OLD TIMES RECALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

(Farmer files, January 5, 1882.)

Inspector W. G. Gaunce, is off to Manitoba for a brief period.

Mr. George Hatt, Sr., has gone to California to visit his friends.

Week of prayer service in St. Paul's church this evening, Rev. F. D. Crawley presiding.

Mr. J. Hazelhurst, of St. John, is placing in position a new turntable for the Fredericton Railway.

Mr. J. R. Mace, principal of the York street school, preached in the Centenary church, St. John, last Sunday.

Mayor Fisher and Mr. J. Henry Phair, are the candidates for the mayoralty. The election takes place next Monday.

Rev. Messrs. Evans and Brewer preached at the dedicatory services of the new Methodist church, at Bloomfield last Sunday.

Mr. William Crockett has been chosen superintendent of the St. Paul's Presbyterian church Sunday school, vice Mr. H. Matheson, resigned.

Grand Master John Richards, and other members of Victoria Lodge, I. O. O. F., will install the officers of a new lodge at Woodstock this week.

Rev. A. J. Mowatt preached a very able sermon to a crowded congregation at the watch night services in the Methodist church Saturday night.

James Mitchell, barrister, of St. Stephen, has been visiting his former home at Keswick Ridge. His father, we regret to hear, has been very ill.

Tuesday morning Miss Currie, sister of Dr. Currie, of this city, was united in marriage at her father's residence, by Rev. F. D. Crawley, to Mr. Leek, of Boston.

Mr. Eben Miller has completely transformed the Barker House train coach into a handsome affair with plate glass and all the other modern conveniences.

Mr. C. H. Thomas is spoken of as a candidate for civic honors in St. Ann's ward. He will probably run with Ald. Simmons, and there is little prospect, at present, of opposition.

The following parties have been appointed to take the popular vote at the aldermanic elections on the water works question: Wellington ward Henry Pollock; St. Ann's Chas. L. Richards; Carleton John E. Perks; Queens, William Lockhart; Kings, James Burhill. The returning officers in the aldermanic elections are the same as last year, with the exception of Carleton ward, where Mr. Moses Hall successfully opposed Mr. J. F. McManus' reappointment, and had Mr. A. P. Miller, his own nominee appointed.

Mr. Andrew Dunlap, of Caverhill, met with a very serious loss on Saturday. He was coming to this city with quite a large quantity of butter, about 150 lbs., for sale, and when off Sugar Island, near what is known as Burpee's Bar, his horse, carriage and all broke through the ice and were lost to him. The current is swift at that point and the water about ten feet deep, so Mr. Dunlap had no chance of rescuing his carriage, which was a new one. The horse was a valuable animal, and with carriage, harness and butter, is a most serious loss. Mr. Dunlap, himself, escaped with a cold wetting.

The children of St. Dunstan's Sunday School were regaled on New Year's from two very handsome New Year's trees, kindly furnished by the young ladies of the church. The affair was held during the afternoon in St. Dunstan's Hall, Regent Street.

A young Swede who was brought to the Alms House, over a week ago with both his feet badly frozen, had them amputated on Monday by Drs. Patterson, Currie, and Jacob. He cannot speak a word of English, and his name and antecedents are unknown. It is a sad case.

Mr. W. H. Friel has been appointed Returning Officer for the Mayor's Election and in his absence Mr. Geo. H. Parker.

As Mr. Frank Bryson's engagement as leader of the 71st Batt. Band ended last week, and as a portion of the instruments are his property, the Battalion is now without a band. There should be some arrangement made before the Legislature opening, as the Battalion will be required to furnish a Guard of Honour and a band then.

The Curling Rink of Officers' Square has been flooded and the first game was played there yesterday afternoon. The home club has accepted the "Thistles" challenge to play in St. John on the 21st inst., has challenged the Chatham Club to a game the day after the "Thistles" play, and will invite St. Andrew's Club to play here for the Royal Caledonian Medal, Feb. 8th.

Mr. Alfred G. Edgcombe has been solicited by a number of influential parties to allow himself to be nominated for Carleton Ward, in the aldermanic elections. There will be no doubt of his return if he consents to run. Ald. Farrell, we presume, will meet with no opposition.

Hon. J. J. Fraser, Mr. Edward Jack, Mr. A. G. Beckwith, Mr. A. W. Smith, and Mr. J. A. McCallum of this city were among the excursionists over the Grand Southern Railway, yesterday. Several other gentlemen, including Col. Marsh, Police Magistrate, had invitations for the occasion, but were unable to accept them. The excursion train was in charge of Conductor McPeake.

Friends of Ex-Ald. Ritchey are endeavoring to persuade him to return to civic life and it is not improbable that he will yield to their solicitation. A flag hung to the breeze from Mr. F. B. Edgcombe's Dry Goods Establishment—the "Admon House" yesterday, was in honour of the marriage of Mr. J. M. McLellan, the popular book keeper, to Miss Etta Johnston.

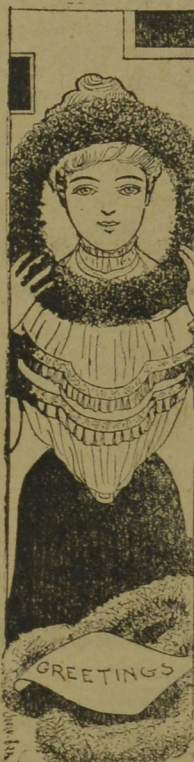

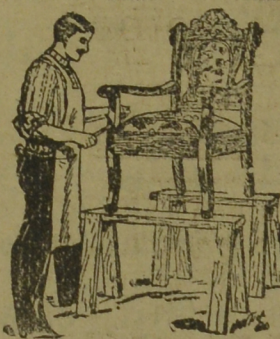
