STRIKE SITUATION

Company Think Difficulty will be of Short Duration--Men Used Harsh Language

MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—(Special)—There was some hot talk at the meeting of the strikers yesterday afternoon.
Bell Hardy advised keeping cool but several of the speakers went after the C. P. R., one man, calling it the chief of hogs.
The situation today is little altered. No more men have gone out and very few skilled men have applied to the company.
The men still claim that the wheat crop will not move until they get what they want, or that the other roads will get all and the C. P. R. none.

The C. P. R. worked a slick dodge on the strikers by buying all the land where they were accustomed to congregate. This was right by the shops and now to get to their headquarters, they have to walk around several blocks, since the short cut is denied them. The object was to keep them well away from the gate.
The opinion in C. P. R. circles is that the strike will collapse in a few days in the west when Mr. Whyte gets to work.
The men are being taken into the shops now by train but 300 extra beds have been put in, in case it is necessary to keep them at the work.

THE ODDFELLOWS

600 Representatives Attending Annual Meeting of Maritime Grand Lodge

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug. 12.—Six hundred Oddfellows, representing all branches of the order and including a large contingent of ladies, are now in Charlottetown.

Yesterday was devoted to the annual meeting of the Grand Encampment and Renekah Assembly. At the former sixty brethren, representing twenty encampments out of twenty-seven were present.

Officers were elected as follows: Grand patriarch, Alexander S. Stalker, Picton; grand high priest, F. C. Crockett, Hopewell, N. S.; grand scribe, Melville McKean, Moncton; grand treasurer, Charles A. Sampson, Fredericton; grand senior warden, James M. Ross, Moncton; grand junior warden, Phillip Brydges, Charlottetown; grand representatives: Thomas M. Grant, Westville; H. L. Hart, Halifax; grand marshal, C. T. Munto, Stellarton; grand sentinel, William McBean, Inverness, C. B.

The grand scribe's salary was increased to \$100.
In the Rebekah assembly 130 members, representing thirty lodges were present.

The officers elected up to the present time are: President, Miss Maggie Peters, Bridgetown, N. S.; vice-president, Harriet A. Smith, St. John; warden, Mary Essory, Charlottetown; secretary, Mrs. Mary McKean, Moncton; treasurer, Mrs. Janie McGowan, Moncton.

The president, Mrs. Bayers, reported that the year past had been a fairly prosperous one. She visited the members deeply interested in the work and endeavoring to portray the ritual effectively. The secretary reported three new lodges for the year.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I.—Aug. 12.—This morning the Maritime Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F. held its opening session. The Grand Master submitted a comprehensive report stating that past year has been a prosperous one and nearly every lodge had shared in the general prosperity. Four subordinate and three Rebekah lodges were instituted. He spoke of the visitation of Cantons LaTour of St. John and Wabasso of Fort Fairfield, Maine. The former under a special dispensation will confer canton degree this evening.

In dealing with practical philanthropy said that three plans of great merit had been placed before the grand lodge namely at G.B.F. Home and Orphanage, the adoption of private yards in hospitals and a campaign against consumption. During the year he made forty-one official visits. The San Francisco relief committee refunded to the Grand Lodge \$210 being twenty-five per cent of the amount contributed by the lodges \$198,802 receipts for year were mittie finding that the surplus amount was not required.

Applications were received for a new lodge at Barrington.

The Grand Secretary reported 92 lodges with a total membership of 8,620, a net increase of 761.

During the year \$11,652.50 was paid for relief in the subordinate lodges, 640 brothers and 51 widowed families sharing in the benefits.

The amount of invested funds and cash \$193,394 and the total assets of lodges 198,802, receipts for year were \$4,447.16.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug. 12.—(Special)—Eleven hundred harvest excursionists left the Island last night for the west.

Details of a fatal accident at Kensington station last night show that the victim, Fred Lemieux, aged 21, farmer, and unmarried, jumped from the train moving at full speed. His body was frightfully mangled his arms, legs and head being severed. He was taking passage on the harvest excursion train from his home at Hunter River.

LAURIER'S HOLIDAY

Premier will Take a Week After Very Strenuous Year

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—(Special)—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will go to his old home at Arthabaskaville, Quebec, on Friday next, for a week's holidays, and even this holiday will be partially devoted to business, as he will give several hours per day to his correspondence.

For over a year the Premier has been steadily working on an average of over ten hours per day, and the manner in which he has stood the strain is a marvel to those who know something of the multitudinous duties and worries that devolve upon him as leader of the government.

C. P. R. Fire Fighters Have Hard Task

CRANBROOK, B. C., Aug. 12.—(Special)—It is now thought that unless something unforeseen happens Kimberley will be safe from the fate of Fernie which has been threatening since yesterday. The C. P. R. has rushed a large force of fire fighters there on hand cars and they hope to get the fire under control by back firing.

TROUBLE WITH NAVVIES

Contractor Malcolm's Prompt Action Prevented Serious Strike Trouble on International Railway

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., Aug. 12.—Monday was lively along the line of the International railway and for a time things looked serious.

The strike which was organized by a number of Italians last week, and which was ordered for Monday morning, fizzled out owing to prompt action taken by Contractor Thos. Malcolm who gave the men twenty minutes to go to work or leave the construction camps. This did not suit the ringleaders and Monday morning they started in to force the others to quit work.

At an early hour they unfurled a red flag and proceeded to march from the construction camp to camp and ordered the men to quit work. The men were frightened into leaving and in a short time nearly the whole force of over 800 men were idle.

Word was sent to town and the police force was dispatched to the scene of the disturbance. The party was made up of Chief Crawford, Inspector Noble of the I. C. R., Max M. Mowatt, of the police committee, and four officials, fully armed. They were taken out the line by teams and after a forty-two mile drive, arrived at the scene of the trouble about 2 o'clock.

On arriving at the main camp, the

officers found the men all idle, but the ringleaders were not present, having gone ten miles further. In to make the choppers stop work. These ringleaders were parading from camp to camp. Officers Noble and Crawford proceeded on horseback, followed by a posse of police and met these agitators bringing out the rest of the gang. The ringleaders were promptly pointed out and arrested, not without threats to the officers, and fire arms were freely displayed, but the officers were firm and landed their men. These were promptly sent out to town and arrived here Monday evening.

Previous to leaving for town all the Italians in the various camps were searched for arms, and the police station was like an arsenal with arms of all description therein. There were fourteen guns or rifles, seventeen revolvers and a score or more of knives. At this stage of the game some of the Italians became very wicked and made many threats to the officers, but the work was proceeded with. The men soon quieted down after the ringleaders were arrested, and most of them have returned to work. In all less than a hundred men have left the construction and their places were speedily filled. The men wanted \$1.75 per day instead of \$1.50.

OTTAWA NOMINATIONS

Two New Men Will Carry Liberal Standard

OTTAWA, Aug. 12.—The Liberal nominating convention to select federal candidates for the two Ottawa seats was held last evening. The 353 delegates elected at Monday night's ward primaries chose after a close contest A. W. Fraser, K. C. as the English speaking candidate and Dr. Rodolphe Chevrier as the French speaking candidate.

Robert Stewart, M. P., and Auguste Lemieux, K. C., were also nominated, the former being defeated by thirteen votes and the latter by ten votes. The nomination was made unanimous, the retiring senior member for the capital and Mr. Lemieux pledging themselves and their friends to work enthusiastically for the convention's choice of standard bearers.

The Conservative nominating convention will be held on the 25th instant. Messrs. Fred Cook, P. D. Ross, editor of the Journal, and Thomas Birkett are each putting up a strong fight for the English nomination. Dr. Chabot will receive the French nomination.

AFTER THE CUP

Lipton Likely to go After American Trophy Next Year

LONDON, Aug. 12.—Flushed with the successes of his new racing yacht Shamrock, which has won twenty-four of the twenty-seven contests in which she started in the regattas held this year in home waters, Sir Thomas Lipton is more anxious than ever to try again for the America Cup. There are still six weeks for him to issue a challenge for a race off Sandy Hook in August, 1909, and he is hoping that some intimation will come from the New York Yacht Club that a challenge, if sent, would be accepted.
"The ambition of my life," Sir Thomas said, "is to bring back the cup to Great Britain."
