A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, SEPT. 6, 1882.)

Mr. A. Lottimer has been elected president of the Y. M. C. A. of Fredericton.

Mr. Josh. Limerick has received the contract for repairing St. Paul's manse. Price \$812.

Mr. W. K. Allen, business agent of the Gibson Leather company, and Mrs. Allen, are visiting friends in Petitcodiac.

Mr. Hedley V. Edgecombe left on Monday for a three weeks' trip to the Upper Provinces, and will return by New York and Boston.

Auctioneer Wetmore sold the Kirlin property, Queen street, occupied by Howard & Crangle, as a billiard saloon, to John Moore, on Thursday, for \$2,000.

The curlers have applied for a site on the post office grounds for their proposed covered rink. A plan of the premises is being prepared to be sent to Ottawa by Mr. A. G. Beckwith, C. E.

Judge Weldon, on the application of H. B. Rainsford, deputy clerk of the Crown, has rescinded his order for bail to the Lees, and they will consequently remain in jail till the meeting of the county court next month.

Mr. W. H. Friel, for a number of years deputy sheriff of York county, died at his residence on Queen street, on Saturday afternoon, after a lengthy illness, aged forty-eight years. His remains were interred on Monday.

Rev. John Snowball, father of Mr. Fred P. Thompson, of this city, is said to have preached the first Methodist sermon in Truro, N. S., early in the present century. The service was conducted in the old court house.

Mr. H. V. Bridges, A. B. Sheffield, and Mr. J. A. Johnston, A. B., Chipman, were the only members of the University graduating class of '82 applying for Grammar school licenses in the recent examination, who were successful.

Mr. Chas. C. Gregory, C. E., formerly of this city, was defeated in the Antigonish local election last week, his opponent, Mr. Whidden, a Liberal Conservative, having a majority of 393 over him.

Rev. Dr. Sprague, the new pastor of the Methodist church in this city, will come here by the evening train tomorrow, and on Friday evening the members of this congregation propose giving him a warm welcome in their lecture room. Dr. Sprague will officiate for the first time in his new charge next Sunday evening.

The Catholic congregation of Oromocto held a very pleasant picnic on Oromocto Island, yesterday, which was marked by the best order and good management. A portion of the Fredericton Brass Band furnished music. Father Farrell was extremely attentive to visitors, and the day passed off pleasantly.

Rev. Carl Precilius, for several years assistant to Rev. J. C. McDevitt, of St. Dunstan's church in this city, has been removed to the new mission at Salmon River and Grand Lake, much to the regret of his friends here. He was a universal favorite, winning a very large circle of friends by his genial and kindly manner.

On Thursday evening last at St. Ann's church, Dr. Coulthard and Miss Annie Hunter were united in marriage by Rev. G. G. Roberts, Miss Mabel Hunter and Mr. W. B. Coulthard acting as bridesmaid and groomsmen. The doctor and his bride after the ceremony were serenaded by the Fredericton Brass Band, and have since received the congratulations of many friends.

At an early hour yesterday morning in St. Andrew's church, St. John, by the Rev. Mr. Love, of St. Stephen, Mr. Albert W. Edgecombe, of this city, and Miss Minnie Logan, daughter of Mr. Wm. Logan, of St. John, were united in marriage. The bridesmaid was Miss Annie Logan, sister of the bride, and the groomsmen, Mr. F. B. Edgecombe. There was a large number of guests present at the ceremony, after which Mr. and Mrs. Edgecombe left by the western train for a trip to New York. They have our best wishes.

Mr. G. Rice Price is out in Kings county for the vacancy in the representation caused by the death of Hon. J. H. Crawford. He is opposition and sympathy, but is not considered

a strong candidate, having been badly defeated by the late Solicitor General in 1879. Mr. G. Hudson Flewelling, an extensive merchant and ship-builder of Clifton, is the government candidate. He is a brother of Mr. W. P. Flewelling of the Crown Land department, and with Hon. Mr. Morton, will make a strong team.

The tea meeting on Mr. Stephen Glasier's grounds at Lincoln, last Thursday evening, was quite a success. A number of persons from this city went down in a special train, kindly provided by Superintendent Edgecombe, and were accompanied by the Fredericton Brass Band. Mr. and Mrs. Glasier and other residents of Lincoln, were untiring in their attentions, and made the occasion extremely pleasant. Rev. Mr. Wadman, upon whose shoulders devolved the arrangements for the excursion was also happy in his treatment of the party.

Hon. F. E. Morton, M. P. P., for King's, has been offered and accepted the position of solicitor general in the local government, rendered vacant by the death of Hon. J. H. Crawford. Mr. Morton studied law in Fredericton, in the office of the late Judge Fisher, and was admitted an attorney Oct. 19, 1863, and a barrister Oct. 13, 1865. For a time he practiced law in Sussex, as partner of E. L. Wetmore, M. P. P., but is now the head of the legal firm of Morton & McLeod, in the same place. He was first elected to the legislature in the general election of 1878, and was re-elected in the recent contest.

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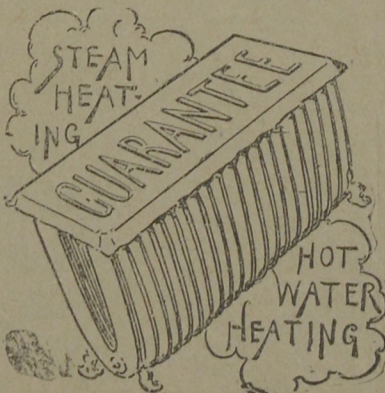
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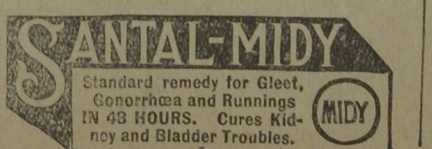
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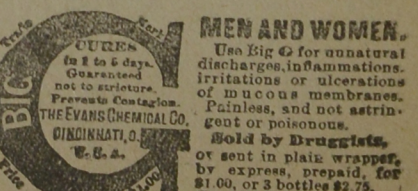
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
