ECONOMY NECESSARY

The chairman of the police commission is given as authority for the statement that the police force as reorganized by the commission, will cost the city annually \$1,150 more than during the past few years. This includes an additional policeman, and a raise of pay all around.

The question for the taxpayers is, are they prepared to dip into their pockets and pay this additional \$1,150, an unnecessary expenditure. Four policemen are quite sufficient for this city, and they are entitled to a living wage, no more and no less, and any proposition to increase the number of men should be discountenanced by the city council, the members of which are responsible to the people for the conduct of civic affairs, including the public expenditure.

This city is already heavily burdened with taxation. Within the past few years we have nearly doubled our public debt in making improvements, sanitary and otherwise, and the people are standing about all the taxation they can bear. There should therefore be retrenchment and economy practised at the city hall, instead of adding unnecessary officials, to a staff already sufficiently large.

Four good, active policemen, earnest and honest in the discharge of their duties, should be able to enforce all the laws governing the city, but they must be men who are not standing in with any class of people known to be violating the laws.

A PROMPT RESPONSE

The strong representations which Mr. Whitehead and Mr. Carvell, M. P., made to the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa recently, with respect to the necessity of improving the channel of the St. John river between Fredericton and Woodstock, to make it navigable during any season of the year, are bearing early fruit.

On Saturday in parliament Hon. Dr. Pugsley announced that the supplementary estimates to be introduced this session will include an amount to provide for the immediate survey of the river, with a view to carrying out the recommendations of Mr. Whitehead and the member for Carleton.

Dr. Pugsley also made the gratifying announcement that the federal government will undertake the construction of several wharves on the St. John river without the aid of the local government, and he succeeded in securing the passage of an item of \$400,000 for dredging and wharf building in St. John, so that altogether Saturday was a good day for New Brunswick in parliament.

It may be mentioned, however, incidentally that when the important interests of the St. John river district were under discussion in the House, the member for York was absent from his place and at his home in Fredericton, attending to his private business.

WASTED MONEY

The Standard of Empire, the London newspaper to which the Hazen government is paying \$2,000 for a four inch square advertisement for one year continues to insert puff for Mr. Hazen, sent by its St. John correspondent. Here is another sample: "The provincial government's energetic progressive policy, introduced by the Hon. Douglas Hazen directly he took office, is bearing good fruit, and has already proved a notable stimulus to development, both as affecting existing industries, particularly agricultural, and new settlements, and the launching of new enterprises. The outlook is very bright here now."

This is extremely nauseating, but the province is footing the bills—\$2,000 a year for a little advertisement with flattery for Mr. Hazen and his government thrown in.

There was never a more reckless waste of money than throwing \$2,000 into the London newspaper, whose correspondent evidently believes that his chief mission is to beslobber the government.

President Roosevelt contemplates a 3,000 mile hunting trip through the wilds of Africa, where fierce wild animals and fiercer tribesmen abound. He will, however, be out of sight of troublesome politicians, the beef and steel trusts and other monopolists, whom he has been fighting so vigorously for some years.

CURRENT COMMENT.

There is another man hunt up river, yet the solicitor general has not gone on the war path.

Mr. Hazen has been in office nearly three months but has not yet appointed a Liberal to office. Neither has he dismissed a Conservative.

Serious crimes appear to be on the increase in this province. A deliberate murder and a serious stabbing affray are added to the record in a week.

Mr. Bryan is not altogether sure of the Democratic nomination for the presidency of the United States. The big convention is assembling at Denver this week, and Governor Johnson of Ohio, is a hot favorite with many of the delegates.

That there is no politics in the militia is again shown in the appointment of Major H. Montgomery Campbell as second in command of the New Brunswick troops to take part in the Quebec celebration. Major Campbell is a militant Tory, and so is Col. Vince, who annually receives an important post at Camp Sussex. Liberals, however, were never considered worthy of such positions when the Tory government was in power at Ottawa.

Sunday night's rain was somewhat of a bracer for the crops, but they could stand several hours' downpour.

Some years ago Mr. John Charlton, Liberal M. P. for North Norfolk, Ontario, was one of the most prominent men in parliament, especially taking a leading part in moral reform debates and fiscal matters. Ill health, however, drove him from public life, and his numerous friends throughout Canada regret to hear that recently in an effort to save his life a surgeon was compelled to amputate one of Mr. Charlton's legs.

The Moncton Times, which is evidently feeling the effect of the hot weather, says that Mr. Emmerson, when he went to Ottawa, "took the first opportunity to throw Mr. Blair down, and ultimately secured his place in the cabinet." The Times is very reckless in statement. It has no proof that Mr. Emmerson "threw Mr. Blair down." Mr. Blair voluntarily resigned his seat in the cabinet, and recommended Mr. Emmerson for the vacancy. One of the Times' proprietors, Mr. F. W. Sumner, is the Tory candidate against Mr. Emmerson in Westmorland, hence the extreme untruthfulness of his organ.

NO ARREST YET

Italian Charged With New Denmark Murder Still Eluding the Authorities.

Hon. L. P. Farris, police commissioner of the Grand Trunk Pacific, told The Sun over the telephone from White's Cove, that four Italians wanted for the murder of a compatriot near Grand Falls, had not yet been apprehended.

The coroner's jury on Saturday returned a verdict to the effect that the murdered man came to his death at the hands of Michael Salvatore and three others, whose names are unknown.

Salvatore lived with the woman over whom the fight occurred. He at times went by the name of Ross and Manzer, but his right name is said by the Italians to be Salvatore.

A post-mortem examination of the remains was made by Dr. Puddington, who found that there were three bullet wounds in the dead man's body.

The man who was wounded in the shooting is said to be recovering, in the care of Dr. Puddington. This man had a remarkable escape, as it was only a pack of clothing on his back that saved him from certain death. He happened to have this pack on his back and the bullets sent at him struck the pack, only one of them going into his body.

Mr. Farris last night denied the statement that things were becoming desperate along the Grand Trunk Pacific route and that an armed constabulary might be required at each camp. He stated that he had received no complaint from any of the contractors and that no liquor was being sold.
