TODAY'S MARKET.

DIVORCE COURT

Judgement Given this Morning and Divorce Granted in Two Cases

At the divorce court this morning Judge Gregory granted decrees annulling the marriages of William W. Horseman and Maisey Horseman of Moncton, and also of James H. Furge and Johannah Furge of Upper Kintore, Victoria County. In both cases the divorces were granted on the grounds of adultery.

In the Horseman case, William Horseman was the plaintiff and Mrs. Maisey Horseman, whose name was Maisey Powell, was the defendant. The couple were married in Sept. 13, 1905, at Moncton by the Rev. Mr. Grass, Reformed Baptist clergyman. They lived for some time at Berry's Mills. The affidavit of Stacey Horseman of Berry's Mills, showed the defendant had been unfaithful to her marriage vows and that he was the co-respondent.

The Judge granted an absolute divorce.

In the case of Furge vs. Furge, Jas. H. Furge brought the suit against his wife on grounds of adultery. The couple were married on July 1884, and lived together for seventeen years. They separated in July 1901, and in Feb. 1903, the woman gave birth to a child. She has since been living and travelling around with one Judson Smith, and while he is not mentioned as co-respondent, the judge said that appearances were against him. Judgment in the Whitlock and Funderbeck cases will be given at the next regular term of the court in October next.

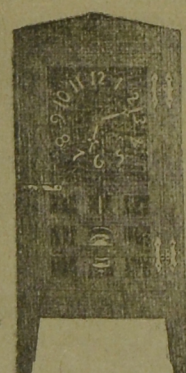
