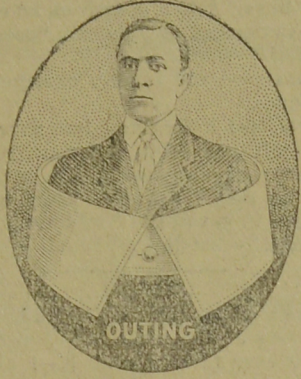
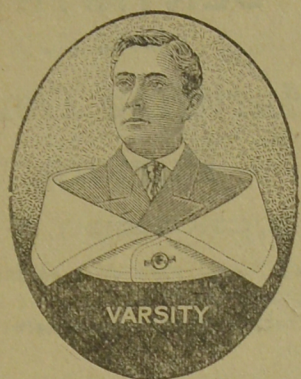

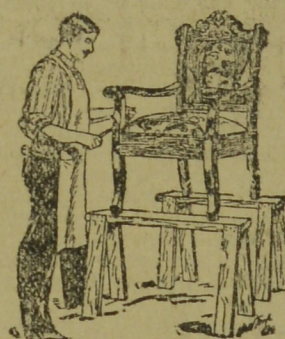

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D., 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand... \$ 35 00
The same for each successive evening performance... 30 00
The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light)... 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery... 30 00
The same as above without scenery... 25 00
The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night... 27 00
The same without scenery per night... 23 00
For one week stand with scenery... 135 00
For the same without scenery... 120 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for

light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery 15 00
For the same without scenery 10 00
For each matinee, local talent only 7 50
For each political meeting 15 00
On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting 10 00
For two meetings same person, same day 15 00
For rehearsals for afternoon... 3 00
For rehearsals for evening 5 00
For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night 20 00
The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night 18 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 10 00
Passed and enacted the Seventh day of April, A.D., 1908.

STILL CLIMBING DOWN

Understanding Likely to Put Stop to Tory Obstruction in Parliament.

OTTAWA, June 4.—(Special)—In the House of Commons this morning Dr. Reid, Conservative member for Grenville declared he had not had his yacht repaired in the government shipyard without paying for it.

Mr. Porden said I. C. R. employees in Temiscouata were being coerced into supporting the Liberals in the Quebec fight.

Mr. Graham said he would have the matter looked into.

Sir Fred Borden stated that the militia camps would be held during the summer if money was provided. He would soon make a statement regarding the troops to go to Quebec.

Mr. Daniel St. John, protested against the swell representation left maritime provinces.

OTTAWA, June 4.—At an opposition caucus yesterday afternoon it was decided that the obstruction policy would not be enforced against the item in the militia estimates for holding annual training camps this year. The opposition are realizing that their policy of complete obstruction of all items of supply is getting them in bad color with civil servants throughout the country who are being kept out of their salaries with consequent far-reaching effect upon the public generally. There was some plain talk in the caucus yesterday against the folly of unnecessarily holding up pressing and non-con-

tentious items in the estimates. By letting a small amount of estimates through each day, it was pointed out the public might be led to think the time-killing criticisms, which take up the time of the House each day were in a measure legitimate. At the same time obstruction would be equally effective as by passing only a small amount of supply each day the session could be indefinitely prolonged.

The growing feeling in the country against the wilful waste of time in the commons and the blocking of public business, is beginning to have an effect on the members to the Speaker's left, and the wisdom of resisting all offers of compromise is now doubted by many members of the opposition.

The two leaders are both anxious to arrive at some agreement on the contentious clause of the election bill that will be satisfactory to both parties, thus enabling the business of legislation to proceed. It is hoped that negotiations now under way will result next week in a way out of the present impasse, and what both sides say they want will be achieved, viz., fair lists in Manitoba.

That will pave the way for a speedy winding up of the rest of the sessional agenda, and with morning sittings of the House from now on, prorogation may be reached early in July.

Five hours' talk in the Commons yesterday resulted in the passing of one item for supply, totalling \$217,000. The vote was for astronomical surveys.

It was another day of obstruction by the opposition.

An estimate of \$920,000 for immigration was under discussion when the house adjourned at six o'clock.

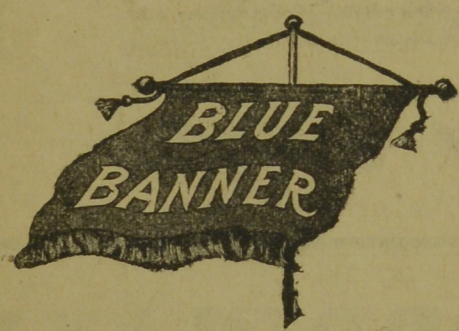
