NEW COPS APPOINTED

Messrs Henry Myrshall and George Foss Added to the Force

The Board of Police Commissioners held a meeting this morning in the assessors' office, and after considering nine applicants for the positions on the police force, appointed Messrs Henry Myrshall and George Foss to the vacant positions. This brings the strength of the force up to five men, including a chief, a sergeant, and three patrolmen.

Foss, who is a carpenter by trade and formerly lived in Sunbury, was sworn in by Col. Marsh at 12.30 o'clock, and Myrshall was sworn in at 1.30. Myrshall belongs to Queensbury, and has been employed at the York hotel for some time past. The new officers will go on duty this evening, and will be furnished with uniforms later on.

It now transpires that the four members of the old police force were furnished with new uniforms a few weeks ago, and as two of the officers were not re-appointed, the money invested in uniforms for them, is a dead loss to the city.

A majority of the aldermen are not any too well pleased with the action taken by the police commission, and there is likely to be quite a storm at the council meeting on Tuesday evening. It is said that six of the aldermen are for voting the commission out of existence, while another is said to be non-committal. Should he decide to stand with the majority, the knowing ones say that the commission will surely go by the board. Rumblings of discontent over the increased expense incurred by the commission are heard on every side.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH.

Mr. Thomas H. Perley Expired on Roadside at Bear Island.

Mr. Thomas H. Perley, a well known resident of Bear Island, died very suddenly on the road his home at noon on Saturday. He had been doing some work on the road with his team, and did not complain of feeling unwell. He quit work at twelve o'clock, and was preparing to return home to dinner, when he was suddenly stricken down. The horses reached home without a driver, and Mr. Perley's daughter becoming anxious as to her father's whereabouts, started down the road to look for him. She was shocked to find his lifeless body lying upon the side of the road. Heart failure was the cause of his demise.

The deceased gentleman was sixty years of age, and is survived by a widow and family of three daughters, viz: Mrs. Brock Hagerman of Houlton, Mrs. McDougall of Bear Island, and Miss Ruth Perley at home. Mr. Lewis Perley of this city, and Mr. H. A. Perley of Calgary, Alberta, are brothers of the deceased, and Mrs. M. B. McNally of Kingsclear, is a sister.

The late Mr. Perley had been employed as fishery guardian for several years, and was well known and respected.

The funeral took place this morning, and was largely attended. Services were conducted at the house by Rev. Mr. Ross. Mr. John G. Adams was the officiating undertaker.

SEIZED AND SOLD.

Bangor Commercial—Two carloads of lumber seized at Vanceboro, June 10 and 13, by the U. S. customs officials on the charge of fraudulent invoicing were sold at auction at the custom's house in this city Thursday afternoon. One carload was sold to Barker & Co., of Boston, for \$15.25 a thousand, while the other was disposed of to Capt. W. S. Higgins, of this city for \$14.60 per thousand. The lumber was building material of different varieties. It was shipped by the Peel Lumber Co., of Florenceville, N. B., and James Smith & Sons, of Canterbury, N. B. (It would be interesting to know the names of the gentlemen comprising the Peel Lumber Co.)

DIRTY STREET CROSSINGS.
