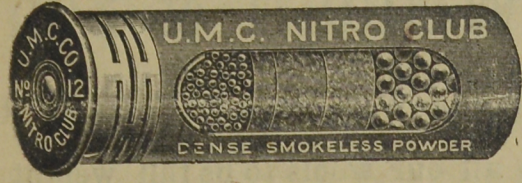
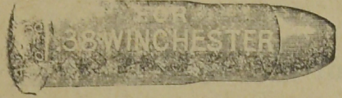

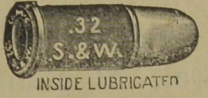

INTERVIEW WAS A "FAKE."

New York World Sends Chancellor Von Buelow a Cablegram Apologizing for the Publication.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The New York World, which recently published what it explains it then honestly believed to be a correct synopsis of the interview given by the German Emperor to Dr. William Bayard Hale, and subsequently suppressed, has sent the following cablegram to Chancellor Von Buelow:

"Prince Von Buelow, Imperial Chancellor, Berlin. "After a painstaking investigation the New York World finds no convincing basis of fact for its published synopsis of the Hale interview with His Majesty the German Emperor. It accepts your verdict that the alleged interview, ascribed to the Emperor are 'stupidly absurd words which he cannot have uttered.' As a matter of simple justice to the German Emperor and the German people, the World will print an editorial Monday morning expressing its sincere regret at the publication of a synopsis which it regards as misleading and mischievous. It was an honest mistake, committed merely through over-zeal, without the knowledge of the proprietor or chief editor and so late at night that the article did not appear in the first edition. Proof's of the synopsis were sent to the author of the interview, had been corrected in his own handwriting, and this was naturally accepted as evidence that the article printed was personally approved by him.

In publishing the foregoing cablegram tomorrow the World will state that the synopsis was submitted to Dr. Hale prior to his publication and that "ten words from him would have made publication impossible." It will add that Dr. Hale, having contented himself with the excision of several statements, the World printed the corrected copy in the belief that Dr. Hale in personally correcting the proofs "had affirmed the truth of every statement he left untouched." After reading the World's explanation tonight, Dr. Hale made public a statement in which he said that prior to its publication he had warned a representative of the World that the pretended synopsis was a "fake from beginning to end."

Charged through New York's Busy Streets.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The antics of a tiny pig so frightened a four-ton elephant today that the big beast broke away from her keepers at the Hippodrome, crashed through several stout doors which barred her passage, and started on a wild run toward the East River. Down 43rd street to Fifth avenue and then through crowded 34th street the huge beast swung about at a speed that amazed the great crowd following and spread consternation ahead of her. No hand was raised to stay her progress as she swept along the busy street dodging cars and automobiles.

Between first and second avenues the frightened beast stopped short and plunged into the entrance of a tenement house. The passage way was too narrow to admit her immense bulk, but the elephant threw

By the time her keeper arrived on the scene she had swept through half a dozen of these frail obstructions. The keeper finally succeeded in getting a rope around one of the elephants legs and held her until help arrived and the beast was securely tied.

When they arrived one of the elephants became as tractable as a kitten and the four were driven back to the Hippodrome.

WOMEN NOW HAVE UNFADING BLUSHES.

MacDonald Has Bestowed Imperishable Roses on Cheeks of Fair Americans.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 1.—Four American women have had imperishable blushes manufactured on their lily white cheeks. This look of youth of liquid application, no rouge so subtly applied as to defy the untutored eye of man. It is the rich unwavering color injected by the pricking of the tattooer and is warranted to withstand wind, weather the ravages of time and all other foes of juvenility.

The names of the four who bravely faced the ordeal in beauty's cause are not revealed, but the tattooer is Sutherland MacDonald, the Scotchman who decorated many famous Londoners women as well as men. MacDonald is now at work on the skins of the enthusiastic members of the Raquet Club, and progressive monsters are appearing on the backs

and chests of the blues blooded Quaker City men as a reward of his efforts. "American women do not take to my method of decoration," said MacDonald, but as an adjunct to the complexion I can force a cult in this country. "Tattooing, I believe, saved the life of the Earl of Lonsdale, in the Matabele war. Before he left England I imprinted a most terrifying picture of His Satanic Majesty on the nobleman's back. He was captured by the ferocious Matabele, who were about to slay him. As a last resort he displayed the devil in full regalia and told them the diabolic monster would surely devour them if he himself were harmed. They spared his life and were inclined to fall upon their knees and worship.

CITY PEOPLE HAVEN'T TIME TO LIVE.

A common and picturesque expression for a common experience runs, "It's so noisy I can't hear myself think." After a visit to New York we feel that its inhabitants are so deafened by the constant blare of noisy confusion that they can't feel themselves live. The steady sufferers from this complaint do not realize their condition. They find it on the whole less trouble not to feel themselves live, and they are most uneasy when chance forces them to spend a few days (on shipboard, for instance) where they are not protected by ceaseless and aimless activity from the consciousness that they are themselves. They cannot even conceive the bitter-sweet, vital taste of that closeness as we villagers have it, and they cannot understand how arid their existence seems to us without this unhurried, penetrating realization of their own existence and of the meaning of their acts. We do not blame city dwellers for not having it, we lost it when we venture into their maelstrom. Like them, we become dwarfed by over-

whelming, and shrivelled by the incapacity to "sense" the humanity of the countless human simulacra about us. But we do not stay where we cannot feel ourselves live! We hurry back to the shadows of Hemlock Mountain, feeling that to love life one does not need to be what is usually called happy, one need only to live. It cannot be, of course, that we are the only community to discover this patent fact but we know no more of the others than they of us. All that we hear from that part of America which is not Hillsboro' is the wild yell of excitement going up from the great cities, where people seem to be doing everything that was ever done or thought of except just living. City dwellers make money, make reputations (good and bad) make museums and subways, make charitable institutions, make with an gyrastic rapidity, like excited spiders more and yet more complications in the mazy labyrinth of their lives but they never make each other's acquaintances, and that is all that is worth doing in the world.

TO RETIRE FROM THRONE

Austria's Grand Old Puler Will be Emperor in Name Only After To-day

London, Dec. 1.—The accession of Francis Ferdinand to the throne of Austria-Hungary in all but title will take place Wednesday. He would be made regent officially that day if it were in the power of Francis Joseph to instal him without act of Parliament. For many months, as all the world now knows, Ferdinand has been Emperor in all but name. The world knows also how momentous has been the change in its effect, not only on the dual monarchy, but on the affairs of all Europe. The curse of misfortune seems destined to cling to Francis Joseph to the very end of his days. His energies and his faculties are declining fast. He is a feeble, tired old man, unable longer to discharge the duties of a great monarch.

Those who have in hand great schemes for Austro-Hungarian re-organization know too well the value to them of the grand old head of the house of Hapsburg, and they would not hear of granting his officials release from his labors. It will be announced at the jubilee next Wednesday that all but the administrative duties of his imperial office will be discharged hereafter by the heir apparent. Prince Ferdinand will represent him at almost all public functions and in all questions affecting the Government of the Empire. Certain documents must, of course, receive his pro forma signature, but to all intents and purposes Francis Joseph will cease to be Emperor and Francis Ferdinand will reign in his stead.

STRENGTHEN THE EMPIRE.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 30.—General Botha, speaking at a banquet here last night, made a strong plea for union. "There are," he said, "two questions facing us: 'What can we do for South Africa?' and 'what for the empire to which we belong?'" The answer is that we must unite and strengthen ourselves and the empire. The people of these States have a great opportunity, carrying with it the responsibility of saying whether they will go forward as one people or as different peoples. The good relations which prevail today will assist us in attaining the ideal of one united nation."

General Dewet, who proposed the success of the convention, emphasized the necessity of a policy to give and take.
