PROSPEROUS YEAR

financial and other Affairs of Brunswick Street Baptist Church quite Satisfactory

The annual meeting of the Brunswick street United Baptist church was held last night when reports were presented from the different organizations representing the various activities of the church. Vacancies were also filled in the list of officers. The pastor presented his report, which showed four baptisms administered; 25 marriages solemnized; 38 funerals conducted; 96 sermons delivered; 30 addresses; 76 prayer meetings; 42 Bible classes; 842 pastoral visits. As secretary of the Maritime Convention, and moderator of the N. B. association, he is obliged to devote on an average one day of each week to denominational work.

The clerk, Mr. R. B. Wallace, submitted his first annual report which dwelt upon the striking features of the year, among which was the installation of a system of electric lighting, and the plan of uniting in worship with the George street church during the period of summer vacation. The present membership is 531.

Mr. F. W. Porter, treasurer, submitted the following financial report:

The treasurer stated that this was the first time in the history of the church that interest had been included in the receipts. He also stated that the church had through its individual members contributed about \$8,000 to the first and second Acadia Forward Movements.

Building committee reported through its chairman, Mr. W. G. Clark. The total subscriptions for vestry extension and organ removal is \$7,862.50, payable during the next three years. With special effort it is believed that sufficient funds can be obtained this year to defray one-half the amount required to complete the work.

The treasurer of the committee, Mr. F. B. Smith, reports receipts \$1,747.05. There is now on deposit at the bank \$1,204.72.

Mr. M. R. Perley, secretary of the Sunday schools, reported for that organization. During the year, 300 volumes were added to the library. The total enrolment of the entire school is now 516. The receipts for the year, including the Spurden Class, netted \$162.44. There is now in the treasury \$39.49.

MISSIONARY ORGANIZATIONS.

Mrs. W. G. Clark, in the absence of the secretary reported for the Women's Missionary Aid Society. The year marked a new era in the life and effort of the society, inasmuch as this organization, with the W. M. A. S. of the George street Baptist church, in assuming the entire support of a missionary. The lady chosen was Miss Elizabeth Gange, well known in this city. Mrs. Ella Robinson submitted the treasurer's report which showed receipts of \$309.98 and a balance of \$4.41.

The report of the senior mission band was read by Miss Lillian Burt. The receipts of the year aggregated \$138. The junior mission band also raised during the year and contributed to missions the sum of \$35.

Mrs. Ada R. Perley presented the report of the ladies' auxiliary. The society pledged \$1,000 for church improvement purposes \$800 for vestry enlargement, and \$200 for organ removal. Miss Moore, the treasurer of the society, reported on hand Jan. 1, 1907, \$139.66; receipts of the year \$733.21.

Mrs. H. C. Creed reported for the Benevolent Fund of the auxiliary, which showed the amount available during the year as \$131. The balance in the treasury, Dec. 31, was \$86.62.

Mr. N. Inch, the sexton of the church, was granted an increase in

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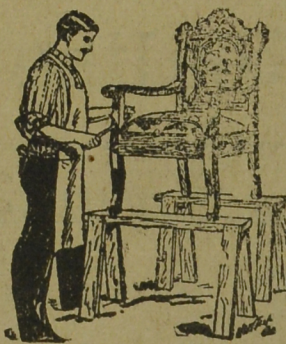
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
