SASKATCHEWAN ELECTIONS

The Saskatchewan provincial elections take place tomorrow and the Liberals have strong expectations of retaining control of the government. Mr. Haultain the opposition leader has made his campaign on a platform of equal rights and there has been no serious interference from either of the federal parties.

The government of Saskatchewan established three years ago when the province was carved out of the north-west territories, consists of four members with Hon. Walter Scott as premier and commissioner of public works; Hon. J. H. Lamont, attorney general; Hon. J. A. Calder, provincial treasurer and commissioner of education; and Hon. W. R. Motherwell, provincial secretary and commissioner of agriculture. There are no forecastle or non-part folio holding members in the executive. The salary of the premier is \$6,000, and of the others \$5,000 each.

In the first legislature recently dissolved there were twenty-five members, but at the last session a redistribution bill was passed enlarging the assembly to forty members.

The Scott government has made splendid progress in organizing affairs in the new province, and in arranging for the proper conduct of the various public services, and have every reason to anticipate a favorable verdict at the polls.

Some of our Tory friends pretend to believe that on the results of the contest hinges the question of the dissolution of parliament. They say that the Saskatchewan elections were brought on hurriedly to test the feeling of that province on federal as well as on local questions, and that if Premier Scott makes a sweep in the contest, the federal contest will be sprung this autumn, otherwise another session of parliament will be held.

This, however, is mere guessing, and it is not likely that the result in Saskatchewan will figure to any extent in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's plans as to the general election.

BRYAN AND TAFT

Mr. Bryan at his home town of Lincoln, Nebraska, on Wednesday, received formal notification of his nomination for the presidency, and the occasion was made notable by the presence of an enormous crowd of people and a great display of enthusiasm. The nomination of a man for the high office for a third time is unique in the history of the United States, and a great compliment to Mr. Bryan who is apparently rallying a more united support from his party than in either of the two previous years when he sought to rule at the White House, but it seems to be the general opinion of the best informed Americans that with all the enthusiasm and strength the Democrats may be able to arouse for their candidate. Mr. Taft, the Republican nominee will succeed Mr. Roosevelt in the presidency.

Some features of the Roosevelt policy which Mr. Taft endorses are undoubtedly arousing hostility in some sections of the party, but the slump is not regarded sufficiently serious to endanger the success of the Republicans in the great contest of November next.

CURRENT COMMENT.

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., has gone to Cape Breton, and is likely to be heard of some of the Liberal meetings planned there for the next few days.

The threatened revolution in Turkey is said to be one of the questions discussed by King Edward, Kaiser William, and Emperor Francis Joseph at their meetings this week.

It is said that Mr. E. M. MacDonald, M. P. for Pictou, Mr. A. K. McLean, M. P. for Lunenburg, and Mr. F. B. Carvell are likely to assist Col. McLean in his Sunbury-Queens political picnic program.

The rain of to-day was a great disappointment to the Methodist and Baptist people who intended holding their annual picnics. The former are inclined to blame the latter for the great outpouring of water.

Prov. Sec'y. Flemming while here should revise his appointments of school book vendors. He is no doubt aware that one of his York County agents has been convicted of illegally selling intoxicating liquor.

A rumour is prevalent that the Sun and Telegraph are to be amalgamated and that the Star and Times will also join fortunes, and that the combined papers will become the property of Liberals, leaving the Conservatives without any newspaper support in St. John except what they may be able to get from the Globe.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier's friends and they embrace men of both parties hope he may enjoy his brief vacation, which is to be spent at his old home in Athabaskville. The Premier is reported as in excellent health, he came through the work and worry of the long parliamentary session in good shape, much better than many of his fellow members of stronger constitution and younger in years.

If, as the local graft organ says, Col. McLean in his Sunbury-Queens campaign is to appear in "the same uniform as he wore at the Quebec celebration," Premier Hazen may be induced in his future campaigns to don the garb in which he drove to Stanley during the north west rebellion, which drive and its purpose were so graphically described in the local graft organ at that time.

Apparently the C. P. R. men on strike are determined on holding out as long as possible, and the company which is able to call to its aid enormous resources, are just as determined that they will not be brow beaten by the strikers. It is to be hoped however that some means will be available to break the strike at an early day so that the interests of the company and the men may not suffer seriously from the trouble.

Mr. Foster has reached Digby on his stumping tour of Nova Scotia, and the Conservative party there have nominated a Mr. Jameson to oppose Mr. Copp the present Liberal M. P. Mr. Foster is wasting his time. There are plenty of Conservatives as well as all the Liberals of Canada, who have no desire to see Mr. Borden secure the reins of power at Ottawa if it should mean that Mr. Foster would become finance minister. Mr. Foster's speculations with Forsters' funds in the west destroyed whatever prestige he may have had in this country, and he is now regarded as a discredited politician, a common scold and muckraker hungry for office, and regardless of the means he uses to secure that end.

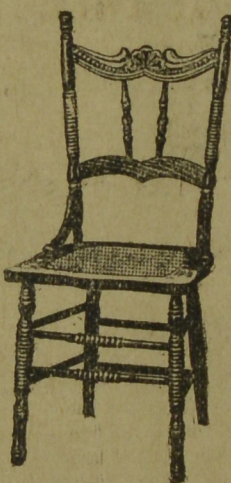

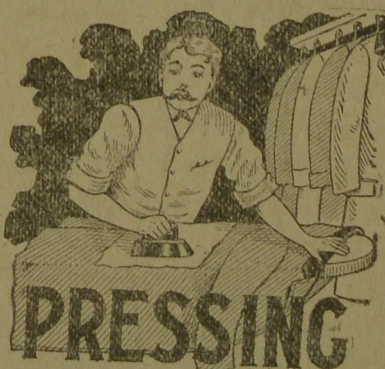
