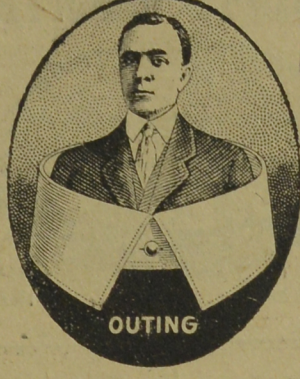
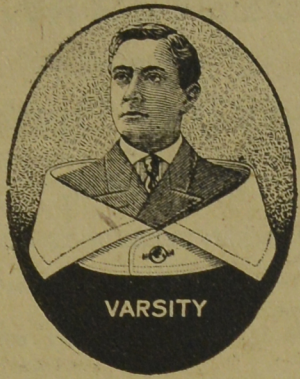

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH ANNUAL.

Committee Appointed on Pastoral Vacancy Granted Extension of Time—
Finances in Healthy Condition—
Trustee Board Re-elected

Mr. T. G. Loggie, chairman of the trustee board, presided at the annual congregational meeting of St. Paul's church in the Auld Kirk last evening, and Mr. E. A. McKay acted as secretary. There was a good attendance, and reports on the last year's work were of a most encouraging nature.

The chairman submitted the annual financial statement, which showed a balance of \$86.40 on the right side of the ledger. The receipts for church purposes amounted to \$3,065.40, which is a slight increase over the previous year. The session receipts were \$356.75; for the Sabbath school there was collected \$206.20, and the manse fund amounted to \$911.60.

Mr. Loggie spoke of the necessity of improving the heating apparatus of the church, and expressed the hope that the cost of the work would be defrayed out of current revenue. The amount of the church indebtedness was given at \$1,030.

Mr. G. W. Hodge thought that a determined effort should be made to wipe out the debt and announced that if a movement was inaugurated with that end in view he and his father, Mr. James Hodge, would be willing to subscribe \$100.

Messrs. J. H. Dickson and E. A. McKay, the committee appointed to consider the act relating to the Presbyterian church adopted in 1907, submitted a lengthy report, explaining wherein the act differs from the one now in force.

The meeting seemed to favor the adoption of the new act, but it was decided to take time to look more carefully into details, and the matter was allowed to stand over for the present. It is probable that a meeting will be held in September, when the new act will be adopted.

All of the members of the trustee board, with the exception of Mr. Harry Campbell, who voluntarily retired, were re-elected. Mr. Campbell's place was filled by the appointment of Elder Wm. Clark. The board is now composed of Messrs. T. G. Loggie, Moses Mitchell, J. R. Howie, Joseph Walker, J. A. McKinnon, J. F. McMurray, L. C. Macnutt, E. A. McKay, W. L. McFarlane, G. R. Perkins, J. H. Dickson and Wm. Clark.

The committee appointed to deal with the vacancy caused by the resignation of the pastor, Rev. Willard Macdonald, reported that they had correspondence with and concerning three suitable candidates, but as two of them were now absent from Canada on a vacation, they were not in a position to submit the names to the congregation. They asked for an extension of time, which was granted, and they were instructed to arrange with Rev. Mr. Laxton, the acting pastor, to remain in charge for a further period.

Messrs. G. W. Hodge and A. S. McFarlane were appointed auditors of the trustees' accounts.

DOUBLE WEDDING.

The marriage of Mr. Fred H. Everett, merchant of this city, and Miss Bessie Murray of Kingsclear was solemnized at St. Peter's church Springhill, at four o'clock this afternoon. At the same hour and place Miss Mabel Murray was led to the altar by Mr. J. Norris Harper of Victoria, B. C. Rev. Canon Montgomery was the officiating clergyman. The newly wedded couples will leave by the I. S. R. express on their honeymoon.

A LARGE CARGO.

The American three masted schooner Nellie Shipman, Capt. Burton, arrived in port this morning with a cargo of six hundred tons of hard coal consigned to Mr. Patrick Farrell. It is claimed that this is the largest cargo of coal ever brought up the river on a sailing vessel.

Mr. John B. Kinghorn severs his connection with the Hart Root and Shoe Company and leaves on Friday for Montreal to enter upon his duties with the George A. Slater concern.

Miss Wallace, head milliner for the Misses Young, has resigned her position and leaves on Friday for her home at Lindsay, Ont.

STOCK BREEDERS

Maritime Province Organization Held Annual Meeting, Elected Directors and Fixed Date for Winter Fair

MONCTON, June 10.—(Special)—The annual meeting of the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association and Winter Fair was held at Amherst yesterday and today.

J. B. Spencer of Ottawa, acting stock commissioner, was in attendance, and the business organization was thoroughly gone into. A statement of finances showed a deficit of about \$1500 to date. This is met by a \$200 grant from the Nova Scotia government, and \$1,300 grant from the federal department.

Grants of \$2,400 from the federal department, \$1,200 from the Nova Scotia, \$800 from P. E. I., and other sources of revenue, will make the association self sustaining in the future.

The annual meeting approved of the work of the association, and appointed a new directorate as follows:

New Brunswick—Col. H. M. Campbell, W. H. Parlee, Apohaqui; Bliss M. Fawcett, Sackville; George E. Fisher, Chatham.

Prince Edward Island—Rev. Dr. Barker, Alberton; Hon. F. L. Hazzard, James Roper, Charlottetown, John Annand, Lower Montague.

Nova Scotia—A. W. Black, Amherst; C. A. Archibald, R. S. Starr, O. T. Williams, and S. A. Logan, Truro.

The date of the annual fair was fixed for November 30, a little earlier than last year, to make it convenient for Prince Edward Islanders to attend.

RUMORED DEAL

By Which the Telegraph will once More Change its Politics.

(St. John Globe).

There have been several changes in the ownership and political bearing of St. John newspapers during the past few years, and today reports are current of a new deal that will involve another change of front by the Telegraph and leave the Conservatives without a paper.

It is generally reported that negotiations are in progress between the present owner, Mr. John McKane, and a syndicate of which Mr. John E. Moore is the moving spirit for the acquisition of the paper. So far as can be learned no final arrangements for purchase have as yet been completed, but it will not be surprising if the deal is arranged in the next few days. Mr. McKane was in St. John for a short time on Monday, and left on the Montreal train, accompanied by Mr. E. W. McCready, editor of the Telegraph. Reports today are that the purpose of the visit to Montreal is to see Mr. David Russell, the former owner of the paper, who is believed to be identified with the syndicate now seeking to secure the property. For some time past there have been rumors that negotiations were going on between McKane and a syndicate supposed to be working in the interests of the Minister of Public Works. The latest report is that Mr. McKane values his property at something more than the syndicate are willing to pay, but that negotiations are still pending.

The Conservatives leaders are believed to look with some alarm at the outlook, and it is understood have made some efforts to raise money to secure the property or an interest in it. Mr. H. A. Powell, it is stated, visited Montreal and Ottawa last week to confer with financial men of the party over the situation, but the fact that the sale to the Liberal syndicate now seems certain is apparent indication of a failure somewhere in the Conservative plans.
