

RASCALLY BIGAMIST.

Brought Sorrow to Two Families While Masquerading as a Moralist and Preacher

RENFREW, Ont., June 3.—The arrest of John E. Anderson, inspector of schools at Brockville, and formerly principal at the public schools here, on a charge of bigamy, continues to astonish the people of this place, where Anderson enjoyed the highest reputation, and where Miss Florence Jamieson, his victim, lived. Miss Jamieson, as related in yesterday's despatches, is the youngest daughter of Rev. W. S. Jamieson, of the Renfrew Methodist church.

Rev. and Mrs. Jamieson have been attending the Methodist Conference in Quebec and the news was only broken to them there Monday. As Mr. Jamieson has just been appointed to his new station in Stanstead, Quebec he was to have preached there Sunday, and no services were held in the Methodist Church here.

PROSTRATED WITH GRIEF.

Miss Jamieson, Anderson's second wife, is only twenty-one years of age and along with her two elder sisters who alone are at home, is prostrated with grief, and medical attendance had to be called.

The ladies of the church here had been making arrangements to give the Jamieson family a farewell banquet this week before their departure but it will probably be dropped now. Mr. Jamieson was to have preached his farewell sermon here Sunday his farewell sermon here Sunday next.

Anderson's first wife is living at present in Toronto and he is said to have nine children, five daughters and four sons, two of whom have wives and children. His first wife's name was Eliza Jane Walker, and the marriage took place on May 24th 1877, at Wingham, Huron county, it being celebrated by the Rev. G. A. Mitchell, Methodist minister of that place. His own brother was a witness of the marriage, and the certificate showed that he was twenty-three years of age at the time. His correct age now would therefore be fifty-four, but at his marriage in April his age was registered as 39.

HAS NOT SUPPORTED THEM.

It appears that all communication with his family was carried on by Anderson through his son, and Anderson has done nothing towards the support of his family for at least three years.

Just before his second marriage, it appears that he caused a letter to be sent to his first wife from out West, saying that while on his way to a school in British Columbia, he caught small-pox on the train and was forced to get off at Banff, while

at the same time he was arranging for his marriage here.

After his marriage in April, it appears that a marked copy of a paper containing the account of the wedding, fell into the hands of his wife in Toronto. Information was then laid by the family to the Department of Justice at Toronto, and investigations were immediately begun, which finally led to his arrest.

Having pleaded guilty on being brought before the magistrate, he was asked whether he would be tried by the magistrate or by the jury. He chose the former, but refused to have a solicitor for his case as he saw that the evidence was too strong against him. He was taken to Penbrooke by Chief McDermott.

PREACHED IN CHURCH.

Anderson was at one time connected with the Great Western Insurance Company, but for the last number of years has been teaching. He was principal of the public school here for two years, until last September when he received the appointment of Inspector of schools at Brockville, where he has lived ever since.

On a number of occasions while in Renfrew he conducted the services in the Methodist church.

BROCKVILLE SHOCKED.

Brockville was equally shocked by the arrest of Anderson. The citizens had no inkling of the double life that he was leading.

As soon as he entered upon his duties at Brockville Anderson took an active interest in public affairs, more particularly church work, only a few days ago delivering an address on "The Ideal Man" before the Young Men's Club of a local church.

Mrs. Anderson, wife No. 1, living in Toronto, is terribly crushed in spirit by the news of her husband's doings. She feels it very keenly, and all her nine children are just as sensitive as the mother.

"It has been such a terrible blow to me. A woman could be dealt no harder a blow under God's heaven than this," she told a reporter.

"You do not intend to press the charge against him?" she was asked. "Oh, no," she answered. "I'll let the other people do that."

Anderson was in Toronto last Easter on a visit to his wife and family. For the last few years the Andersons have lived in Toronto. Previously they resided in Huron County, where Anderson taught before coming to this city. He did some insurance work here, but was unable to obtain a school.

Anderson will come up for sentence Saturday.

A MAN OF MANY WIVES.

Fred. J. Watson Under Arrest at Pittsburg.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 3.—The husband of at least a dozen young women who succumbed to his blandishments and his oily personality, and whose sudden departure from as many cities was hastened by his fear of the same number of police departments, is the record of Fred. J. Watson, who is under arrest in Pittsburg as a many times over bigamist. Watson is a second Johann Hoch, with the difference that he is not accused of killing any of his wives. Watson is believed to have married three young women here—Miss Marie Young of Newport, Ky., Miss Francis Evelyn Stewart of this city and a Miss Vandeman of Dayton, Ohio. Besides these, he is known to have married Miss Hattie Connors in Buffalo, Miss Agnes Mullin, an actress, in Toronto and others in Detroit and Windsor and other large cities. Watson's method is to marry young women, live with them long enough to rob them of what money and jewellery they possessed, and then desert them. In this manner he is said to have accumulated thousands of dollars. From the Dayton wife he secured in the neighborhood of \$2,000 from the Newport girl \$800, and from Miss Stewart a little over \$1,000. Most of it was in cash, representing the life savings of his victims.

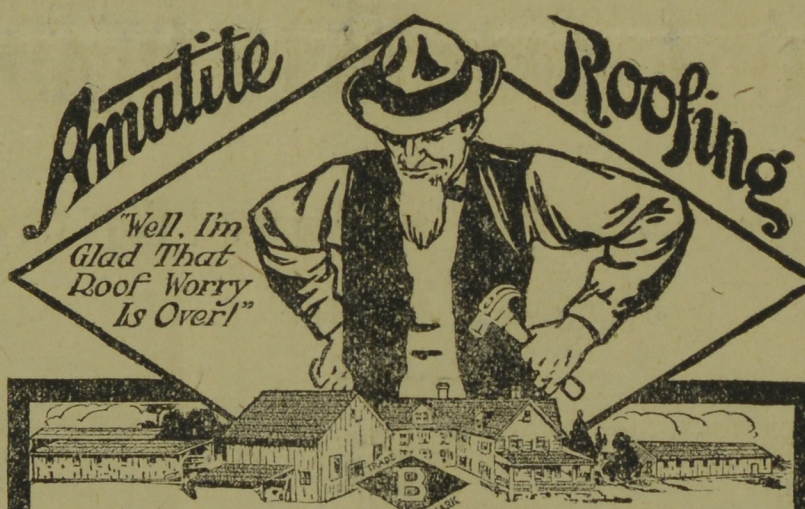

DEAD SEA BATHING.

It Must Be Horrible Torture, According to This Account.

In an article on bathing in the Dead Sea a clergyman who has made the experiment says: "No sooner has one plunged into the water than one is whipped off one's feet and goes bobbing helplessly about, like a wretched cork. 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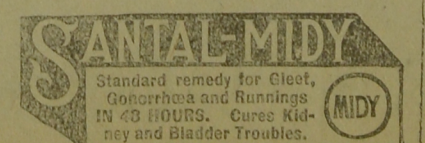
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STEAMER NOTICE
