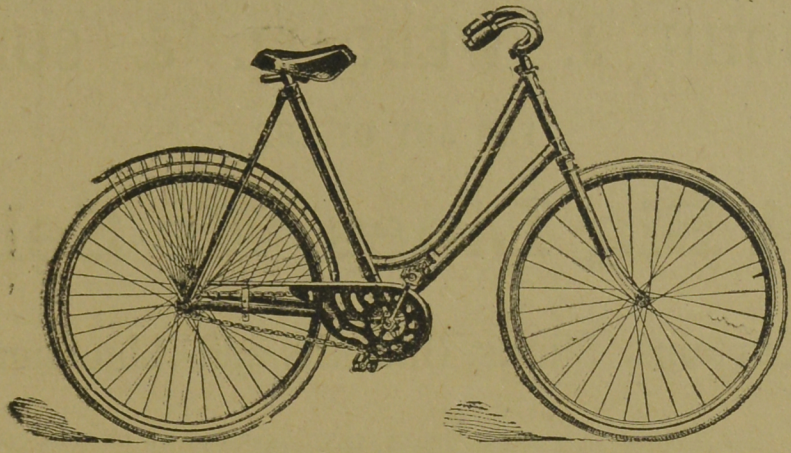

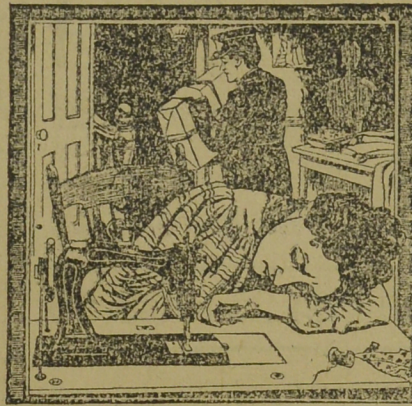

SHEEP PAINTED GREEN.

An Incident in Ireland's Cattle-Driving Campaign.

Mr. Birrell makes the following reply in Parliament papers to a question by Mr. Staveley-Hill regarding the number of cases of cattle and sheep driving in Ireland reported to the police since June 30, 1907:

"Three hundred and thirty-four cases of cattle-driving have been reported since June 30. In twenty-seven cases it was stated that the animals had been injured. In the great majority of these cases the alleged injury consisted in the deterioration of the cattle through overdriving, which caused lameness or exhaustion.

"In one instance one of the cattle was found dead from exhaustion. In another case some sheep were painted green. In another, the tails of three bullocks were cut, but in this instance the drive is stated to have been due to a family dispute and not to the anti-grazing agitation.

"Claims for compensation were made in twenty-two cases. In seven of these compensation has been granted, eleven claims are pending, and four have been dropped. In no case has an owner received personal injury. In two cases police patrols were assaulted."

BOYCOTT BRITISH GOODS.

Natives of India Being Stirred Up by Agitators.

The officers of the German steamship Neuenfels, which arrived recently from India and Ceylon, report a serious condition of affairs throughout India. The natives they assert are openly defying the British. They have boycotted the British goods, and have refused to handle cargoes shipped by British merchants. In the interior they are on the verge of open revolt, and in many places they are arming and preparing to combat British rule. Agitators are largely responsible for the present conditions. They are inciting the natives to acts of violence. They believe the Japanese will aid them if they should engage in war with Britain, and they declare they will be victorious.

In the larger cities the feeling against the British and foreigners in general has taken the form of a boycott, and commerce is greatly hampered. The Neuenfels was delayed 64 days at Calcutta waiting for her cargo. The natives refused to work on the freighter and it was weeks before a gang of longshoremen could be got together who would load the ship. Calcutta harbor at that time was filled with British steamers unable to get cargoes.

OLD TIMES RECALLED

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, APRIL 27, 1882).

The whole body of ice in the river moved today.

Bernard Kirlin, an old and well known citizen, died Saturday morning, and his remains were interred on Monday.

The Metropolitan Coadjutor Bishop Kingdon and Rev. Mr. Alexander are attending Synod at Montreal this week.

Miss Minard of the primary department of the Model school has been granted six months leave of absence from the 1st of May.

Charlie Orr, who left here a few weeks ago for Winnipeg, has enlisted in the North West Mounted Police for a term of five years.

Collector Street, Harry Beckwith and R. M. Pinder are attending the annual session of the Masonic Grand Lodge of St. John this week.

Ald. Geo. F. Atherton, with his family, will remove to Woodstock on Tuesday next, and will be followed to his new home by the good wishes of many friends.

The committee in charge of the erection of the new Presbyterian church have accepted the plans submitted by Messrs. Langley, Langley and Burke of Toronto.

Col. Sergt. E. A. Smith is the only Maritime Province marksman on the Wimbledon team for 1882, and his career will be watched with much interest.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Cricket club, was held in the Barker house on Tuesday evening. There was a large attendance. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Mayor G. Fred Fisher, president; J. D. Hazen, vice president; R. S. Barker, secretary; A. F. Street, capt; M. J. McLaughlan, L. C. Macnutt, H. G. Botsford, managing committee.

Mr. E. L. Wetmore, Q. C., is in Halifax, attending the Supreme court, where he has been retained as counsel by Mr. Chas. C. Gregory of Antigonish, in his suit against Sir Hugh Allan, for damages to the extent of \$100,000 on account of Eastern Extension railway construction in Nova Scotia.

A sad and fatal accident occurred at Morrison's Mills, Tuesday night, when Wm. Thompson, formerly of the 22nd Regt., but recently an employee at the Antimony mines, fell down stairs in his own house, and so severely fractured his skull, that he was picked up unconscious, in which state he remained till 9 o'clock yesterday morning, when death relieved his sufferings.

A very pleasing social event took place last Thursday evening at the residence of Mr. J. J. Weddall, on Brunswick street, when Miss Nettie Mildred Weddall, sixth daughter of the late Rev. R. Weddall, was united in marriage to Mr. John Burnett of Lower Kingsclear by the Rev. E. Evans of the Methodist church of this city. The wedding took place very quietly, only a few relatives and friends being present. The bride's sister, Miss Louisa Weddall, was bridesmaid, and Mr. W. Egerton Everett, (now Ald. Everett of this city,) supported the groom.

The quarterly meeting of the Fredericton Historical society took place in the library of the Normal school Thursday evening, when President G. E. Fenety read his paper on "The March of the 104th Regiment." Besides the president and secretary, there were, of the members present, President Jack, Prof. Bailey, Dr.

Rand, Dr. Atherton, Principal Crockett, Judge Steadman, J. L. Inches, G. E. Parkin, H. C. Creed, Ed. Jack, A. Yerxa, G. N. Babbitt, G. A. Ferry and H. A. Cropley.

Capt. Chas. Rainsford, of Kingsclear, passed to his rest Monday morning, aged 95 years. Captain Rainsford was a lieutenant in the 104th Regiment, a volunteer corps raised in York county during the war of 1812, and accompanied that regiment on its perilous and gallant march through the wilderness to Canada in mid-winter. He was with the regiment all through the campaign, and returned with it to Fredericton, where it disbanded. His heroic exploits in connection with the march were represented to the Imperial government, and he was rewarded with a pension of £100 sterling per annum during his lifetime. He was the last survivor of the 104th, and up to almost his latest days he could relate with wonderful accuracy of detail the particulars of his military experience. Captain Rainsford was a member of a family of fifteen, nearly all of whom have lived to a great age. He was the last male survivor, but two sisters, Mrs. Wetmore, mother of Mr. Justice Wetmore and Mrs. Winslow, mother of E. Byron Winslow, are yet alive.

Mr. William Grieves, after a long illness, died at his residence, Regent street, after a very short Saturday morning, aged 63 years. His remains were interred Monday afternoon, and the very large attendance of all classes of people, testified to the esteem in which the deceased gentleman was held. A large representation of the Orange society, of which he had for many years been a prominent member, including about forty gentlemen who came from St. John by special train, walked in procession, headed by the Fredericton Brass Band. Besides the relatives and friends of the deceased, who attended as mourners, His Worship the Mayor, and the members of the city council were present. The pallbearers were John Edwards, Ald. Burrell, Wm. Crockett, A. Limerick, Geo. Gregory, moved out to Regent street to Queen, thence to Carleton, and to the Old cemetery, where services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Mowatt, after which the ceremonies of the Orange order were gone through by Acting Grand Chaplain Garraty, assisted by Grand Master Wilson, and Senior D. G. M. Armstrong. The deceased was a native of Ireland, but removed to this city when quite young, and continued to reside here until his death. He was for a term a member of the city council, served as roadmaster, was a leading member of the curling club for many years, and was a prominent member of St. Paul's church and congregation. For thirty years he kept the Waverly hotel, and in that capacity won many friends.
