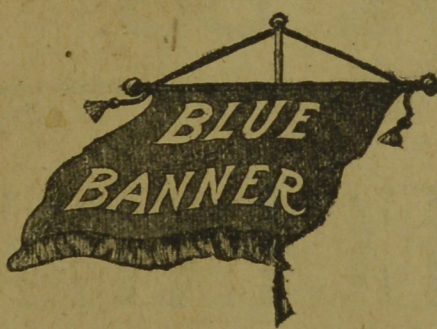

REMARKABLE GAME

NEW YORK, July 6.—One of the most stubbornly contested baseball games ever played between professional clubs, closely approaching, if not exceeding, the record of runless games was played Sunday in Newark between the Newark and Jersey City Eastern League teams. The game was called on account of darkness at the end of the nineteenth inning without a run having been scored by either team.

The pitcher for Jersey City had the Newark down to three hits, while the pitcher for Newark allowed his opponents but six singles. The only extra base hit of the game was a two-bagger by Brockett. Each pitcher struck out fourteen men and each was remarkably steady. Lafitte hit the batsmen and passed two. Brockett passed three Jersey City players. The batteries were well supported by the fielders.

ALL RED LINE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Will Invite Parliament to Endorse the Project

OTTAWA, July 6.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will on Tuesday next introduce a resolution asking parliament to endorse a resolution passed at the Imperial conference in London last summer in connection with the All Red line project. The resolution further recites that it is desirable that steps be taken with all convenient speed to achieve the results aimed at in the London resolution, and that in the opinion of the Canadian commons it is desirable that the governments of Australia, Canada and New Zealand should with as little delay as possible agree upon a definite plan for carrying the scheme into effect, this plan to be then submitted for the consideration of the Imperial and colonial parliaments.
