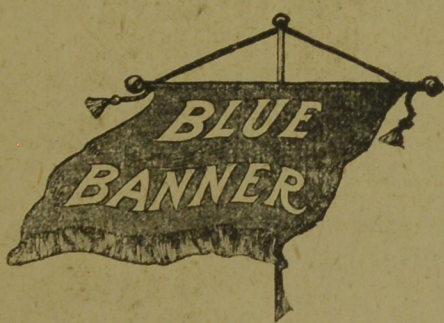

NOVEL CHURCH PARADE.

Military Veterans of the City Attend
Service at the Cathedral.

The military veterans of the city,
to the number of about forty held
their first church parade on Sunday
morning and passed off very suc-
cessfully. They assembled at the
Drill Hall at 10.30 o'clock, and with
the 71st Regiment band in the lead
marched to the cathedral by way of
Queen Street. The South African
veterans, who composed the majori-
ty of the party wore khaki uniforms
waile the Fenian raid, and northwest
veterans were in mufti. Capt. Thom-
as McKenzie, a veteran of the Indian
mutiny, and Capt. the Hon. T. Ash-
burnham, who served with distinction
in the Egyptian war also paraded in
uniform. The veterans marched well,
and attracted much attention from
the large number of spectators who
lined the streets.

The service at the cathedral was
an impressive one and attracted a
large congregation. The clergyman
taking part were very Rev. Dean
Schofield, Rev. Sub Dean Street and
Rev. Canon Montgomery, chaplain of
the 71st Regiment. The sermon was
by Rev. Canon Montgomery and was
an exceedingly able effort. He spoke
words of praise for the brave Cana-
dian boys who fought in South Af-
rica, and told how Canadians at home
had been thrilled at the welcome
of the great victory at Paardeberg.
The reverend gentleman's able dis-
course was followed with the closest
interest.

During the service the splendid
choir of the cathedral rendered "On-
ward Christian Soldiers" and at the
close all joined in the National An-
them.

At 8.30 a. m. the South African
veterans accompanied by the 71st band
veterans, accompanied by the 71st
band, marched to the rural cemetery
and decorated the graves of their
comrades in arms, Harry Ryan, Har-
ry McCatherine, Bugler Ryan and
Private Reddin. The bandmen plac-
ed a floral harp upon the grave of
the late Arthur Smith, a former mem-
ber who was drowned in the river
two years ago. Rev. Canon Mont-
gomery met the veterans at the cen-
tery and assisted in decorating the
graves.

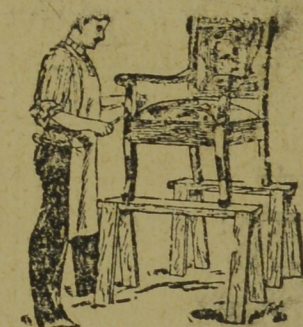

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to
regulate the City Hall Building, Of-
fices and Opera House.

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Alder-
men and Commonalty of the City
of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regu-
late the City Hall Building, Offices
and Opera House," passed the fourth
day of January A. D. 1898, is here-
by repealed and the following substi-
tuted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of
September, 1902, the following shall
be the charges for the use of the
Opera House, and it shall be the
duty of the Manager in all cases to
adhere strictly to the terms of such
scale.

For any performance or enter-
tainment requiring a clear
stage for a one night stand. \$ 35 00

The same for each successive
evening performance

The same for each Matinee
(exclusive of any extra
charge for light)

For dramatic, operatic, vari-
ety, pantomime, comedy,
motion pictures, entertain-
ments, and for all lectures,
readings, concerts or per-
formances of any kind where any
foreign talent is employed,
each night with scenery

The same as above without
scenery

The same for course of three
to five consecutive nights
with scenery, per night

The same without scenery per
night

For one week stand with
scenery

For the same without scenery
for each matinee (exclusive
of any extra charge for

light)

For dramatic, operatic, vari-
ety, pantomime, comedy, en-
tertainment, and for all lec-
tures, readings, concerts or
performances of any kind, being lo-
cal talent only, and having no
paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel per-
formances and having no
foreign talent, each night
with scenery

For the same without scenery
for each matinee, local tal-
ent only

For each political meeting

On the Sabbath for religious
or temperance meetings, one
meeting

For two meetings same per-
son, same day

For rehearsals for afternoon

For rehearsals for evening

For each motion picture en-
tertainment owned and op-
erated by residents of the
city, per night

The same for three to five
consecutive nights, per night

For each matinee (exclusive
of any extra charge for
light)
