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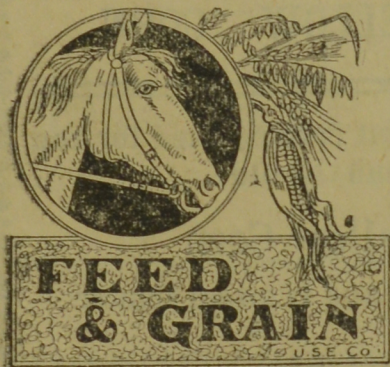

LATE GEN. BULLER

Britain's Brave Soldiers Had a Distinguished Career.

But Dropped Out of Sight in Recent Years.

LONDON, June 2.—General Redvers Henry Buller, who has been ill for some weeks past, died this morning.

In April General Buller contracted a chill in London, and this indisposition was followed by a severe attack of jaundice and other complications. Early in May a hopeful view of his recovery was entertained by his physician, and the turn for the worse was unexpected.

General Buller married Lady Audrey Jane Charlotte, daughter of the fourth Marquis Townsend.

There was a time—at the beginning of the South African war—when the name of Sir Redvers Buller was on every lip, but during the past few years he was dropped out of public notice, and occasional speeches at public functions in which some free and sometimes fiery criticism of military affairs has been made, have been the only reminders that this once famous general was a watchful observer of army developments.

GEN. BULLER'S CAREER.

Sir Redvers Buller was born in 1839, the son of Mr. J. W. Buller, M. P., of Crediton, Devonshire, and was educated at Harrow, but at the age of nineteen he entered the army.

He first saw active service with his regiment, the 60th Rifles, in the China campaign of 1860. In 1870 he was promoted to a captaincy, and came out to Canada on the Red River expedition, where he was first associated with Lord Wolsley.

Three years later he accompanied General Wolsley on the Ashantee campaign as head of the intelligence department and was slightly wounded at the battle of Ordabai. He was mentioned in the despatches, and made a C. B., besides being raised to the rank of major. In the Kafir war of 1878-9 and the Zulu war of 1879 he was conspicuous as an intrepid and popular leader of cavalry and built up a reputation for courage and dogged determination. In particular the manner in which he conducted the retreat at Mhlabana drew attention to these qualities. He earned the V. C. for his assistance in rescuing Capt. D'Arcy and Lieut. Everett on that occasion, and was given the C. M. G. and made Lieut. Col. and A. D. C. to the Queen.

IN SOUTH AFRICA.

In the Boer war of 1881 Sir Redvers was Sir Evelyn Wood's chief of staff, and from that disastrous campaign he emerged with enlarged military experience. In 1882 he was head of the Field Intelligence department in the Egyptian campaign, and for his services at Kassassin and Tel-el-Kebir he was knighted. Two years later he commanded an infantry brigade in the Sudan under Sir Gerald Graham, and took part in the battles of El Teb and Tamai, being promoted Major-General for dis-

DECLINES NOMINATION.

Sir Hibbert Tupper will not Contest Pictou for the House of Commons His Reasons for Backdown.

The fat is certainly in the fire of the Conservative camp in Pictou County, says the Anticosti News. Sir Hibbert Tupper has written a letter to Hector Sutherland, President of the Conservative party in that county, definitely declaring that he will not be a candidate in the next election, but there hangs a tale.

Shortly after Sir Hibbert was nominated, the News predicted that his acceptance of the nomination was a huge bluff and that it was intended solely for the purpose of infusing some fighting qualities into the ranks of the Conservatives of the province.

That this was the original intention there is but little doubt, but as time rolled on, we became convinced that Sir Hibbert really intended to cross the continent and fight another contest in Pictou. He wrote letters to the New Glasgow papers informing them of his intentions to contest the County. He manifested a financial interest in the revision of the lists and it was even intimated that he had taken up a summer residence in Pictou.

A few weeks ago, however, Mr. Sutherland, who was responsible for engineering the nomination through the convention received a letter from Sir Hibbert resigning the candidature of the party in that county. He gave definite reasons for so doing, the most important being that he was not in harmony with the Conservative leaders in British Columbia, and that he and his party leaders in Ottawa did not see eye to eye.

Mr. Sutherland did not make the letter public but wrote a strong reply to Sir Hibbert urging him to run. A prominent Nova Scotian, happened to be in Vancouver a few days after Sir Hibbert had written his letter of resignation and was his guest during the day. Sir Hibbert showed to him a copy of the letter written to Mr. Sutherland and his Nova Scotian friend,

tinted service in the field. In the Sudan campaign of 1884-5, he was given the command of the desert column when Sir Herbert Stewart was wounded. He once more distinguished himself on this occasion by his conduct of the retreat from Gubat to Gakdul, and by his victory at Abu Klea Wells. For this he was created K. C. B. After this came some years of service at the War Office, and a short period in the capacity of Under Secretary for Ireland. He attained the rank of Lieut.-General after further war office service.

At the War office his power of work, his quick mastery of detail and trenchant criticism inspired those that came in contact with him with the belief that he was fitted for the highest command, and in 1895, when the Duke of Cambridge was about to retire from the post of Commander-in-chief, it was an open secret that the Rosbary cabinet intended Sir Redvers Buller to be his successor, though it was reported that the conditions of the position were to be modified and the title changed to that of "Chief of Staff." When Lord Salisbury's government went into power, Lord Wolsley was chosen in his stead.

IN THE BOER WAR.

At the outbreak of the Boer war in 1899 Sir Redvers was selected with unusual approval to take command of the South African field force. Owing to the Boer investment of Ladysmith and the apparent helplessness of the general, to relieve the situation in Natal he rushed off to Natal to supervise personally the rescue of Sir George White, but on December 15th, his attempt to cross the Tugela at Colesburg was repulsed with 1,100 casualties and the loss of the guns. The government alarmed at the situation and the tone of Sir Redvers' messages sent out Lord Roberts to supersede him in the chief command. Sir Redvers being left in subordinate command of the force in Natal. His second attempt to relieve Ladysmith proved another failure, the result of his operations at Spion Kop on the 24th January, causing consternation in England.

A third attempt early in February was again unsuccessful and he was not until the 27th February that the relief of Ladysmith was accomplished largely through the carrying of adjacent hills by General Hilyard.

HIS LATER YEARS.

In 1901 Sir Redvers was appointed to the Aldershot command, the most important in the new army scheme, and his appointment met with a storm of adverse criticism. On the 10th of October, 1901, at a luncheon in London he made a speech in answer to these criticisms, and this being held to be a breach of discipline, and contrary to the regulations he was immediately relieved of his command and retired on half pay.

thinking that the letter had been made public wrote to a Liberal friend in New Glasgow and incidentally mentioned that he had called on Sir Hibbert and had read a copy of his letter of resignation. The story spread like wild fire through New Glasgow, but as Mr. Sutherland was forty miles from civilization in the back woods of Guysboro on a fishing trip, the story could not be confirmed until his arrival home last Saturday.

When he stepped from the train in New Glasgow there was a large number of Conservatives waiting for him, to whom he was forced to confess that the rumors which they had heard were too true. Sir Hibbert has resigned. He had written a letter to ask him to reconsider and that as yet he had received no reply.

It was a thunder bolt out of a clear sky. The mellowing influences of the Pacific breezes had worked a beneficial change in Sir Hibbert's heart and he was "out" with his leaders in British Columbia, he was "out" with the leaders in Ottawa and he was going to stay "out" of the fight in Pictou.
