ATTORNEY GENERAL'S DEFENCE.

FOREST PROTECTION.

The protection of the forests of the province from fire on account of the construction of the G.T.P. had been engaged the attention of the government. The late government had introduced a bill requiring the G.T.P. to protect the forests themselves, but after a visit of the then premier and the attorney general to Ottawa, this bill was withdrawn. The then attorney general stating that it might lead to friction and that the government was satisfied to trust the matter in the hands of the railway company. Last year, when the surveys were being made, fire wardens were appointed at a cost to the Province of four thousand six hundred dollars, a sum fifty per cent greater than was estimated. During construction, the risk of fire would be infinitely greater. Instead of small parties of engineers, there would be thousands of navvies and others employed who would have many chances of doing great damage. There were some eighty-nine miles of the line running through the Crown Lands. The rest of the distance being through lands owned by the New Brunswick Land Company, the Alexander Gibson Co., and the Miramichi Lumber Co. The government had invited representatives of these companies to accompany them to Ottawa to interview the commissioners of the National Transcontinental Railway and the Dominion government. They had thus obtained the assistance of Col. McLean representing the N. B. Land Co., and Hon. Charles E. Oak of Banzer, an eminent authority on forestry. They had told the commissioners and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, that they were willing to do either one of two things, first, that the New Brunswick government should organize and appoint men to protect the forests upon a scheme prepared by the Deputy Surveyor General, the Dominion government or the commissioners to pay the expenses, or second, the latter might appoint the fire wardens themselves and the province would vest them with all the powers possible to give them. Sir Wilfrid Laurier had received the deputation with that grace of manner so characteristic of him, but had urged that the province should pay part of the cost. The railway commissioners thought that as their engineers would have residences every ten miles, that they could afford the necessary fire protection. It was pointed out by Hon. Mr. Oak and others, that the engineers had their

own work to attend to and could not be expected to give fire protection the necessary attention. From what he had heard since leaving Ottawa, he had reason to believe that the N.T.R. Commissioners would appoint some men for this work, but he feared not enough to provide for safety. And it might be necessary for the province to appoint some special commissioners to watch this matter all along the line.

NEW AUDIT ACT.

After referring at length to the fishery claim Mr. Hazen said the Hon. gentleman had commended the idea of having a new Audit Act and it was a little odd that he had never expressed the idea himself when he was in a position to carry the matter through and that the government which he supported, though continually urged by the opposition had persistently refused to give increased powers to the Auditor General.

Mr. Hazen explained that the new Act provided that all payments should be made through one channel and not as formerly through various departments. It also provided for continuous audit giving the Auditor General continual oversight of the accounts and largely increased powers. It provided for the appointment of a treasury board as at Ottawa. Under it the Auditor General could not be removed from office by the government but only by an address from the Legislature and a two-thirds vote of the House.

The only real fault that the Hon. gentleman had found with him was, that he had not abolished the office of Solicitor General, would direct the Hon. gentleman's attention to the fact that in his speech in the campaign of 1906, he had never once referred to the abolition of this office. It was true that in 1903, he had put forward the idea of abolishing the Solicitor Generalship, but people at that year had pronounced on the subject and had given him only ten supporters at the house to follow out that policy. He did not propose to carry out ideas which the people had pronounced against. He wanted, however, to be judged upon his utterances in the campaign of 1908 and he was quite willing to be criticised upon any failure to carry out promises then made. It would be the earnest endeavor of the Government to promote the public welfare and he trusted that in this effort the legislature which has not been inferior in ability or zeal, for the public good, would give the government a generous support in its efforts. (Applause.)

HELD WOLF PACK AT BAY.

Pedlar Saves His Life by Using Gramophone as Charm.

Lost in the pine forests in the wilds of the interior, miles from shelter, with the north winds blowing a furious gale, increasing the intense cold, with a pack of hungry wolves in hot pursuit, night fast approaching, and nothing but impending death to look to, was the predicament in which a pedlar was placed while making a tour of the lumber camps.

In some localities in the Northwest this winter the wolves have been driven desperate by hunger, induced by their inability to kill the usual number of deer because of the open winter which has prevailed in that section of the country, enabling the fleet footed animals to escape the fangs of the wolves. When wolves are supplied with food they are rather particular in its quality, but when famished, a lean lumberjack, tenacious explorer, a cruiser or even a tough trapper is a luscious meal for them.

The following startling story sent by a correspondent is declared by him to contain nothing but the truth and is devoid of tree-climbing and like details, and indicates how modern inventions are superseding time worn methods.

He Missed the Trail.

Adam Jonas Sekah, who for the last eleven years has been doing an itinerant business in the numerous lumber camps and among the homesteaders north of here, selling watches, jewelry and trinkets, was the hero of the adventure.

In the afternoon of the day when he left a camp at which he had been plying his trade to walk to another camp several miles distant, he was told of the possible dangers in store for him in venturing on a journey so close to nightfall. But being brave

and having no eye for his disadvantage before him at the next camp, he sallied forth intent upon reaching his destination in time for the evening meal and showing his wares afterwards.

His effects he hauled upon a little toboggan. After an hour's travel he discovered he had missed his trail. Night caught him hopelessly lost, although at this time he did not appreciate his position, believing that he would soon reach his destination.

About the time he was becoming anxious he heard the ominous and startling call of a wolf, which was immediately answered, and soon on all sides could be heard the cries of the chase. He quickened his pace, and, while debating whether to climb a tree or attempt to build a fire, he came to a small clearing, with a settler's shack in the centre. On reaching it he found that the doors and windows were gone.

At the edge of the clearing he could see skulking forms, momentarily halted by the caution with which wolves approach the open. He was certainly in a sorry plight. What should he do? 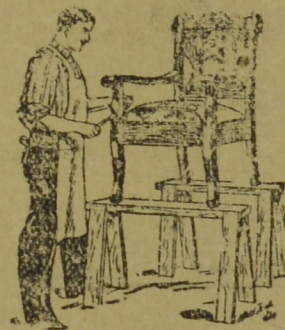
