PRIZE ESSAY.

He reached Egypt on the 58th of January, 1884. His task was to evacuate the Soudan, bringing into Egypt the garrison and the friendly population of the cities of the Soudan. Most of these people had retired to Khartoum for safety, and accordingly he proceeded with a small body guard to that trading centre of the Upper Nile.

On his arrival he found things in a VERY DISORDERED CONDITION.

and immediately set about to restore peace and quiet. He cancelled all debts to the government, abolished cruel punishment, released many prisoners after a fair hearing, and issued a proclamation, limiting but not prohibiting the slave-trade.

During this time the Mahdi's army had gradually closed in on Khartoum and the famous siege began. Khartoum had at this time a population of about 50,000. The garrison itself was comprised of Arab and Soudanese soldiers. General Gordon did not think much of these troops, for in one of his letters home, he calls them "cowardly," "effeminate," "lying brutes," these Arabs and Soudanese, but in another place he remarks that they fought well in the trenches.

General Gordon had only two companions of his own race during the siege, Colonel Stewart and Mr. Power, a war correspondent. Both of these men were killed in sorties before the end of the siege.

Imagine Gordon's position! One Englishman with the care and responsibility of many women and children hemmed in by thousands of barbarous, uncivilized Africans.

As the siege wore on food became scarce, and suffering began to make itself known. Innumerable sorties were made by the garrison, but all in vain. The enemy

Toward the close of the year 1884, Gordon's hope of winning out began to diminish, and he pathetically anticipates the approaching end in his last letter to his sister, in which he says, "I am quite happy—like Lawrence I have tried to do my duty."

Yet no thought of compromise or surrender ever entered his mind. Surrender to that horde of barbarians? Oh, no! Death with honor would be a thousand times better than life with dishonor.

England now began to take notice that one of her bravest sons was in danger, and a relief expedition was dispatched under Lord Wodehouse. This was on the 28th of August, 1884, but so slowly did it make way through the enemy's country that at the end of the year it was still miles from Khartoum.

Gordon sent his boats down the river to meet it, thus cutting off his only hope of escape.

After this little was heard from the besieged city until about the last of January, 1885, the dread tidings came that Khartoum had fallen and Gordon was dead.

Particulars are meagre of this disaster. We do not even

KNOW HOW GORDON DIED,

but we can imagine that it was as he wished to die, probably trying to rally his scattered troops—a true soldier's death.

The relief expedition arrived some days later, but too late, too late to save what England prizes most—the life of one of her subjects.

General Gordon was dead, dead and yet living—living as only a true and noble man can—live after death—in the minds and hearts of the people. His influence was felt wherever he had been—England, China and the Soudan.

His letters and diaries give us an insight into his character beside much valuable information about the various countries he had visited.

The religious side of his nature was uppermost. Nowhere can we find a better example of a true Christian man than in General Gordon. His faith in his maker carried him through the lonely marches over the desert, as Governor, and again as Viceroy of the Soudan, and only his belief in God kept up his courage in the siege of Khartoum, when others had abandoned all hope.

Perhaps we think of General Gordon

than as a missionary to the heathen, yet he was both, and he is remembered today in the Soudan by his mission work just as much as by his military achievements.

Indeed the natives held him in such veneration on account of his benevolent work that crowds of men and women were accustomed to wait for his appearance, wishing to show respect by kissing his feet.

A study of the career of this distinguished British officer and gentleman should be an incentive to all who value the attributes of personal courage, Christian character, patriotism and the many other qualities for which the Marjory of the Soudan was remarkable—a soldier of the Cross, a soldier of the King of Kings. Well might it be said of General Gordon as of Lord Nelson: "Fame's rugged steps with daring feet he trod. True to his King, his country, and his God."
