When Freda wakes.

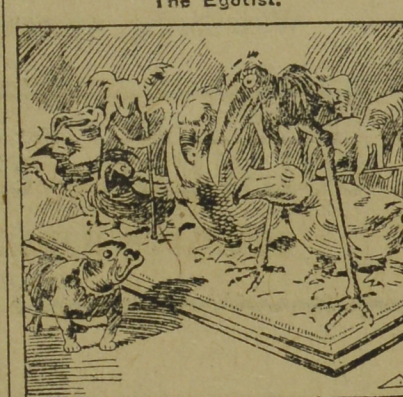
When Freda wakes—her maiden charm

Founder of Electrical Science.

Dr. Gilbert of Colchester, England, is generally considered as the founder of the science of electricity. He appears to have been the first philosopher to repeat carefully the observations of the ancients and apply to them the principles of scientific investigation. In order to determine if other bodies possessed the same property as amber he balanced a light metallic needle on a pivot and observed whether or not it was affected by causing the excited or rubbed body to approach it. In this way he discovered that many bodies possessed the property of attracting light substances. Gilbert also discovered the fact that atmospheric conditions have much to do with electrical phenomena. Gilbert's book, "De Magnete," may be fairly considered the pioneer work in electrical science.

PRISONER'S DARING ESCAPE.

LINDSAY, Ont., Aug. 10.—George Walker, while under arrest here for theft from a Mr. McKee of Toronto and while having his trial, made a daring escape, and as yet has not been caught. The trial lasted all day before County Magistrate Moore, and it was while the Magistrate was summing up the evidence that the escape was made. The Magistrate stated that he would remand Walker for a week, and just as the words were uttered the prisoner jumped up and made a beeline for an open window in front of him. He dived through alighting on the ground five and a half feet below, and made good his escape. Although the chief of police immediately organized a posse no trace at the man can be found. Walker has served many short terms in prison and in the "pen." He, along with younger companions, was accused by McKee and other Toronto men of stealing camping supplies, a revolver, some loose change and a \$60 gold watch, all of which were given up by the suspected party previous to the trial. The Toronto party were down at Goose Lake, near Sturgeon Point, last Sunday, and the goods were missed by them when they awoke from a quiet nap on the shore of the lake.
