CONVICTED OF LIBEL

Quebec Premier and Colleagues Secure Verdict against a Tory Defamer --Legislature Summoned

QUEBEC, Jan. 4.—The Quebec legislature has been called for Tuesday the 3rd of March next. This was decided at a meeting of the provincial cabinet held this morning at the parliament building, at which all the ministers were present.

In the presence of a crowded court room yesterday, Judge Lemieux rendered judgment in the suit brought by Mr. G. B. Burland, the member for St. John's, against the members of the provincial cabinet and legislature against the Conservative organ L'Evenement for a malicious and libelous article published on the 23rd of February last.

His Lordship read the article and declared it to be incriminating, but he took into consideration the retraction which L'Evenement published a few days later, in which the severe criticism of the first article was greatly modified and almost entirely removed. Furthermore, the judge remarked that the editor, Jean Dumont had stated in his evidence that he had written the article without malicious intent.

His Lordship, however, held that the first article was unjust and that the L'Evenement was at fault. He therefore ordered it to pay unto the Premier \$50 damages, with costs of suit; to each of the cabinet ministers \$50 damages, and to each member of the legislature, \$25. This, in the aggregate, amounts to a considerable sum of money.

C. P. R. WRECK

One Man Killed others Injured in Smash near Chapleau, Ont.

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—A serious wreck, resulting in the loss of one life and the injury of thirteen persons occurred early yesterday morning on the Canadian Pacific Railway, between Chapleau and Cartier, to the Imperial Limited Express, which left Vancouver on Tuesday and was due in Montreal last night.

The official report of the C. P. R. follows:

"Early Friday morning, half way between Chapleau and Cartier, a broken eighty pound rail caused east-bound express No. 2 to leave the track. A baggage car, soot-onist car and coach were derailed and turned on their sides and Mrs. B. Slown of Lindsay, Ont., was killed and thirteen persons injured."

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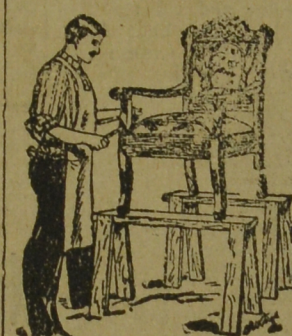
