

OLD TIMES RECALLED

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, NOV. 18, 1882)

Lieut. F. M. Campbell has gone to Europe to spend the winter.

The Temperance Party have formed a Scott Act League for the enforcement of the law.

Wm. Smith's grocery, corner King and Westmorland Streets, was entered last night and robbed of a large sum of money.

Mr. Charles L. Richards has accepted the positions of leader of St. Paul's Church Choir and Assistant Superintendent of the Sunday school. The City Council last night very properly voted City Clerk Beckwith salary of \$300 for his arduous labor in connection with the water Commission from May 1881, for one year.

Thos. Owens who worked with Mr. Thomas Bradley, harness maker in this city, fifteen years ago was recently found dead in his bed at San Francisco. Cause of death apoplexy.

The amount of Miscellaneous Licenses collected by City Marshal Wood ward for the year ending 31st October was \$2,578—seventy-five per cent of which went to the city and twenty-five to the collector.

Mr. J. D. Hazen, attorney at law tried his first case in the County Court Monday and Tuesday, and displayed marked ability for which has received warm commendation from members of the Bench and Bar.

Mr. Moses Hagerman, proprietor Hagerman Hotel, after a lingering illness of consumption, died last Thursday night and his remains were interred at Scotch Settlement on Sunday. The members of Victoria Lodge, I.O.O.F. headed by the Fredericton Brass Band united with the funeral cortege and walked to Government House leaving the city at 9 a. m. Sunday.

Of the 172 applicants for the admission to the Normal School, only 34 were required to stand the entrance examination, and of these 39 passed successfully, ten are admitted on trial, three failed and six have entered the French Department. The regular work of the Institution commenced on Monday and this afternoon the formal opening proceedings were held.

A novel way of eluding the authorities in Scott Act matters, has been introduced in a downtown establishment. The dry and thirsty soul enters the front shop and enquires to the attendant. He is told that it is not sold there, but is introduced to back apartment where he is greeted by a mysterious looking individual attired in a long white clerical looking gown and black mask completely disguising his whole figure. PROF. FOSTER RE-ELECTED.

Yesterday the election to fill the vacancy in the representation of King's County, in the House of Commons, caused by the unseating of Prof. Foster, resulted in the reelection of that gentleman by a large increased majority over his old opponent, Mr. James Donville.

A PLEASANT EVENING.

The members and adherents of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church spent a very pleasant time Saturday evening celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the dedication of their church. Supper was served at six p. m. in the Sunday School room, which was tastefully trimmed with flags, and in the church at 8 o'clock a pleasing literary and musical program commenced. Mr. George F. Gregory was Chairman and introduced the speakers of the evening, Prof. Rivet, who read an interesting historical sketch of St. Paul's, Rev. Dr. MacRae who discussed Presbyterianism in an able paper and Rev. A. J. Mowatt, pastor of the church, who furnished a mass of statistics, bearing upon the

rise and development of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Rev. Dr. Sprague, Methodist, and Rev. F. D. Crawley, Baptist took part in the devotional exercises and the choir of the church with some outside assistance rendered a program of music.

THE LEES SENTENCED.

Twenty Years in the Penitentiary

Since July last, Newton and George M. Lee had been prominently before the public, as the participants with Thomas Virtus in some of the greater crimes perpetrated in this community for many years, the facts of which are fresh in the memory of our readers. On the first trial, in which they were charged with shooting Sergeant Vandine in George Lee's barn, on the 31st of July, they were found guilty in October, and on the second charge, that of attempting to shoot the Police Magistrate, they were acquitted on Thursday last. The third and last charge against them for attempting to shoot Sergeant Vandine at his own house, was not pressed, and on Monday morning the closing chapter in the lengthy trials were read to the prisoners by Mr. Justice Steadman, who sentenced M. Newton Lee and Mr. George M. Lee to twenty years service in the Dorchester penitentiary for the crime of which they were convicted.

They were conveyed to St. John the same afternoon by Sheriff Temple Sergeant Vandine and Policeman Phillips, where they were lodged in the County jail till Tuesday, then forwarded to Dorchester.

KEPT IN RUSSIAN JAIL. Englishman Dragged From Bed at Dead of Night.

Russian police methods have once more moved the British Foreign Office to action. This time the case is more flagrant than usual, a London merchant having been summarily arrested and cast into prison in Odessa.

The unfortunate individual is Mr. N. Luxemburg, who carries on business in Cheapside, and is well known among London and Continental business men. On Feb. 26 he left England for a continental tour. He visited Berlin, from which he sent a picture post-card—the last direct communication any of his friends have had from him—to his wife, and afterwards went to Odessa, where he arrived on March 5.

Later came the following cable from his agent at Odessa:

"Luxemburg arrested; am taking necessary steps."

Later a letter was received from the agent stating that Mr. Luxemburg was suddenly dragged out of bed at his hotel and clapped straightway in prison, without any explanation beyond "Orders from St. Petersburg."

The agent wrote that he had been unable to ascertain why the arrest had taken place; that no charge had at present been made; that he had not been allowed to communicate with Mr. Luxemburg, and that Mr. Luxemburg had not been allowed to communicate with him.

According to one correspondent Mr. Luxemburg was awakened at two in the morning. When he opened the door of his room an officer and five constables presented revolvers at him. He was removed to the prison, and placed in a filthy cell which had no bed. As a result he had a nervous breakdown.

It has been suggested that revolutionary pamphlets were found amongst Mr. Luxemburg's baggage, but it is asserted by those who should know that Mr. Luxemburg kept himself aloof from politics. The package which Mr. Luxemburg took with him contained sample boots and shoes.

Mrs. Luxemburg has made personal representations to the Foreign Office, which has promised to make inquiries at once.

The British Government has taken energetic action. At the instance of the Foreign Office the British Ambassador at St. Petersburg has presented a note to the Russian Foreign Minister, calling attention to the arrest, and requesting that if there is any

trial might be expedited, and, if not, that he should be released.

The matter, we understand, will be further pressed, and, if, as seems to be the case, a serious blunder has been made by the Odessa police, the British Government will consider the question of making a claim for compensation.

In addition to the representations which have been made at St. Petersburg, the British consul-general at Odessa has been instructed to inquire fully into the circumstances of Mr. Luxemburg's arrest, and to report as soon as possible.

PUSSY IN THE WALL.

Cat Alive After Being Bricked up for a Month.

From Sunderland comes a remarkable story concerning a cat which had been accidentally imprisoned in a wall during alterations. Some weeks ago, Mr. John Stephenson missed from his home in Chatsworth street, a Persian cat, and as the animal did not put in an appearance after the lapse of some days, it was concluded that it had been stolen. A few days ago a member of the family heard mewing, but the cat was not to be seen. The mewing was not heard again that day, but on the following day was repeated, and seemed to come from beneath the flooring. Boards were taken up, but the cat was not found. On the same day the cries of the animal were again heard, and this time seemed to come from behind the wall of the sitting-room. It being obvious that the cat was in some place of confinement about the house, Mr. Stephenson obtained help, and had the wainscoting detached and bricks removed. While these operations were in progress, the poor beast was discovered by one of the men. The cat had been a month in the ventilating chamber while alterations were being made to the place, and was bricked in. When found the animal was in a pitiful condition, but with careful treatment it is now gradually getting over its terrible experience.

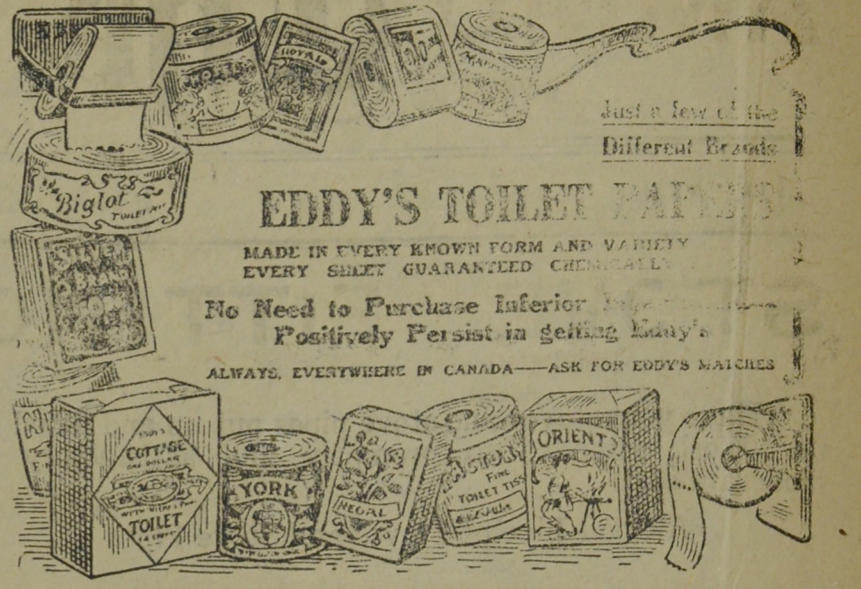
