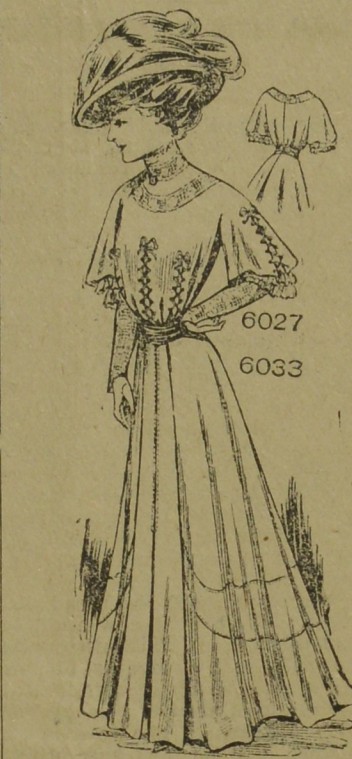

A NOVEL AND GRACEFUL COSTUME.

Novel effects in complete costumes are being eagerly sought since dame fashion decreed that the smart gown should be made entirely of one color. The model illustrated is made of chiffon broadcloth in the charming dead-rose shade, and is trimmed with filet lace dyed to match, narrow velvet ribbon and silver buttons. The bodice and oversleeve are cut in one piece, the ingenious cut, combined with the exquisite pliability of the material, producing the perfect fit. The waist may be cut out at the neck as shown, if a low neck development is desired, and the undersleeve may also be omitted. The arately and is arranged in two box-skirt a three-piece model, illustrates the most recent design in circular skirts, which are rapidly coming in to favor. The front gore is cut up-pleats, thus giving the straight line from waist to hem, while providing for a slight flare at the foot. The wide trimming band, curved toward the front, where it meets the box-pleats, affords an opportunity to introduce a little applied decoration, though this band may be omitted if desired. To make the costume in the medium size requires 11 1/2 yards of 22-inch goods for the skirt, and 5 yards of the same material for the skirt.

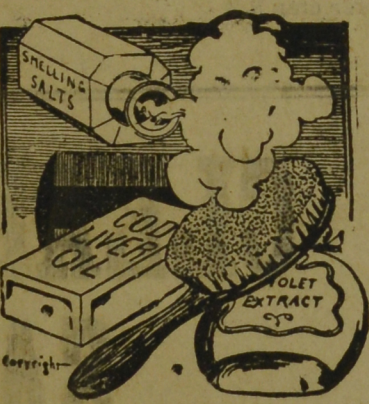

DELUGE OF HOT METAL.

Rushed into Pit in Steel Converter at Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 3.—Two men were killed and thirteen others seriously injured by an explosion in converter No. 3 of the Edgar Thomas plant of the United States Steel Corporation at North Braddock, about seven miles east of here, yesterday. The two men killed were foreigners. Six of the injured were Americans and the others Slavs.

All were removed to a hospital in this city, where it was said their injuries were not serious. No official statement of the cause of the explosion has been issued, but old converter mill men say the cause could hardly be other than that some of the molten metal sifted through the soapstone lining of the converter and came in contact with the steel sheathing which perhaps was damp.

When the explosion occurred the bottom of the converter dropped out, throwing 15 tons of molten metal into the pit, where 15 men were working at the ladles. There was no explosion when the hot mass of steel struck the bottom of the pit, but in stead flames of burning gas were sent up which burned the men in the pit. The two men who were killed had been working under the converter and their bodies were terribly mangled.

DIVORCE, THEN DEATH.

Sensational Suicide of a Gallant British Officer.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—Major Coates Phillips, an officer who distinguished himself in the South African war, committed suicide here last night under sensational circumstances. The major had been divorced. Some time ago he made an attempt to kill himself in the residence of his former wife, but was restrained.

Last night he returned to the home of Mrs. Coates Phillips and forced an entrance. His former wife, her mother and a solicitor were in the house, but when they saw the excited man break in, they fled. The major opened fire with his revolver, aiming at everyone he could see, and then blew out his brains. The solicitor and the mother of Mrs. Coates Phillips were wounded, but not seriously.
