PROPERTY PURCHASE.
Dr. J. A. McAllister has recently

purchased from Mr. Geo. A. Perley, who represents the Simonds estate, what is known as the Dunn property, situated on the river side of Queen St., immediately above the Bank of British North America. The sum paid was \$1600, which is considered extremely reasonable, and it is said the doctor as already been offered a sum quite in advance of the one he paid.

He contemplates important improvements of the premises. One of the houses thereon he will put up as a two story double tenement and the other as a single tenement. One part of the former he will occupy himself. He has already had estimates from Mr. Henry B. Clarke, carpenter, as to the probable cost of the proposed changes, but the work will not be undertaken before the 1st of May next, when the lease of the present tenant expires. The property has an excellent location, a fine front on Queen street, and runs back to the river, where there are extensive wharf privileges, which are under lease to the railway authorities.

SACKVILLE FIRE.
The Mount Allison Male Academy was totally destroyed by fire, Sunday morning. The fire was discovered breaking from the furnace used for cooking in an ell at 3 a.m., and the alarm was given by one of the female domestics who slept in a room over the kitchen. The inmates were aroused, but in the absence of any appliances to suppress the flames, nothing could be done to save the building. In a few minutes the flames gained the main building and from there ran along the halls inside and burnt through the windows.

After five o'clock, the west end fell in, and at six the east. The students saved their clothes, excepting Masters Purdy, Sinclair and Tapley. The loss is from \$25,000 to \$30,000. The insurance is \$16,000. The building was a three storey wooden structure. A large number of students have already found lodging in the remaining buildings and others will board in the vicinity. The operations of the school will be continued, as the class rooms are still intact. The old Academy was burned down sixteen years ago this month. It is confidently expected that the work of rebuilding will be commenced at once. A. D. McCully, B. A., a theological student who rode on horseback down through the village to give the alarm and raise a crowd to save the neighboring houses, had his leg broken above the ankle by his horse falling with him.

OFTEN DISCOURAGING.
"The work is often discouraging, but when upon the second visit the nurse find the consumptive father who had been sleeping in the same bed with his two children, with the window not only closed, but the shade drawn, has made arrangements to have a room by himself with both window shades out and using sanitary sputum cups; when she finds her patient not only carrying out instructions, but imparting her knowledge to her neighbors, when the older children are found trying to protect the younger ones and dampening the room as she sweeps her mother's room, she looks forward to better results in the future."

"I must not forget to mention the persons I find who sit three or four feet from the kitchen stove and aim the expectoration at the coal hod. The coal hod and floor, as you can readily see, are soon well bespattered with sputum, and when the mother replenishes the fire she gets these germs on her hands, but without washing them proceeds with the preparation of the dinner. Then she seizes the broom and makes the dust fly which contains the germs breathed by the eight persons who use this kitchen as a living room with closed windows. Surely in such cases we are sowing the seed broadcast. We are aiming at the disease, tuberculosis, and wish to drive it from our midst. Therefore let us not sacrifice cleanliness for that alone will do it."

Read Instructive Paper on Treatment of Tuberculosis at Providence R. I.

The Providence, R. I., Sunday Journal publishes the following in a recent issue:

The beneficial results of the visiting work done by the nurses of the Providence District Nursing Association in the fight against tuberculosis in the Providence homes, including the telling of the incidents connected with the work which resulted in the cure of the disease or the prevention of its spread, were presented by Miss Mary Murray in an address delivered at the Tuberculosis Exposition at the Outlet last evening. Dealing as it did with the conditions of the physicians in the city of Providence, her address was of considerable interest to all who listened.

MISS MURRAY'S ADDRESS.
"Since April last we have visited about 450 families, caring for fully 400 patients and in making in all over 3,000 visits. We go to the homes, come in personal contact with these persons and their surroundings, and then try in every way to help carry out the directions of the physicians as to the care of the sputum, proper food and clothing, exercise and rest."

In speaking of the means of prevention Miss Murray emphasized the

fact that the sputum should be destroyed, and that all things connected with the patient should be kept separate from those belonging to the rest of the family. She said:

"Neither should your pencils, fingers, stamps or other foreign bodies be moistened with saliva, which contains germs. Teach the children never to accept gum, candy or a toy which has been in another child's mouth."

Continuing she said: "When the nurses have found that consumptives have been sleeping with other members of the family for want of a bed they provide steeper chairs. They also provide steeper chairs, army and fibre blankets, which add much to the health and comfort of the people, who are instructed to remain in the open air as much as possible by day and always by night. Some of our people have slept in the open yard in chairs all winter with the exception of a very few stormy nights."

"Patients are urged to spend their money for good food, not for patent medicines, and in some instances milk and eggs have been provided, also clothing."
