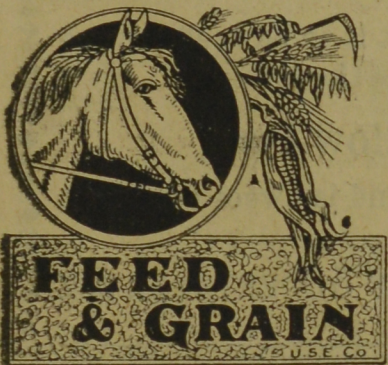

KING'S VISIT TO RUSSIA

Extra Precautions Taken to Protect His Majesty.

Russian Government Sends a Special Regiment and 500 Special Service Men to Reval—Great Reception Accorded King at Kiel.

REVAL, June 8.—This quaint old town has begun to fill with visitors for the meeting of King Edward and Emperor Nicholas. The hotels are crowded, and all available private lodgings are engaged. A regiment of infantry and five hundred secret service officers have arrived for guard and police duty. Four destroyers took their stations in the harbor to keep the roadstead clear for the royal yachts.

Brilliant weather is forecasted for Tuesday and Wednesday here.

There is a possibility that King Edward and Emperor Nicholas will come by rail on account of rough weather in the Gulf of Finland, and join the yachts here. Whichever way they come the residents are prepared to give them a royal welcome.

The Russian Imperial yachts Polar Star, Standard and Tsarevna, escorted by a fleet of torpedo boat destroyers under command of Rear Admiral Von Essen, arrived in the roadstead here early this morning. The Standard during the day will move alongside the pier from which Emperor Nicholas and other members of the Imperial family, accompanied by a numerous suite, will embark from the Imperial train, which is due to arrive from St. Petersburg at seven o'clock on the morning of June 9. The Imperial train will run directly on to the pier, the approaches to which will be closed by troops.

As soon as the Imperial party has embarked the yachts will proceed to sea to meet the British royal yacht Victoria and Albert, which has King Edward, Queen Alexandra, Princess Victoria and a large suit on board. The change in the plans of the Emperor's party in giving up the trip by sea to this port and coming by rail instead was executed so quietly that the local population are a complete ignorance of the Emperor's movements.

GREAT RECEPTION AT KIEL. KIEL, June 8.—King Edward, on board the royal yacht Victoria and Albert, met with a great reception here. The German warships were dressed, royal salutes were fired, the German sailors cheered the British monarch, and the bands played the National anthem. Prince and Princess Henry of Prussia and their son paid a visit to their Majesties and a fleet of German torpedo boats and destroyers escorted the royal yacht out of the harbor on its way to Reval. It was really an impromptu review of the German fleet in honor of the King. Some forty powerful warships which had just concluded ten days manoeuvring in the North Sea, were drawn in double line, parade formation, as the Victoria and Albert passed through.

TOO ROUGH FOR THE CZAR. ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—On account of rough weather in the Gulf of Finland the Emperor will not proceed far out to sea to meet King Edward, and the interview between the sovereigns will take place within the roadstead at Reval.

PLEASED AT KING'S VISIT. ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—Premier Stolypin, president of the Duma, and Professor Paul Milukoff, leader of the Constitutional Democrats, all express their unreserved pleasure at King Edward's approaching visit. The Premier said that, a rapprochement between the two countries was mutually desirable, not only in the sphere of conventions, but in the domain of trade, manufactures and commerce.

LEFT FOR REVAL. ST. PETERSBURG, June 8.—Premier Stolypin, Prime Minister Iswolsky and Admiral Dikoff, the Minister of Marine, left here this morning on board the cruiser Almaz for Reval.

TWO WEEKS ON ICE CAKE. LAKE CHAMPLAIN DISCOVERY FETES.

Steamboat "Pete" was Rescued After an Awful Experience.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 9.—Steamboat "Pete," a survivor of the schooner John F. Miller, which was wrecked in Alaskan waters, was found on an ice cake two weeks after the disaster. He will be a cripple all his life. The Miller, commanded by Capt. Kelton, sailed from San Francisco with thirty-one men for the fishing station in Pirate Cove. While trying to assist the schooner Glen, which was ashore, the Miller was hit by a howling northeaster and struck in Bear Harbor, Unimak Island, Alaska.

That was on January 8. The temperature was 10 degrees below zero, and an hour after the vessel was cast ashore her hull broke in two. The after section drifted ashore and nineteen of twenty-one men on that part of the hulk reached land after a terrible experience. Two were drowned. The forward section of the vessel, holding eight men, drifted seaward and, with the exception of the man who was afterward found alive on the cake of ice, none of the men on it escaped.

ACTOR TO BECOME MINISTER.

Reginald Barlow, who Served in Boer War, Quits Stage.

NEW YORK, June 9.—After spending thirty years as an actor, Reginald Barlow, son of "Milt" G. Barlow, once a prominent minstrel, announced yesterday that he is to enter the ministry. Giving as his ambition the reconciliation of the church and stage, Mr. Barlow announced that he would assist in conducting the service at the Church of the Ascension, Greenpoint.

"In my opinion, every actor when he becomes 50 or 60 years of age, if he is still in the profession, should become a minister," said Mr. Barlow.

Mr. Barlow is 39 years old, and made his debut when a boy of nine, in his father's troupe of Barlow, Wilson, Primrose and West. While in Winnipeg in 1900 he joined the Royal Canadian Regiment and served in the Boer war. For his services in rescuing his captain, when wounded he received a medal from Queen Victoria.

Great Britain, France and Canada to Participate in Three Hundredth Anniversary Celebration.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 9.—At the regular session of the Legislature of 1908 an appropriation of \$50,000 was made for the tercentenary celebration of the discovery of Lake Champlain. Senator Henry W. Hill, of Buffalo, chairman of the sub-committee of the New York Lake Champlain Commission, explains what is being done as follows:

The celebration is scheduled to occur from July 4 to 14 next year, in the valley of Lake Champlain. It will commemorate the three hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the lake by Samuel Champlain, of Brouage, in the ancient province of Saintonge, in the month of July, 1609—about two months before the discovery of the Hudson River by Hendrik Hudson.

Samuel Champlain was the first white man to tread some of the territory now comprising the State of New York, which he did in the vicinity of Crown Point or Ticonderoga on July 29 and 30, 1609. Before reaching the upper end of the lake, however, he stopped at various points along its west shore between Cumberland Bay and Crown Point during the day time, to avoid being discovered by the hostile Iroquois Indians, who were at war with the Algonquians, under whose escort Champlain and his companions were making the tour of the lake.

It is possible that the celebration will include a historical pageant representing the Indian occupancy of the Champlain Valley and the trip of Champlain and his associates through the lake and scenes as they were presented to Champlain on that occasion as well as subsequent historic events, such as the naval engagement in the Revolution under the direction of Benedict Arnold, when he lost his flagship at Valcour Island, and the later engagement under MacDonald at Plattsburgh, in 1814, when he drove the English fleet from the lake. The wreck of one of Arnold's vessels, the Royal Savage, still lies near Valcour Island.

Great Britain, France and Canada, will be invited to participate.
