THEY ARE DIVIDED

Prominent temperance men of St. John appeared before the government Friday afternoon, and presented their views on the best means of restricting or destroying the liquor traffic, but these were so divergent that Premier Robinson and his colleagues must be very much at sea as to what the delegation really want.

Some of the speakers advocated a prohibitory law, others favored a license law rigidly enforced while one gentleman who is an opposition candidate in St. John thought the Scott Act was the best agent for the suppression of the liquor evil.

The speakers seem to have fallen foul of each other in the discussion and the government naturally will not feel like committing itself to any particular course when the temperance men themselves are so much divided as to what is best to do.

The premier told the delegation that he would have to consult his supporters in the legislature, and the temperance men would do well to also interview Mr. Hazen and get his opinion on the propriety of introducing prohibitory legislation.

SELECTED FOR HONORS

The three gentlemen whom the University Alumni have selected for recommendation to the Senate for honorary degrees at the next Encenia, are well deserving the recognition of that institution.

Hon. E. L. Wetmore, who is a Frederictonian by birth, has had a distinguished career at the bar and on the bench, and is now chief justice of Saskatchewan, and Chancellor of the new University established in that province. When a member of the New Brunswick legislature Mr. Wetmore, whenever occasion offered, had a good word to say of the University of N. B., of which he is a graduate.

Lieut. Governor Bulyea of Alberta, is a native of New Brunswick, and a U. N. B. graduate, who after a successful business career in the west, turned his attention to politics, and was a member of the legislature and government of the North West territories, and is now Alberta's Chief Magistrate.

Mr. James Vroom of St. Stephen, the other gentleman selected, has done a great deal for science in this province, both on the platform, and in his writing, and his recognition will be pleasing to the large number of his friends who admire his ability, and will reflect credit on the U. N. B.

The University of New Brunswick has reason for pride in the large number of its graduates who have risen to distinguished positions in various fields of human activity, and the recalling of a few names in this connection will serve to quicken the feeling of satisfaction at the excellent work the institution has been doing.

Graduates who occupy prominent positions include Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Canadian Minister of Public Works, Hon. Dr. Barker, Judge of the Supreme court of this province, and its prospective Chief Justice, Hon. E. L. Wetmore, Chief Justice of Saskatchewan, Hon. Geo. E. Foster, M. P., ex-Minister of Finance, Hon. G. H. V. Bulyea, Governor of Alberta, Mr. J. D. Hazen, M. P. P., leader of the opposition in the New Brunswick legislature, Dr. G. R. Parkin, the distinguished educationalist, and many others who have achieved distinction in the legal, political and business world.

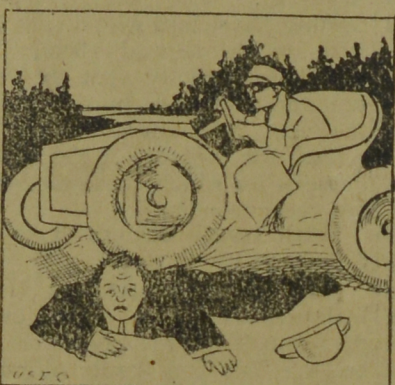
