PITTSBURG, Pa., January 17.—

The Carnegie Hero Commission at its fourth annual meeting here today, awarded seven bronze and nine silver medals for acts of heroism, besides \$10,050 in cash to the heroes or their dependants and monthly payments during life to two widows and their minor children. The awards included:

Wm. H. A. Misset, aged eleven, of Springfield, Mass., on August 7, 1906 saved Frank L. Cook, aged nineteen, twice his weight, from drowning while

swimming, bronze medal.

John Bibby, aged 29, mate of Grayhurst, Ont., on Oct. 31, 1905, rescued James Jamieson, aged 40, and a companion, who were thrown into Muskoka Lake when a storm capsized their skiff, silver medal.

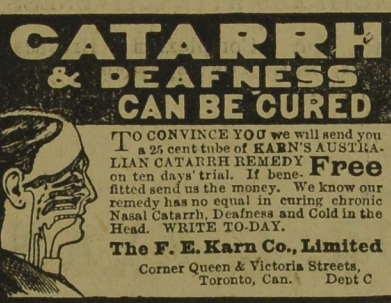
Wm. Raymond, aged 38, teamster of Lindsay, Ont., on February 27, 1906, rescued Victor Henry, ten years old, who broke through the ice while skating, bronze medal and \$300 to pay the mortgage on his house. Raymond has been ill and has recently sustained a relapse because of exposure.

William Gilmour, aged 31, of Montreal, Canada, a printer, who on July 1, 1905, leaped from a St. Lawrence river steamer in an attempt to rescue John A. Moorehouse, aged ten, who had fallen from the third deck, silver medal, and \$1,000 to pay mortgage on house.

MARATHONS SHUT OUT

St. John Hockeyists were like Children in the hands of the Capitals, Score 12 to 0

Home Team have three Victories and no Defeats—Have Shut out Opponents every Time

CAPITALS, 12; MARATHONS, 0.

The St. John Marathons came in for the worst drubbing of the season in the league hockey match with the Fredericton Capitals at the Arctic rink here last evening. It was a twelve to nothing shot for the home team, and nobody was greatly surprised at the result. The Marathons although they were able to score against Moncton in two games bucked up against a different proposition when they faced the Capitals on the ice last night, and were routed horse, foot and artillery. The Capitals played duck and drakes with them all the way through, and had it been possible to do anything more than shut them out, the Capitals would have certainly done it.

The half time score was 4-0 in favor of the home team, and in the balance of the game they landed the disk into the net eight times.

The game was in every way a spirited contest, but from the spectators point of view it was a trifle too one-sided. They would probably have preferred seeing the Capitals up against opponents more worthy of their steel, but it was not to be. There were nearly one thousand spectators gathered in the rink, and judging by the enthusiasm displayed, there is no need to fear for the future of hockey in this city, if the present standard of play is maintained by the Fredericton team.

Percy Howard of St. John handled the game but unfortunately the players were not out for over strenuous work and he had little to do apart from keeping an eagle eye out for off-side plays. It is greatly to the credit of both teams that not a single player was penalized during the game and there was no serious accidents, although the referee on one occasion came in for a sharp whack on the shins from a hockey stick which made him dance for a few moments. Even if all the Capitals had not been able to stay on the ice during the game it is doubtful if the Marathons would have found the net.

Jack D. the Captain of Fredericton team was the favorite of the evening. He maintained a firm grip on the game all the way through and always bobbed up at the right moment to make trouble for the Marathons forward line. He had able assistance from Point Music and the forwards of the Capitals, and gave the Marathons no opportunity to score.

The Capitals forced the game from the start and dealt out gilt edged hockey. Once or twice the Marathons worked the puck up to within a few yards of the Fredericton goal but when the critical moment came they usually got out of joint. On one occasion Capt. Mooney had a splendid opportunity to score but his aim was bad and he missed the goal by a yard. On another occasion the Marathons managed to work the puck to within a few feet of the mouth of the Fredericton net and made three shots in quick succession but everyone was blocked by stonewall Morrison.

The forward line of the Capitals have tremendous speed and the boys were able to skate rings around their opponents. The ice was in good condition and the combination work they put on was superb. They also handled the sticks scientifically and dodged about and played the game in all departments.

Murray, Stewart and Ranson of the Capitals forward line, put up the real goods during the evening and Dunphy played a good game in spots, after Referee Howard was active in looking after the players and fair in his decisions. A few geese scattered about the audience did not appear to like his way of doing business but the other spectators appeared to be well satisfied.

Capt. Mooney played well for the Marathons and had very good support from Derouin, Woodworth and Lemesurier. They did the best they could under the circumstances but the pace was altogether too swift for them.

The Marathons if they improve some should be able to make it fairly warm for the Marystown Crescents.

THE GAME.

Fortunately the St. John train was on time and the Marathons reached the rink at 8.20 o'clock. There was no unnecessary delay and at 8.40 o'clock all the players were on the ice. At the sound of the referee's whistle the puck went spinning into St. John territory, but was quickly returned, and a shot at the Capitals goal went wild. The Capitals carried the puck back with a rush and two hot ones aimed in quick succession at the Marathons goal was neatly blocked by Ellis. The first goal was shot by Stewart at the end of three minutes play. This was followed by some very sharp work on the part of both teams and only two minutes elapsed

before Stewart again banged the puck into the net.

The Capitals had things pretty much their own way during the remainder of the second half. Capt. John D. got hold of the puck several times and worked it well down the ice but something always happened to prevent him from scoring. Dunphy after some very skillful manipulation, shot the puck into the Marathons' net after fourteen minutes play, and Stewart repeated the trick half a minute later. The score at the close of the first half stood 4-0, in favor of the Fredericton.

THE SECOND HALF.

The Capitals seemed to play with more snap in the second half, while the Marathons simply made the best they could of a bad bargain. The visitors were kept on the defensive almost continuously, and had no opportunity to practice any new wrinkles they may have acquired since the beginning of the season. Dunphy scored for the Capitals after play had been in progress two minutes, and before the Greeks had recovered from the shock, Stewart notched another. Two minutes later Ranson, who had been playing a remarkably good game, scored for his team. Soon afterwards the Marathons managed to work the disk into Fredericton territory but were afraid to get into close quarters with the Capitals defence, and so made nothing out of it. Ranson scored another for Fredericton at the end of eight minutes. Jack D. and Stewart each had a chance to score during the next two minutes, but failed to make good. Jack D., however, by his rushes, succeeded in living things up a bit, and was applauded by the spectators. Murphy scored goal No. 9 for his team, and it was a very pretty piece of work, making the total stand 9 to 0. Whatever hope the Marathons may have had of scoring was dissipated by this time, and they did little more than play on the defensive. Music, who is one of the finest players on the Fredericton team, scored the tenth goal for his team, and came in for well deserved applause. Some good combination work on the part of the Capitals followed, resulting in another goal, shot by Murphy. The Marathons, by a piece of good luck, managed to work the puck into Fredericton territory, and sent three hot ones over at the net in quick succession. Stonewall Morrison was right on to his job, however, and allowed nothing past him. Murphy shot the last goal for his team, making an even dozen. After the face off Mooney got in touch with the puck, and for once caught the Capitals off their guard. He carried the puck unopposed to within six feet of the mouth of the Capitals' goal, but made a wretched shot. The game ended with the score standing 12 to 0 in favor of Fredericton.
