Flemming, provincial secretary, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William Craig, on June 13th, in the seventy-fifth year of her age. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. J. K. Flemming, Mrs. Gordon Neal, Mrs. William Craig and one son, Grover Flemming. Of a large family of brothers and sisters but three survive her, James and Robert Kirkpatrick, of Debec, and Mrs. James McQuarrie, of Pennsylvania.

THE CIVIC CONTEST

Mr. John J. Weddall Elected Alderman by Large Majority.

The election yesterday to fill the vacancy for St. Ann's Ward, caused by the death of the late Ald. Everett, resulted in the election of Mr. John J. Weddall, dry goods merchant, by a majority of 178 over ex-Ald. Cornelius Kelly. It was one of the quietest civic contests in the history of the city, lack of interest being shown by the fact that not more than half of the registered voters was polled. The result was a foregone conclusion from the outset. Mr. Kelly's candidature was not taken seriously by any great portion of the electorate, and the only cause for surprise is that he received the number of votes that he did. The vote stood 372 for Weddall and 194 for Kelly.

At the City Hall poll Mr. Weddall beat out his opponent by almost a three to one vote and at the court house poll he had twenty-two majority. Nearly all of the members of the council gave Mr. Weddall a helping hand while Mr. Kelly had to go it alone. He spent the greater part of the day about the city hall, and was unrepresented at the court house poll.

City Clerk McCready gave out the result of the poll in the city council chamber at 4.30 o'clock, and formally declared Mr. Weddall elected alderman for St. Ann's Ward for the remainder of the civic year.

There were a score or more of spectators in attendance and the alderman elect in response to a call made a brief address. He heartily thanked the electors, both ladies and gentlemen for voting for him, and promised to do all in his power to advance the best interests of the city. He did not intend to work for any particular section or any particular class but for the city as a whole. He was proud to be a citizen of Fredericton, and he thought it was the duty of all to make it known as widely as possible, and endeavor to increase its business. He again thanked the citizens for electing him and promised to serve them to the best of his ability (3p. pause.)

There were calls for Mr. Kelly, the defeated candidate, but that gentleman was among the missing.
