practised in this province for some years, residing at Keswick Ridge and later in this city, and his wife is a York County lady, daughter of Mr. John A. Campbell, ex-M. P. of Kingsclear. Dr. McNeill has been living in the west less than two years, and it speaks well for his popularity in his new home, that he has been triumphantly elected to the Legislature so soon after becoming a citizen of Saskatchewan.

TORY NEPOTISM

When the late Mr. Jacob Gough, of Northumberland was a member of the legislature in the days immediately following confederation he declared in the House one day that one could not move about the public departments without running up against the relatives of a government member, and similar conditions appear to prevail at present.

The habit of appointing relatives to office seems to be particularly strong with Mr. Hazen and his supporters in the legislature and the departments are being overmanned by needy claimants who can trace relationship to the premier and his associates.

The list already includes, Mr. Hazen's uncle, Mr. Glasier's brother-in-law, Dr. Bourque's brother-in-law, while on the Central Railway Commission a brother-in-law of one of Mr. Hazen's defeated Westmorland candidates occupies a place, and up in the country Mr. Pinder's son has received a couple of appointments.

Mr. John A. Young, M. P. P., made a gallant effort to land a number of his relatives in public offices but was turned down, and he natur-

ally feels somewhat chagrined at the progress some of his fellow members have made in securing jobs for members of their families.

CURRENT COMMENT.

Laurier will stir up Ontario.

Saskatchewan electors evidently believe in the (Walter) Scott Act.

The West looks pretty solid for Laurier.

Lords Roberts and Stratheona reached Liverpool from Canada on Saturday and were accorded a civic reception.

Ballot box stuffing and personation occurred at one of the Tory primaries in St. John, met to choose delegates for the party nominating convention. These are old tricks of the Tories.

Twenty-one of the twenty-two Scotch farmers who are to reach Fredericton tomorrow, are Presbyterians. They should stay over for the Kirk picnic on Thursday.

Premier Hazen's "Uncle Harry" late of Boston, has been bundled into a public office, but poor Mr. Pinder, who has claims for preferment is still left in the sawmill at Nackawick.

James Sharpe, the Yankee "Dreamer," who came to Canada to arouse the Doukhobours and lead them to the promised land, and who has given the authorities of the West considerable trouble has betaken himself back to the United States, his mission proving a failure.

The party of Scotch farmers who are touring Canada will reach Fredericton tomorrow afternoon by boat, and while here will doubtless want to know all about agricultural conditions in New Brunswick. To provide them with the desired information, Mr. Hazen no doubt will present his commissioner for agriculture to the visitors, who will tell them all about—medicine and its practice.

Laird, the Tory candidate for the Saskatchewan legislature in Regina the capital of the province, the man whom Premier Scott charged with municipal boodling and who sued Mr. Scott for libel was soundly beaten in Friday's elections. Bole the Liberal candidate capturing the constituency by nearly 300 majority.

The highway leading from the St. Marys end of the bridge to the lower end of Gibson is in a rascally condition and whoever is responsible should be ashamed of themselves. Last year a large quantity of sand was dumped on this road and with the recent rains on it, it is almost impassible. Somebody in authority should get to work and remedy such a disgraceful condition of affairs.

New Brunswick Tories are in a somewhat excited condition over the well authenticated report that the Telegraph is to come under Liberal management, and admit that the change, depriving them of newspaper support in St. John, will place the party in an awkward position. Mr. McKens seems to have failed them at a critical time with a federal election looming up in the distance.

The Liberals of Kent in convention at Buctouche, Monday, unanimously nominated Hon. O. J. LeBlanc, the present M. P. for another term. Other names mentioned were ex-Sheriff Legere and Mr. John B. Goggin, ex-M. P. P., but both gentlemen withdrew in favor of Mr. LeBlanc, and endorse his candidature. Mr. LeBlanc has proved a useful and popular representative of the constituency both in the legislature and in parliament, and those who know Kent well have little doubt of his re-election.

Mr. Foster might make some progress in his Nova Scotia campaign if his political past was not ever present in the minds of his hearers. When he talks of the "great betrayal" men naturally recall the disgraceful "nest of traitors" episode, in which Mr. Foster cruelly put the knife into the political leader. Mr. Foster has a smooth tongue, but the facts and his past are against him.

"Let Laurier finish his work," exclaims the Montreal Herald. Yes, and if he has his health for a few months, he will just about finish the Tories.

The Tory newspapers no longer talk of the great reaction in the west against Liberalism. The returns from Saskatchewan have taken all the snap out of them.

All the returns are in from the Saskatchewan Provincial elections, and they assure to Premier Scott and his Liberal government a majority of ten in a House of 40 members. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is said to be delighted with the result. Mr. Borden, who is summering at a Yankee watering place, has not yet expressed an opinion for publication.

A report is current that Charlotte Liberals will invite Hon. Dr. Pugsley to contest that constituency.

Tory election hiders who have been unable to obtain public offices from Mr. Hazen will not find much to please them in the announcement that the premier has been able to find a place for his uncle in the public works department.

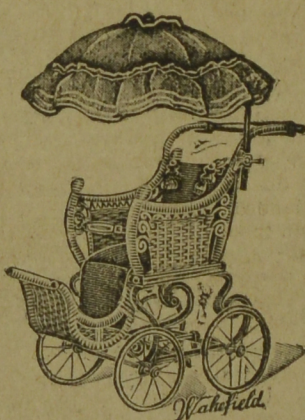
