sumed that the government party would stand at his back in any action he might take.

Mr. Hanson again complained that the government delegates were quibbling in the matter.

Messrs. Parlee, Scott and Chestnut thought that before the resolutions would have any effect they would have to be approved of by the candidates of the two parties.

The second section of the resolution was adopted by a standing vote.

The third section of the resolution, which provides that not more than the legally authorized number of agents shall be sent to the polls by the respective candidates was adopted after some discussion.

On the section calling for a deposit of a sum of money by each side for the enforcement of the law, there was considerable discussion. Quite naturally those who insisted upon the money being put up were those, who, when the time comes for putting their hands in their pockets were badly found wanting.

R. B. Hanson said Col. Marsh had informed him that there was nothing in the election act under which an arrest for bribery or impersonation could be made.

Mr. Howard thought that if offenders against the law could not be prosecuted, it was useless for the committee to proceed any further.

Mr. Richards thought the resolution might be amended so as to provide that the party found guilty of violating the election act would forfeit the money deposited.

DR. McLEOD WILLING.

Rev. Dr. McLeod thought that the section should be adopted for its moral effect, if for no other reason. It was a good plan to have energetic men at the polls representing both parties, to watch out for violators of the law.

Mr. A. H. Vanwart thought that the section calling for a deposit of money should be struck out.

Rev. Dr. McLeod insisted that the section should be adopted, and it was finally done. It is said that the doctor has already prepared his check for a liberal contribution.

On motion of Mr. C. H. Thomas, seconded by Mr. Osborne, it was resolved that each side put up \$500.

Rev. Dr. McLeod said that he noticed a majority of the members of the government committee did not vote for the last motion. He thought there should be some illumination on the subject.

The warden said that he thought a majority did vote for it.

Dr. Moore thought it might be a little presumptuous on the part of the meeting to stipulate any particular sum. It was not known what amount the candidates might be willing to deposit.

Mr. Osborne said he felt justified in voting to fix the amount at \$500, as he thought there had been a blank left in the resolution adopted by the Liberal convention.

Rev. Mr. MacDonald said that there was no blank in the first resolution.

Mr. Osborne said that being the case he would be disposed to agree with Dr. Moore.

Rev. Mr. MacDonald said that in Charlotte the two parties had put up \$1,000 each.

Mr. Hanson, who seemed to be in a very bad humor, here interposed the remark that the Liberals present at the meeting represented nobody but themselves.

Rev. Dr. McLeod took issue with Mr. Hanson on this point.

On a second vote being taken to fix the amount of the deposit all voted for it except three Liberals.

Mr. Osborne said that there were supporters of the government just as anxious to see purity in elections as their opponents, and would probably work just as hard to see the resolutions carried out.

Rev. Mr. McLeod thought that the bank where the money was to be deposited should be specified, otherwise the committee might place it in a snow bank.

It was agreed that the words "any chartered bank" would suffice. On motion of Rev. Dr. McLeod it was resolved that the resolutions be signed by twenty members of each party, to be named by the opposing party. This to be in addition to the candidates and members of the committee.

Rev. Mr. MacDonald suggested that copies of the resolution be sent throughout the county, and that ministers be requested to preach sermons on electoral purity.

Mr. Alex. McNally thought that the resolutions should be signed on or before the morning of nomination day, and the money deposited. A motion to that effect was adopted.

Rev. Mr. McLeod suggested that flaming posters containing the resolutions should be distributed all over the county.

Mr. Hanson thought that was a matter that could be left in the hands of the Moral Reform association.

At this stage Secretary Hanson handed the purity resolutions over to Harry Blair, with instructions to deliver them to Percy Guthrie, and withdrew from the meeting. Mr. Blair following a moment later.

Rev. Dr. McLeod wanted the resolutions signed forthwith, but when Rev. Mr. MacDonald started to look for them they could not be found. The learned doctor then moved that two men be appointed from each party to act as custodians of the fund.

The doctor's suggestion was approved, and the meeting named Messrs. Henry Chestnut and W. J. Osborne for the Liberals, and Warden McNally and Dr. McLeod for the Conservatives.

Mr. A. D. Thomas thought it would be a good plan to have Mr. C. H. Thomas appointed a member ex-officio, but nobody seemed to agree with him on this point.

Mr. Thomas did not appear to hanker after the job, and gave the meeting to understand that he was a very busy man.

It was agreed that the members of the committees should all sign their names to the resolution, but as the only copy had been carried away, a blank sheet of paper was procured, and a number signed it before the meeting broke up.

One of the clergymen in attendance at the meeting complimented the Liberal delegation on the stand they had taken, and remarked that they had remained remarkably cool under the circumstances.

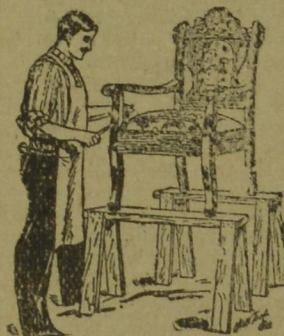
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
