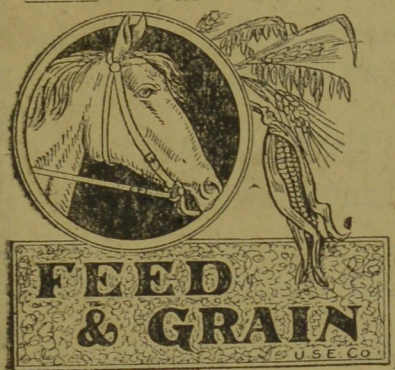

TORIES WERE AFRAID

Compelled by Public Opinion to Vote the Militia Estimates After Wasting Nearly a Whole Day

OTTAWA, Ont., June 11.—After wasting the greater part of yesterday in fruitless discussion of various questions raised by opposition members by way of semi-disguised obstruction to supply, the Commons finally got down to business at five o'clock in the afternoon and in the last hour of sitting did the only real business of the day, namely the passing of the vote of one million dollars of militia estimates to provide for the holding of the annual training camps.

Most of the morning session of the Commons was taken up with a discussion of the proposed appointment of Edward Charlier, of Montreal to the House staff of official translators. Mr. Monk moved that the report of the debates committee, recommending an increase of salaries of Hansard staff and augmentation of translating staff be sent back for further consideration. He declared that Charlier, whom the committee recommended for the appointment, had been convicted and sent to jail for libel.

Mr. Gervais, Montreal, vigorously defended the appointment of Charlier. At least five members of the House, he said, had been in jail for libel or contempt of court. There was no great crime in that.

Sir Wilfred Laurier pointed out that the report of the committee had already been adopted by the house and no question had been raised as to Charlier's qualifications as translator. Discussion was continued at considerable length by Mr. Bergeron and others.

A motion by Mr. Monk to refer

back a report by the debates committee was voted down.

Sir Wilfred Laurier, replying to Mr. Monk, said it was not the intention of the government, either to oppose or suggest any part in connection with the all red line.

That was a question which should be decided for purely business reasons and which should be left altogether to the company which might undertake the service. The only condition to be considered by the government was that the service must be between the United Kingdom and Canada.

While the prime minister was in England last year he discussed the question of the all red route with the British cabinet committee, and Sir Wilfred had no doubt that Lord Strathcona had continued to do so.

Replying to Mr. Borden, Sir Wilfred said it was the intention of the government to introduce legislation with regard to the Hudson Bay Railway and probably to providing aid for other railways. It was also their intention to present the civil service bill at as early a date as possible. The first duty of the house, however, was to get supply in order to carry on the business of the country.

Estimates of the militia department were then taken up. Sir Frederick Borden said that it was urgent that four items should be passed, namely, those for pay and allowances, salaries and wages annual drill and Dominion arsenal.

Finally the item of \$850,000 for annual drill was carried and the house adjourned.

IN THE HONOR LIST

Three U. N. B. Graduates Among Those Who Made Good at Old McGill.

In the pass and honor lists of the second and third years in medicine at McGill University the names of several students from St. John and their sections of the province appear.

H. B. Logie, B. A., of Chatham received second year honors in aggregate of all subjects and also honors in pharmacy, physiology and applied medical chemistry. A. E. MacCauley of St. John received second year honors in histology, anatomy, physiology and applied medical chemistry. J. H. Allingham, B. A., of Fairville received second year honors in physiology and applied medical chemistry. R. B. Malcolm of St. John received second year honors in organic chemistry.

In the third year lists C. M. Kell E. A., of Springfield received the Sutherland gold medal and was given aggregate honors. H. C. Cody Centreville, Carleton County, passed in all subjects.

Messrs. Kelly, Allingham and Logie are graduates of the university of New Brunswick. Mr. Cody was formerly a student at that college.

DRASTIC RULE IN INDIA.

Vice Regal Council Adopts Emergency Measures.

SIMLA, June 11.—The Vice-regal Council, after strong speeches by Lord Minto, Viceroy of India, and other members of the Council, emphasizing the urgency of dealing with seditious outbreaks, yesterday adopted two emergency measures. The first is known as the explosives bill, which provides stern measures against bomb outrages and conspiracies; the second, the press bill, empowers the suspension and confiscation of newspapers inciting to criminal acts.

Lord Minto was careful to explain that both of these bills should be regarded as exceptional measures to meet an exceptional situation. He added that if they were found to be not strong enough some measure more severe would be adopted.

WHO GOT THE TROUSERS?

Remarkable Series of Robberies in Sleeping-cars.

NORTH BAY, Ont., June 11.—During the past few days an organized band of crooks have been working Pullman sleeping cars on the C. P. R. T. Harris of North Bay, divisional car foreman, was returning from a trip of inspection on Saturday night, and while sleeping in his berth on the Winnipeg express was robbed of his trousers, containing \$80. He was obliged to keep his

berth until an extra pair of uniform trousers was found.

On the same train a man named McLeod lost three coats.

J. Canham, en route to Sprague, Manitoba, from Toronto, arrived in North Bay on Sunday morning poorer by two thousand dollars of negotiable paper, besides ready cash, watch and tickets. Canham was obliged to wait a day in North Bay to secure funds to continue his journey. The robbery occurred between Allan-dale and North Bay.

Two men on No. 1 express on Monday night lost their trunks between North Bay and Sudbury while sleeping, but the cash loss was small. Three other passengers were relieved of their valuables on Monday night west of North Bay. The C. P. R. Co. have taken steps to protect passengers from further trouble of a like nature.

ROBUST DOUGH ROLLERS.

Work in a Pie Factory is on the Scale of Athletics.

To properly describe the processes of baking pumpkin pies would require one skilled in the technicalities of the art. This is the way it looks to a mere man: First, the coarse yellow rind is removed, and then the pumpkin is cut open and the seeds taken out, after which the two halves are thoroughly washed. Then a husky lad takes a sort of cleaver and cuts the pumpkin into large pieces, which are fed into a steam chopping machine and reduced to small fragments. These are placed in a huge copper boiler capable of holding perhaps twenty-five gallons. After the boiling has been completed a pasty mixture of eggs, milk, sugar, cinnamon and other spices and condiments is added and well stirred in, and then the yellow mass is ready to be filled into the skeleton pies. The crust is prepared in another department, where the dough is mixed, rolled and placed in the pans ready to receive the filling. If any one thinks that pie-making is an easy and effeminate employment he should visit a pie bakery and inspect the muscles developed on the arms of expert pie crust mixers and rollers. They would be creditable to a trained athlete and would put many a mill worker and blacksmith to the blush. Finally the pies are placed on racks and shoved into huge ovens that resemble nothing else so much as the kilns used for burning brick. These kilns are constructed in any size desired, with a capacity of anywhere from fifty up to several hundred at a time, while they can be refilled every half hour or less.

The Scotch Fir.
